At a meeting called by public advertisome t, at Bis Botol, in the city of New Orleans on Thursday, the 20th day of November 1834; George Eustie Req. was celled to the chair, J W Breedlove was appointed vice-president, Thomas Burrett and Joshus Baldwin Esqs, were appointe recretaries.
