Law of the State Legislature.

An ACT, to dispense the persons therein mentioned with the time prescribed by law for attaining the age of Majority.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana, in general Assembly convened, that from and after the passage of this Act, Abney Nash Ogden, a minor and inhabitant of the Parish of Concordia, Pr. Alb. Aardy, a minor and inhabitant of the city of New-Orleans, J. J. Darcour Planchard, of the Parish of Orleans, Aglae De La Rue and Christoval Morel, minors residing in New-Orleans, J. M. Morris of the Parish of St. Helena, andJulien Gil, minor residing in the Parish of East Baton Rouge, be and they are hereby dispensed with the age of Majority, and that the said persons shall have full power and authority to enjoy all the rights of individuals above the age of twenty-one years.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Subsidiary of the sitting of Tuesday, January 22.

On motion of Mr. Saunders, ordered, that the House do proceed to the election of a speaker pro tempore, to fill the chair, during the indisposition of Mr. Oct. Labranche; Mr. Duplantier, was meanwhile called to the chair. The ballot box having been carried round, it appeared that out of 37 members present.

Mr. Mauran had obtained 15 votes, Mouton 18, scattered votes 4, neither of the candidates having obtained the required majority in any city, a new election was called for, when it appeared that Mr. Ayer had 22 votes, Mr. Mouton 18, blank 2; Mr. Mauran was the elector pro tempore, throughout the session, during the incidental absence of the speaker, and took his place in the chair.

Mr. Duplantier gave notice, that on a future day, he would introduce a bill entitled "An act to determine the precise limits of the parish of Jefferson."

Mr. Wimpe, in behalf of the committee to whom he had been referred the petition of C. J. Seales, made his report by introducing a bill entitled "An act to dispense with the time required by law for attaining the age of majority, in favour of Charles J. Seales, a minor of the age of 18 years," read for the 1st time, 2d reading for to-morrow.

Mr. Waggoner presented a petition from several inhabitants of this state, and captains of the port of N. Orleans, praying for the repeal of a certain act relative to the port warrants of this city; referred to a special committee composed of Messrs. Grymes, Morphy and Ducros.

The same member presented another petition from Mr. Henry Lairhead, praying for a certain relief—referred to a special committee.

Mr. Ducros, introduced a bill entitled "An act to authorise the police jury of the parish of St. Bernard, to raise by means of a lottery, a certain sum of money herein mentioned"—read for the 1st time, 2d reading for to-morrow.

Mr. Johnston, in behalf of the joint committee appointed by the general assembly to make the necessary preparations for the reception of General Andrew Jackson, made his report by introducing a bill entitled "An act to provide for the payment of the expenses incurred in the arrangement made by the committee appointed by the two branches of the Legislature, to provide for the reception and entertainment of General Andrew Jackson—read for the first time, second reading for to-morrow.

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Mr. Morphy gave notice, that on a future day, he would introduce a bill entitled "An act to explain the 3d section of an act entitled "An act supplementing an act entitled "An act relative to the faculty of granting special mortgages in certain cases, and for other purposes." Approved March 22d, 1822.

Mr. J. Moore introduced a bill entitled "An act relative to applicants for a license to practice law and for other purposes"—read for the first time, second reading for to-morrow.

Mr. Perrault, in behalf of the committee to whom had been referred the petition of a member of Israelites of the city of N. Orleans, made his report by introducing a bill entitled "An act to incorporate a congregation of Israelites, in the city of N. Orleans, and for other purposes"—read for the first time, second reading for to-morrow.

On motion, ordered, that the vacancy occasioned in the committee of claims, by the resignation of Mr. Woodruff, be filled up, and the speaker appointed Mr. Scott; and for the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Mr. Woodruff, in

the committee on education, Mr. Frist was appointed.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The following bill was read for the second time, and ordered for a 3d reading to-morrow, "An act to authorize the clerk of the parish court of Iberville to exercise the functions of clerk of the court of probate, in said parish!

The bill from the Senate entitled "An act to regulate the contingent expenses of the Legislature at their session in 1822," was read for the second time, and then for a third time. The House having formed a committee of the whole, took said bill under consideration, and adopted the same without amendment.

A message from the Senate, informing that they had concurred with amendments in the bill entitled "an act to incorporate the Presbyterian Congregation at St. Francisville" said amendments were then adopted by the house.

The bill entitled "an act providing for the appointment of an inspector of flour and pork in the town of St. Francisville and for other purposes," was read for the 2d and 3d times, taken into consideration and adopted.

The bill entitled "an act for the relief of James Talbot," was read for the 2d time, third reading for to-morrow.

The bills from the Senate entitled "An act for the relief of James Allen," "An act to amend an act entitled "An act supplementary to the act entitled "An act for the relief of insolvent debtors in actual custody, and for establishing

prison for said persons for the public jan"—were read for the second time, and or-

dered for a 3d reading to-morrow.

The bill entitled "An act granting to the securities of Morris Wright, late sheriff of the parish of Rapides, an extension of time for the collection of taxes for the year of 1822"—read for the 3d time, taken into consideration and adopted.

The bill entitled "An act to furnish the volunteer uniform companies with a uniform"—read for the second time, taken into consideration and adopted.

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
