NEW-ORLEANS, Dec. 7, 1833.

REMARKS.—The weather, during several days past, has been, and up to this time, damp and cloudy, with a heavy, dark atmosphere; the Mississippi is rising rapidly, announced by the water having become more muddy than it was during the summer; it was yesterday about two feet below high-water mark.

CORPORATION.—There has been a fair business done during the past week, and the amount at least \$15,000 bales, viz.: 1300 at 12; 1300 at 13; 300 at 13 1/2; 200 at 13; 2000 at 13 1/2; 1100 at 14 1/2; 600 at 13 1/2; 1100 at 13 1/4; 2000 at 13 1/2; and 500 at 13 1/2—all Louisiana and Mississippi; and 1000 Western District Tennessee, at 13 1/2. Prices continue without change whatever, and the market with which we have to do is in rapid decline, so that, though we quote 16 cents as the highest rate, there is very little cotton in market that will demand that price—from time to time small selected parcels obtain it; it is an irregular quotation, and the top of the market arrived at, viz., per gunnery barrel, 13 1/2 cents. SCARF.—Former rates are continued, viz., on Plantation, for best quality, 1 cent; and the City, 6 1/2 to 7 1/4 cents per lb. The articles dull, the planters are firm in their demands, and shippers of late refuse to pay them. The small business done in the City is the same above mentioned.

CLOTHES.—Arrived this week for Philadelphia, 315 bales; Richmond, 200 bales; Norfolk, 209 bales; New York, 194 bales; Baltimore, 6 bales—together, 908 bales, 7 bales.

MOSAIC.—The rate last quoted remains without change. Holders of old cloth are asked to pay 10 per cent. on the value of their rates. There is now a little selling of Plantation pieces in the city. The price is steady at 27 cents per gallon, each included. Cleared this week for Richmond, 116 bales; Norfolk, 60 bales; New York, 13 bales; Baltimore, 2 bales; together, 90 bales, 155 bales.

Tobacco.—Those goods being done in the article, and it is now in full demand, we can supply them. They will be sold at 12 1/2 per lb.

DRUGS.—The market is full, and there is plenty of it. Price is 62 1/2 to 75 per lb. for a few bales. We quote the medium rate, \$47.50 per lb. Arrived this week, 924.

PORK.—Some operations in pork is all that we have to notice; the sales were 5 to 5 1/2 cents per lb., it is very scarce, but this is the reason for putting up the article in this way. Considerable quantities of bacon arrived this week, 13 bales, 29 bales, and 50,300 lbs. in bulk.

Bacon.—Is scarce and in good demand.

BEEF.—picked.—As much may be said of this article, we know of no contractions, except by retail.

MEAT.—The price of meat in the quality, of that which is offered for sale at the moment, is good, and will sell at 10 cents and upwards, if of superior quality, but all round, we think 8 to 10 cents per lb. a fair quotation. Arrived this week, 831 kgs.

HOGGING AND BALE ROPE.—are dull, and our rates nominal. We have no market for an over supply, and are enquiring whether they should not be put in for re-sale. It is not, as before remarked, in demand. Arrived this week, 210 pieces Bagging, 550 coils Rope.

CORN, BEANS, and Shelled in sacks.—in good demand; at \$2 per bushel or Bar, or 6 1/2 to 7 1/2 cents per bushel, in sacks of 100 lbs.

GATES.—are selling at \$1 25 per lb.

POTATOES.—By the quantity, are selling at \$1 12 1/2 per lb.; retail, \$1 50.

ALMONDS.—Sales of hard shelled, at 12 1/2 a 13 1/2; and soft, at 15 cents per lb., are the transactions of the week.

COCO-NUTS.—Are scarce, and the best quality commands 14 1/2 cents per lb. Inferior descriptions are more plenty at reduced rates.

SEEDS.—Last sales, 36 1/2 a 33 cents per lb.

STAVES.—are scarce and in demand; so are **Hoop Poles**.

IRON.—and **Barrels** are much enquired for. There is few or none in Market, but the season for these articles is fast approaching.

RASPS.—The last arrivals are selling at the rates quoted, demand moderate.

PLATE GLASS.—are removed without change.

PICTURES.—for frames ports remain without change, and for coastwise ports some small alteration has been made. See the Table.
