

GOLD AND SILVER FACTS.

Director of the Mint Issues a Most Interesting Report.

Value of Gold Deposited During the Year was \$129,105,500, of Silver \$9,725,022 - Gold Production of United States \$53,098,000.

The director of the mint has submitted to the secretary of the treasury his report for the fiscal year 1897, covering the operations of the mints and assay offices together with the statistics of foreign countries relative to production, coinage and the monetary condition of each.

The value of the gold deposited at the mints and assay offices during the fiscal year 1897, cents omitted, was \$129,105,500, of which \$107,837,337 were original deposits, and \$21,268,163 redemptions.

The balance of silver bullion on hand at the mints for the coinage of silver dollars and subsidiary silver coins, July 1, 1897, was: Fine ounces. Costs.

Arranging to Form an Independent State in Mexico.
