## A BIBLICAL PSYCHOLOGY

## INTRODUCTION:

## PURPOSE:

This Lesson will...

1) Introduce Kazmierz Dabrowski, author of the *Theory of Positive Disintegration*;

**Notes: a)** The Editor will, from Lesson 2 on, attempt a virtually seamless transition to [an overtly biblical] Psychology entitled "Creative Disintegration"

**b)** Please read **Psalm 88** (at the center of your Bible). The following verses are illustrative of "Positive Disintegration"

"Shall Your steadfast love be declared in the grave? Or Your faithfulness in ~~~ a place of ruin and destruction? Shall Your wonders be known in the dark? And Your righteousness in the place of forgetfulness? But to You I cry, O Lord; and in the morning shall my prayer come to meet You. Lord, why do You cast me off? Why do You hide Your face from me? I was afflicted and close to death from my youth up; while I suffer Your terrors I am distracted. Your fierce wrath has swept over me; Your terrors have destroyed me. They surround me like a flood all day long; together they have closed in upon me."

- 2) Introduce, as Psychology, "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies  $\dots$ " (John 12:24)
- 3) Introduce the role of conflict in the developmental process;
- **4**) Offer both a cryptic contrast of "A Biblical Psychology" to **Freud** and a comparison with **Jung.**
