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Lesson 1 - HTML The Basics

Welcome to the first lesson of this class. By now you should have read through the entire syllabus, and explored around in WebCT Vista. It is also very important that you spend the time to make sure your browser is set up properly for WebCT Vista. This version of WebCT requires that you have java properly installed. This will really come to play as you turn in assignments using the assignment tool. If you find that the assignment tool does not work properly, or you click on a button and nothing happens, it almost always means that Java is not installed or working properly.

In this lesson you will be given an overview of HTML and begin your journey of learning some of the basic tags or building blocks of HTML. You will jump right in and create your first web page. You will also learn a bit about how the internet works and about web servers. There are 4 chapters to cover this first week, so make sure you jump right in. Each lesson has some activities for you to do. Instead of homework we call them activities. You will not turn in all of the activities but you should do them. They will strengthen your understanding of HTMI .

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Lesson 2 - Links

If you are looking at lesson 2, then it tells me you survived lesson 1. Great! In this lesson you will learn about links. Now links are what give HTML the "H" for Hypertext in its name. Hypertext is text that can link to something else. Is n't that what the web is all about. That is why it was invented. I doubt you go to many websites without clicking on a link that takes you to another page.

Consider this, there are two types of links.

- 1. The first type of link links to another web page. This web page could be on the same web server or it could be on a server in another building, state, or another country.
- 2. The second type of links, links to something in its own web page. For example, you could have a menu at the top of a page that link to sections within the same page.

While reading the chapter pay particular attention to Relative and Absolute links. This is an important concept to fully understand. We will discuss it more in other lessons.

Lesson 3 - Text Formatting

Now it is time to add some Pizzaz. Day 6 contains some great information on Formatting. I know some of you are looking at your resume going, hum, this sure doesn't look all that great. I wish I could specify the font, add some spacing and center something. This is were it gets fun in HTML. Cascading Style Sheets or CSS is the wave for building web pages. It provides the stuff that formats the webpage and adds style to it.

There are a lot of tags in this unit. Many are repeats. Many of the tags that appear on page 129, are seldom used, so do not spend a lot of time on them.

Day 20 contains information on FTP and going live on the web. There is a web server set-up for use in this class. You will have the opportunity to upload your webpages to the webserver using the File Transfer Protocol or FTP.

The URL to the webserver is http://www.inst5260.usu.edu/ semester where semester is the semester you are taking this class. (fall, spring, summer) If you are in Hong Kong or Mainland China, your instructor will give you the directory name.

To FTP your files to the server you will need a username and password. Your username is your WebCT id, without the numbers. (i,e

All you need to do is type some comments into the submissions text box to tell me you have completed the assignment and FTP'd it to the server. This way I know you have turned it in, can give you comments back, and your points.

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Lesson 5 - Graphics for the Web

It is amazing, but you already know most all of the tags you need to create a great looking web page. Really! Now all you need is some information on adding graphics to your web page. There are basically 3 main graphics formats for the web. They are: GIF, JPEG, and PNG. These are fully supported by the major browsers. You should become familiar with these formats and when to use each one. The book has a great explanation of these file formats.

One thing you will need to remember about graphics in your web page. Graphic files are linked to your document and not included. What does this mean. When you create a word processing document in a program like Microsoft Word or Corel Wordperfect, any images you place in your document are embedded in it. When you save your word processing document the file is saved with it, inside of it. All you have is one file with all your text and all your images. When you place the image tag in your HTML document, then you are only referencing it. So you must also upload/ftp this image when you upload/ftp your web page.

The cool thing about this, is that you can reference these graphic files from anywhere on the web.

Lesson 5 - Tables

Table for two!, well not exactly, but a table for placing elements. Tables are used in HTML for many of the same reasons they are used in word processing documents. They can hold cells of information and they also can be used for formatting. Many, many websites actually use hidden tables to format the entire page. The table borders are turned off, or set to "0" so the table and its cells are invisible. You can do many things with tables including choosing how things are displayed or formatted within the cell.

With CSS becoming very popular and more and more designers using it for formatting a page, tables are not used as much. However you can still use them to format data, and other things. You can still use them to format the web page.

You must use cell borders, content alignment, padding, spacing, etc.

Your calendar must span the width (80% - 90%) of the web page.

After completing the assignment visit a couple of websites on the internet and view their source code (i.e. view then source on the browser menu) to see if you can find a table and cells that are hidden but being used to format things.

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Lesson 6 - Accessibility & Validity

In this lesson you will learn about creating web pages that are accessible to persons with disabilities. This may include vision, hearing, and motor disabilities. For those with Vision loss, another piece of software like a screen reader is used. But a screen reader can not read a graphic, or any text on this graphic. For hearing loss, well, your video files and audio files should be captioned. One of the easiest things you can do to make your graphics accessible is to use the "Alt" attribute within the Image tag.

The goals of this lesson are:

Gain an understanding of the need for building accessible websites. Learn some of the things you can do during your website design to make your pages accessible.

Gain hands on experience with evaluating a website for accessibility.

Lesson 7 - Styles

Styles are the current trend and most likely the future trend of web pages. It used to be that you used hidden tables (tables without a border showing) to format web pages, at least the positioning and placement of stuff. Well not anymore. No fear though, you have already learned how to do some of the styles within a web page. One of the coolest things about styles is the ability to build a style sheet. A style sheet is a file or document that contains styles. It then can be linked to a web page or multiple web pages. This is a very powerful feature.

Imagine that you just created a 50 page website for a client. All along you have been working with a representative of the marketing department. The site looks really slick. Only one problem. The boss of the company wants the color of all the headings to be Aggie blue instead of BYU blue. Oh no, you have 50 pages each with multiple headings to change the color in.

With a linked style sheet, no problem. You open up the style sheet and change the color of the defined headings. Now every page that is linked to that style sheet is updated. Style sheets are applied as the page is loaded into a web browser. This allows you to build the page and then apply the appropriate fonts, colors, sizes, and even positioning.

Carefully go through this chapter and make sure you

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Now comes the real fun. Using a favorite poem or lyrics to a song you like. Use any positioning elements you have read about in the chapter to create a right floating and a left floating element like that shown on page 279, figure 9.12. Save your page as lesson7c.html and upload it to the server. You may use inline or internal stylesheets (style sheets within the html document) for this exercise.

Lesson 7a & 7b are worth a total of 5 points, and lesson 7c is worth 5 points for a total of 10 points for this lesson.

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Lesson 8 - Forms

If I were to venture a guess, I think most all of you have filled out a form on the internet and then submitted it. It can be something as simple as a username and password, or something more like your address, phone number etc. Forms bri ng some power to the web by allowing your users to provide you with valuable information and for them to request information from you.

Creating the form is easy. You will learn about several form tags and elements. In order to get the data once the person has submitted it is a little more complicated. Form data is submitted usually using a CGI script. CGI stands for Common Gateway Interface. It is a fancy name for a computer program that receives the data from the form and processes it. The good news is that you do not need to worry about the cgi script. For this lesson we have one already build and sitting on our www.inst5260 server. All you need to know is how to connect your form to the CGI script. Our CGI script was written in the PERL language. If you end up building forms for your school, work, or clients, you should visit with your hosting provider or server administrator about the various cgi scripts they have available and the information you need to know to use them.

For our CGI script we have to know the http address of where it is located, and then we need to know what additional data we need to pass to it. Our CGI script processes the forms data then emails it to someone. You will

The idea here is that after the user hits the "submit" button on your form, they should be directed to a page that gives them some feedback. Something like, thanks for submitting the information", or well you get the idea. This follow-up page should have a way to get back to the form as well. Your follow-up page should be in the same directory as your form. But you know that by now.

In addition checkboxes for areas of Interest which include, Communicative Disorders and Deaf Education, Elementary Education, Family, Consumer, and Human Development, Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, Instructional Technology, Psychology, Secondary Education, Special Education and Rehabilitation

Can you find an appropriate graphic to display on the page.

A text box should be created to allow students to request any additional information. This text box should scroll and allow for several lines to be visible.

The form should be submitted for this activity to your email address. You will embed your email address as a hidden field within the form. You will also embed a hidden field for the subject of the email that cgi script will send to you.

Save your form as lesson8.html and upload to your FTP site. Be sure to test it out once online. Your link to the CGI will be as described above in the lesson. page. You should create a follow-up page and name it followup8.html and link it back to your form page for your end users.

This portion of the lesson is worth 8 points. Your page should look professional and be formatted and laid out properly.

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Now using your form that you created above, apply a few styles to it. These can be internal or external styles. You might use styles for positioning if you like. This part of the lesson is worth 2 points. You will get full credit for applying at least three styles within the form page. Rename your form to lesson8styles.html and upload it. Have it link to the same follow-up page you created above. No need for styles on the follow-up but you can add them if you like.

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Evaluation Activity

This is one of the best parts of the class. The opportunity for each of you to evaluate a website. In order to build great websites, it helps to look at what others are doing and evaluate them. Many web development companies will do an evaluation of their own website by a variety of methods. One easy way is to bring users in and sit them in front of a computer and have them click around and get feedback from them. Here is your chance to do just that. You will pick a website and then evaluate it. I have the outline and criteria below.

Outline

- 1. Site Overview. This section contains an overview of the site. who are you evaluating, what does the company or entity do, who is the purpose of the site.
- 2. Site Layout. Describe to someone who has not been to the site, how it is laid out. What are the colors, fonts and graphics. What is your first impression of the site. Clean. lots of white space. cluttered. too busy. What do you like about the site. What do you not like.
- 3. Navigation. Describe the menu structure and navigation. Is it hard or easy to find what you are looking for. Is the site easy to navigate. What do you like about the navigation.

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What do you not like.

4. Accessibility. Based on what you learned about accessible web sites, how accessible is it. You might consider running the Wave or Bobby tests on a few pages of the site and report your findings. Discuss any problems or issues you find.

5. Site Changes. based on your writings above, what would you do to improve the site. What changes would you make. What could be done to make the site better, more accessible, or easier to navigate. Any color or layout changes.

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Your assignment is to evaluate two different web sites. The first one you choose from a list of those provided. You will find an electronic sign up sheet located on the home page ("Evaluation Activity Sign up Sheet"). Once inside you chose from the list and "sign up" That takes care of your first evaluation.

The second one you choose any site you know of and want to evaluate. You do not need to sign up for this site, you just choose it and do the evaluation. Use the criteria listed above in the Outline for both of your evaluations. You may wish to look over the examples to see how students have put them together in the past.

Each evaluation is worth 25 points for a total of 50 points. You create a nice looking web page for each eval that you do. You may wish to type your evals into a word processor, check the spelling then copy the text over into your web page. Use appropriate tags and styles to format each eval. Provide a link to the website you are evaluating.

Make sure your evaluations are complete. "I would not change anything" is not acceptable in your evaluation. Please take the time on this assignment. Thrown together at the last minute evaluations are easy to spot and your grade will be adjusted accordingly. You will be judged for both the look and layout (proper HTML, good visual appeal) of your evaluation as well as your write-up.

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Save your evaluations as eval1.html and eval2.html and place them in a folder called evaluations and upload to the server.

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Final Project
