This guide describes how to install the PCL5 Printer Driver. For information about how to use the PostScript driver, see section "- PostScript Printer Driver -" in "Printer Driver User's Guide".

1.2 About Printer Driver

To print to the printer from the computer running operating system such as Windows, you need to have software called "Printer Driver."



To print to the printer from the PostScript printer driver, see "Printer Driver User's Guide – PostScript Printer Driver –".

1.2.1 Operating Environment of Printer Driver

The PCL5 Printer Driver can be installed in the computer running the following operating system:

- ◇ Microsoft Windows Vista (32-bit version) Japanese or English version
- ◇ Microsoft Windows Server 2003 (32-bit version) Japanese or English version
- ◇ Microsoft Windows XP (32-bit version) Japanese or English version
- ◇ Microsoft Windows 2000 Japanese or English version



Install individual printer drivers depending on the type of the operating system running on the computer to be used for printing.



Printer driver that runs on the operating system of the computer has the following roles:

- (1) Transmits printer information such as printable paper size and font included in the printer to application software.
- (2) Provides user interface, including selection of paper size, so that printer-specific function can be used.
- (3) When printing is requested from application software, document data on the application software is converted into print data that can be processed on the printer.

Chapter 2 Print from Windows Vista

To print from Windows Vista, you need to have the printer driver installed on the computer before starting operation. Use the following steps to check connection with a printer and install the printer driver:


2.1 Checking Connection with Printer

To print directly to the printer from Windows via a network, you need to build a TCP/IP environment for Windows and configure the LPR port settings. Check Windows network settings and connection between the printer and computer before installing the printer driver.




For information about how to configure the network for a printer unit, see the “User's Guide” that comes with the printer. Alternatively, to print to the printer from Windows via a network, you can print via a Windows shared printer other than the LPR printing described in this chapter.


- 1** Connect the printer and the computer to a network and turn on the printer.
- 2** Start Windows and log on with the user name with Administrator privilege.
- 3** First check Windows TCP/IP settings. Select [Start] - [Control Panel] and open the Control Panel.



- 4** Double-click the [Network and Sharing Center] icon. When the [Network and Sharing Center] icon is not displayed, select [Classic View] from the menu on the left hand side of the window.




- 5** Click the [View Status] in [Local Area Connection].








In the list of services, locate [Internet Protocol Version 4 (TCP/IPv4)] and click on it. Next, click on [Properties].



Next, verify that TCP/IP communication between the printer and Windows is enabled. Select [Command Prompt] menu from [Start] – [All Programs] – [Accessories].



When the [User Account Control] dialog box is displayed to check the user account before [Local Area Connection Properties] dialog box appears, click [Continue].

- 10** Enter the ping command as shown in the diagram.
Enter the IP address after the ping command.



- NOTE** For the printer's IP address, check what is displayed after selecting [Information] – [Network] on the control panel of the printer unit.

- 11** When the [Reply] message is displayed as shown in the diagram, verification of connection is complete. Proceed to installation of the printer driver.
When the "Request timed out" message is displayed, check the printer's power supply, network cable connection, and printer's or computer's TCP/IP settings again.



2.2 Adding LPR Port


Add a port for printer output, following the steps below:

1 Log on with the user name with Administrator privileges.


2 Select [Start] - [Control Panel] and open the Control Panel.




3 Double click on the [Printer] icon. When the [Printer] icon is not displayed, select [Classic View] from the menu on the left hand side of the window.




4 Right-click the printer menu on the left hand side of the window and select [Run as administrator] – [Server Properties]. The [Print Server Properties] dialog is displayed.



5 Select the [Ports] tab in the [Print Server Properties] dialog, and then click the [Add Port] button.





POINT Even if [LPR Port] is displayed in the list, be sure to select [Standard TCP/IP Port].



2.3 Installing Printer Driver


You can install the PCL5 Printer Driver that came with Windows Vista. Before installing the PCL5 Printer Driver, prepare the driver related files by downloading from dedicated Web site. Use the following steps to install the printer driver:

Make sure that the printer is turned on.


To configure settings for printers that are plugged into another computers and shared on the network, select [Add a network, wireless or Bluetooth printer]. Computers and printers on the network are located and displayed in tree format. Select the computer and shared printer to be used. It may take time to locate depending on the network environment.

- 6** Select printer connection port, and then click the [Next] button



2.5 Printer Sharing


To print from another client computer connected to a network via computer running Windows Vista, use the printer [Sharing] function.

- 1 Log on with the user name with Administrator privileges.
- 2 View [Sharing] properties, following the steps outlined in ["2.4 Displaying Properties"](#)




- 3 Select [Network and Sharing Center] and open the Control Panel. Open details of [Printer Sharing] from the [Sharing and Discovery] list and select [Turn on printer sharing]. Click the [Apply] button on the lower right side of the window to close the dialog.

If printer sharing is already enabled, go to 4.




When the [User Account Control] dialog is displayed for checking the user account after clicking [Apply] under [Network and Sharing Center], click [Continue].

- 4 Return to the [Sharing] properties dialog again and check the [Share this printer] to turn ON.



When the [User Account Control] dialog is displayed for checking the user account after checking [Share this printer], click [Continue].

- 5 Select [Share this printer] and click [OK]. You can change the [Share Name] to any name.



Sharing printer will be made available as a shared printer on the network. The shared printer on Windows receives data to be printed from a client computer and sends this printing data to the port specified in the [Port] properties.


To print from the client computer via a shared printer on Windows, you need to log on to Windows and to connect to a network which has shared printers.

2.6 Changing Print Port

If you need to change the printer destination due to a change in IP address or something similar, or you save data generated by a printer driver in a file, use the following steps to change the printer connection port.

1 Log on with the user name with Administrator privileges.

2 Display [Ports], following the steps outlined in ["2.4 Displaying Properties"](#)



3 Select the connection port from the [Print Port] list and click the [OK] button to close properties.




To save printing data generated by the printer driver in a file, select [FILE]. To add a new connection port, click [Add Port].


To check the server name and shared printer name that can be entered as port name, start [Network] on the Start menu. Locate the computer that can serve as a server from [Network]. When you double-click the icon to open the computer serving as a server, sharable printer names will be displayed.





- 1** Connect the printer and the computer to a network and turn on the printer.
- 2** Start Windows and log on with the user name with Administrator privilege.

Select [Share this printer] and enter the printer's shared name.
The client computer recognizes the name entered here as the "shared printer name".




Sharing printer will be made available as a shared printer on the network.
The shared printer on Windows receives data to be printed from a client computer and sends this printing data to the port specified in the [Port] properties. To print from the client computer via a shared printer on Windows, you need to log on to Windows and connect to a network which has shared printers.


Click [OK] to close Properties.



Clicking [Additional Drivers] under [Sharing] enables the printer driver to be stored on Windows, so that the printer driver can be automatically downloaded when requested by the client computer.



If you cannot configure [Sharing] settings, log on to Windows with the user name that has Administrator privileges. Select [Start] – [Settings] – [Network and Dialup Connections] to view [Properties] in [Local Area Connection]. Confirm that [File and Printer Sharing for Microsoft Networks] is included and the box is checked.



Configuring the printer driver settings enables you to print using different functions. This chapter describes various methods for configuring the PCL5 Printer Driver.


4.1 Printer-Specific Functions



This section describes setup items for printer-specific functions.


 To view [Printer Functions] in the printer driver, see Chapters 2 and 3 “Changing Printer Driver Default Values” and “Printing from Application Software”.

◇ Paper size (default: A4)

Select the paper size you want to print.

 Match [Paper Size] with paper settings on the printer control panel. Care should be taken not to include the length of feeding holes on both edges of the paper (1 inch = 25.4 mm) in [Paper Size]. An example of setting is given below:

◇ Print quality (default: 600 x 600 dots per inch)

Specify the printer resolution.

◇ Fixed orientation (default: Portrait)

Fix the print image in orientation of paper in set value regardless of the paper placed in the printer.
This option allows you to select [None] or [Landscape]. For more information, see ["4.3 Fixed Orientation"](#).

 Print direction may be inverted depending on application software. In such a case, configure this option.


◇ N-up (default: 1)

Specify the number of page images on one side of a sheet of paper. In this option, you can select [2].

◇ Rotate (default: Off)

Rotate print direction 180 degrees. In this option, you can select [On].

For example, in the following print image, you can obtain the same result as that in the direction paper feed by selecting [On] in this option.



4.2 Printing on Custom Size Paper

Select [Printer] – [Paper Source] – [Paper Size] on the printer operation panel to configure custom paper size. For information about how to operate the printer control panel, see the “User’s Guide” that came with the printer.

The diagrams (screens) used here give an example of Windows XP.

For Windows 2000:

Select [Start] – [Settings] – [Printers].






On the [Forms] tab, select [Create a new form], set the width and height, and click [Save Form].




Enter vertical direction from orientation of paper as [width] and horizontal direction as [height]. Adjust the width and height to match the paper size set on the printer control panel. At this time, subtract the length of feeding holes on both edges of the paper (1 inch = 25.4 mm). An example of setting is given below:

Paper Size (inch)	Feeding sample	Value to be set

14 x 11 Feeding from Long Edge		13 inch	11 inch
11 x 14 Feeding from Short Edge		10 inch	14 inch

When the custom size paper created is added to the paper list, the added custom size paper is displayed on the printer driver under [Paper Size]. However, it is displayed only when the size is within the range of [Width] and [Height] of paper that can be used as custom size. The range of [Width] and [Height] of paper that can be used as custom size varies depending on the printer. For more information, see the User’s Guide that came with the printer.



The following diagram shows an example of creating a paper size of 15 x 8.5 inches without margins.



In the application software, specify the paper size name that has been newly added. The newly added paper size may not function properly depending on the combination of application software and printer driver. Test print and make sure that it can be properly printed before using the newly added paper size.

4.3 Fixed Orientation

Fixed orientation is a function of printing an image in the same orientation as set values regardless of the paper placed in the printer. The set values of this option include “None”, “Portrait” (default), and “Landscape”.

When you select [None], the “Print Orientation” corresponds to the paper placed in the printer.
When you select [Portrait], the orientation is portrait regardless of the paper placed in the printer.
When you select [Landscape], the orientation is landscape regardless of the paper placed in the printer.

Orientation of paper represents orientation of the paper placed in the printer. “Portrait” means that the paper used is has a value of “width ≤ length” while “Landscape” means the paper used has a value of “width > length”.

The following table shows the print image using settings of fix orientation, orientation of paper, and print orientation. Direction of paper feed is set to upward.
