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About this book

This book provides instructions for installing and configuring IBM® Software Configuration and Library Manager (SCLM) Administrator Toolkit.

This book is designed to help SCLM project administrators and installation personnel perform these tasks:

- Plan for and install SCLM Administrator Toolkit
- Customize the SCLM Administrator Toolkit environment
- Use SCLM Administrator Toolkit with other products comprising IBM's SCLM Suite.

This manual is a companion to the *IBM SCLM Administrator Toolkit: User's Guide*, SC31-6571. The User's Guide provides information required to use the SCLM Administrator Toolkit to define, modify, and administer SCLM projects from either a client workstation or host ISPF panels, and to administer IBM Enhanced Access Control for SCLM for z/OS® from a client workstation. This manual also contains the product messages.

This book is intended for those persons responsible for installing and customizing SCLM Administrator Toolkit and assumes a working knowledge of:

- The z/OS operating system
- IBM Eclipse SDK (IES) 3.0 or higher
- ISPF
- SCLM
- SMP/E
- RACF®, if administering IBM Enhanced Access Control for SCLM for z/OS
- TCP/IP

Accessibility features

These guides describe how to use ISPF, including the use of keyboard shortcuts or function keys (PF keys), include the default settings for the PF keys, and explain how to modify their functions.

Navigating in a workstation panel

When you use the Tab key to navigate through a workstation panel, as you move from field to field, one of the letters in each of the descriptions is underlined. This provides a keyboard shortcut to the field in question. This behavior does not occur when using the mouse to select a field on the panel.

Copying and pasting while using the workstation interface

If you want to copy information from a text field or paste information into a text field, place your cursor in the field in question. To copy, select the text to be copied, right-click in the text field, and select **Copy** from the pop-up menu. To paste information into a text field, place your cursor into the field in question, right-click, and select **Paste** from the pop-up menu. **Ctrl+C** and **Ctrl+A**, respectively, copy selected text or all text to the clipboard for your use. **Ctrl+V** pastes the text to a place you select.

What's new in Version 2.1

SCLM Administrator Toolkit Version 2.1 provides the following new or improved functionality:

- A Remote Migration Wizard is available from the workstation and assists you in migrating workstation-based files into an SCLM project and placing them under SCLM control. Once launched, the Remote Migration Wizard copies the remote assets you selected into the target SCLM-managed library, updates an accounting file, and displays a report that details the results of the migration.
- Support for copybooks permits you to assign reusable elements of a project definition to copybooks where they can be used by other projects.
- When importing an SCLM project, the product discovers existing group/type data sets and automatically adds them to the project.
- Custom user macros can now be included within your project definition.
- The Language Definition Wizard has been enhanced by replacing the free-form editor with intelligent Wizard panels. In addition, context sensitive fields throughout the Wizard maintain the consistency of the definition. The information supplied using the Language Definition Wizard is more easily made available to other Wizards for their use.
- New VSAM tasks are distributed with the project. Additional default groups and types have also been added.
- A Quick Navigation facility has been added to the ISPF interface to improve the speed and flexibility of navigating through the host components.
- Performance for large projects is improved.
- A set of ISPF panels assist you in downloading and installing the workstation client.
- At the workstation, in addition to using COPY and PASTE from a pop-up menu, you may now use **Ctrl+C** and **Ctrl+A**, respectively, to copy selected text or all text to the clipboard. **Ctrl+V** pastes the text to a place you select.
- New preferences are provided to assist you in determining and controlling the size of log files.
- Other improvements have added to enhance the product's ease of use and performance.

In this current *Installation and Customization Guide*, a program has been added that simplifies the customization of `ispf.sh` and `setup.sh`. You may, however, continue to customize these scripts manually, if you so desire.

A new Preferences page in RSE 6.0.3 permits you to control file cache size and clear the cache. If you do so while you have an open project, you will impact your ability to

correctly save your project. Thus, you must not clear the cache while you have projects open in SCLM Administrator Toolkit.

Part 1. Introduction

This part describes the IBM Software Configuration and Library Manager (SCLM) Administrator Toolkit.

Chapter 1. About the SCLM Administrator Toolkit

IBM's SCLM is a program that provides software configuration and library management for the z/OS platform. Using the SCLM Administrator Toolkit, you can address the complexity of setting up an SCLM project initially, performing day-to-day project maintenance, and managing access control from a workstation. It provides the simplicity and functionality you need at an attractive cost.

Because SCLM Administrator Toolkit provides both a GUI and an ISPF interface, you can work in the environment in which you're most comfortable. While SCLM Administrator Toolkit functions run primarily in the foreground, the product supports both batch and online execution for project creation, project cloning, and VSAM file maintenance. You can choose immediate response when you require it, or can defer processing to a more convenient time. To choose either immediate or deferred processing when using the workstation, select **Preferences > SCLM Administrator Toolkit** from the Window pull-down. When using ISPF, you can specify this information by selecting the **Settings** option on the SCLM Main Menu.

You can get started easily with SCLM Administrator Toolkit by invoking the SCLM Project Wizard, either from a workstation or from an ISPF host session, to create a new project or modify an existing one. When creating a new project, the fields in the Project Wizard will be populated with default values. When modifying an existing project, the fields contain that project's defined values.

Using the Project Wizard, you can define the elements that comprise your project. When using the workstation, your changes are saved to the host when you press the **Save** button on the menu bar. The changes are not saved locally. If you attempt to close your project while you have unsaved changes, SCLM Administrator Toolkit will prompt you to save before you close. As you navigate through the panels of the Project Wizard using ISPF, that data is saved at the host.

Thus, at any time, you can choose to stop work before you have fully defined the project. SCLM Administrator Toolkit saves your work so that you can pick it up in a later session.

When defining a group using the workstation interface, you can drag and drop boxes around your display, building a network of linked boxes much like an organization chart. Each box represents an SCLM group. Once you have completed your definition, SCLM Administrator Toolkit generates default authorization codes and PROMOTE definitions, which you can modify if you so choose. A process to add or modify groups is also available at the host using ISPF panels.

Using the Project Wizard, you can configure any user exits you may require, including the Breeze user exits, if you have installed Breeze. You can add language types, or you can modify them using the Language Definition Wizard.

Other functions provided by the SCLM Administrator Toolkit include:

- The ability to update and run your VSAM tasks and perform VSAM file maintenance
- The ability to create architecture definitions manually or by importing them from existing JCL or an existing Load Module, guided by the Architecture Definition Wizard
- The ability to easily clone an existing project and, if you so desire, its data

- The ability to update and manage SCLM projects that were not created using SCLM Administrator Toolkit

Support for Enhanced Access Control for SCLM Administration

Enhanced Access Control for SCLM is a program that enhances RACF security. The SCLM Administrator Toolkit assists you in administering Enhanced Access Control for SCLM by:

- Maintaining existing RACF Data Set Profiles, Enhanced Access Control for SCLM Rules Files, Enhanced Access Control for SCLM Profile Access Rules, and Enhanced Access Control for SCLM Applications
- Displaying a list of Enhanced Access Control for SCLM Violations

For additional information about the Enhanced Access Control for SCLM administration tasks supported by SCLM Administrator Toolkit, see the *SCLM Administrator Toolkit User's Guide*.

Hardware and software requirements

The sections that follow provide an overview of the hardware and software requirements to run SCLM Administrator Toolkit. Current and complete information, including any required APARs and PTFs, is found in the *SCLM Administrator Toolkit Program Directory*.

Note: When using the Linux and UNIX ports, SCLM Administrator Toolkit is an X-Client Application. It may be sensitive to the X-Server being used if this is not the X-Server located on the system.

Hardware requirements

Required hardware is any hardware environment that supports the required software as described in "Software requirements".

Software requirements

The software required to run SCLM Administrator Toolkit is as follows:

- XML Toolkit for z/OS V1.7
- J2RE V1.4.2 IBM J9
- z/OS V1.4.2 or later
- IBM SMP/E for z/OS V3.2.0 or later

Note: IBM Eclipse SDK (IES) 3.0 or higher is required to run SCLM Administrator Toolkit. If you do not already have IBM Eclipse SDK installed, it is installed as part of the SCLM Administrator Toolkit installation process. Remote Systems Explorer (RSE) must be at level 6.3.1.

Part 2. Installation and Customization

This part describes planning for the installation and customization of SCLM Administrator Toolkit and performing the installation and customization activities that you will need to undertake. Typically, the installation and customization activities on the host are the responsibility of a systems programmer, while installing and customizing each workstation client is the responsibility of that client's user.

Chapter 2. Planning for Installation

Before installing and customizing SCLM Administrator Toolkit, there are decisions you should make and planning activities you should undertake. Various people at your site may need to be involved in these decision and planning activities.

Gather the required information

SCLM Administrator Toolkit provides several kinds of information that will aid you with installation and customization. One is this Installation and Customization Guide. In addition to this Guide, you should gather together the materials you will need:

- The product's Program Directory for information about unloading the product from the distribution media onto your system. The Program Directory explains the program materials you have received, installation requirements and considerations, and detailed instructions for installing under SMP/E.
- The Read-me document. If there is any last-minute information you need, a Read-me will be included as part of the installation package.
- Manuals from other product libraries that may be needed. A Bibliography is included in this manual that lists documentation that may be of assistance when installing and customizing SCLM Administrator Toolkit.

Decide on the interface you will use

SCLM Administrator Toolkit provides two interfaces, a GUI-compliant workstation client and a host-based ISPF interface. While you can work on an SCLM Administrator Toolkit session from the client and later complete your work at the host, or vice versa, it is more likely that each user will pick a preferred method of interfacing with SCLM Administrator Toolkit.

Install any required products and check the maintenance level of your installed products

Irrespective of whether you will use the ISPF interface or the workstation-based client GUI interface, you should ensure that your system has installed the following products and the current maintenance has been applied for:

- SCLM
- ISPF
- TSO
- TCP/IP
- UNIX System Services
- Java Runtime Environment 1.4 or above. Note that this must be available before installing your workstation client.
- If using the workstation client, the software specific to the workstation that will be used
- XML Toolkit for z/OS Version 1.7

Note that if you will use SCLM Administrator Toolkit from the workstation, you must install the SCLM Administrator Toolkit client at the version 2.1 level. If you have a previous version of the client workstation component, you must reinstall the client.

Customize the software

Ideally, the prerequisite software has been customized prior to installing the SCLM Administrator Toolkit. The required customization is listed below, with details provided later in this manual.

- CEE.SCEERUN and CEE.SCEERUN2 must be link-listed
- *<hilev>*SAUZLOAD and the XML LOADLIBs must be APF-authorized
- OMVS must be configured and operational prior to using the GUI client at a workstation
- Each user must have an OMVS segment in RACF, with a valid shell and home directory specified.
- Each user's uid must be unique and non-zero.
- Each user must have write authority to /tmp.
- Users that will create language definitions or architecture definitions from JCL must have a HOLD CLASS specified in the TSO segment of their RACF user profile
- Each user must have the ability to specify a region size of 60000 on the TSO logon screen if using the ISPF interface and the XML Toolkit V1R7 is used.
- Users working with the Enhanced Access Control-specific features of SCLM Administrator Toolkit must have RACF SPECIAL authority specified in their RACF user profiles.

Involve the appropriate people

In preparing to install and customize the product, you should involve the necessary people in planning the installation-- your site's personnel responsible for:

- TCP/IP customization
- Security administration
- UNIX System Services configuration

Chapter 3. Installing and Customizing the Host Component

This chapter provides information about the tasks that you must perform to install and customize the host component of the SCLM Administrator Toolkit.

The following tasks typically are performed by a systems programmer:

1. Install SCLM Administrator Toolkit on your MVS™ system using SMP/E.
2. Customize your MVS system for the product.
3. Customize UNIX System Services (USS) and RACF.
4. Optionally, customize IBM Workload Manager (WLM).
5. If you will use the workstation interface, either customize TCP/IP to invoke REXEC or install the RSE daemon.
6. Ensure that each SCLM Administrator Toolkit user is properly configured to use the product.

If you will use only the host interface to SCLM Administrator Toolkit, you can stop here and begin using ISPF to access the product panels.

If you plan to use the workstation client, complete the tasks above and then:

1. Download and install the SCLM Administrator Toolkit client. An option is available from the SCLM Administrator Toolkit to assist you with this task.
2. Customize the client.

Because enterprises vary in their installation requirements, the customization information in this chapter may not be an exhaustive list of the changes required to be made to your installation. Information about installing and customizing the workstation component can be found in Chapter 5, "Installing and Configuring the Workstation Client," on page 27.

SMP/E installation

Follow the directions in the Program Directory to install SCLM Administrator Toolkit on z/OS. Then follow the directions in this chapter to install and customize the MVS component of the SCLM Administrator Toolkit.

Installing and customizing the MVS component

After SCLM Administrator Toolkit has been installed, the following post-installation steps should be performed.

The recommended directory into which to install SCLM Administrator Toolkit is */usr/lpp/*.

The library *<hilev>.SAUZLOAD*, as well as AUZ170, must be link-listed, or the member AUZAUTH must be copied into a link-listed library and 'F LLA,REFRESH' entered on the MVS system console

Note: When customizing the various parameters in a CLIST, you must ensure that the case of the values you enter exactly matches the case of the corresponding information in your Hierarchical File System (HFS) directory. Thus, for example, if the HFS directory where SCLM Administrator Toolkit resides is `/usr/lpp/AUZ/v210/bin`, you must ensure that your entry for the AUZ CLIST SPATH shows `usr`, `lpp`, `v210`, and `bin` in lower-case letters, and `AUZ` in upper-case letters.

APF authorization

`<hilev>.SAUZLOAD` and the XML LOADLIBs must be APF-authorized.

Customizing AUZUNPAX

The AUZUNPAX job found in AUZ..SAUZSAMP installs the USS components in an HFS. This HFS must have at least 30MB of space available.

The AUZUNPAX job must be run by a user who can become root via the SU command.

If you have installed the product into a directory other than `/usr/lpp/AUZ`, you will need to modify AUZUNPAX. The directory you specify as the location in which to place the contents of `<hilev>.SAUZSAMP(AUZPAX)` must be one level above `/AUZ/`, since the installation process creates the AUZ subdirectory and *its* subdirectories (see the listing for AUZUNPAX, below). In the listing, you may need to modify the following statements:

- `INSTALL_DIR=/usr/lpp`
- `pax -rvf"// 'AUZ.SAUZSAMP(AUZPAX) ' "`

You may also need to modify the CLASS, MSGCLASS, MSGLEVEL, NOTIFY, USER, GROUP, and PASSWORD parameters specified for the job.

Customization required to modify the SCLM Main Menu

After SCLM Administrator Toolkit has been installed, it is added to a modified SCLM Main Menu as Option 8. To display the modified SCLM Main Menu in place of the standard SCLM Main Menu, you must take the following steps:

If you are running z/OS 1.5 or earlier:

1. Customize the job AUZ.SAUZSAMP(AUZFLMRN) for your installation. This job renames the AUZFLMD panel member to FLMDMN and is needed to display the SCLM Main Menu with the SCLM Administrator Toolkit option.
2. Run job AUZ.SAUZSAMP(AUZFLMRN).
3. Modify your users' logon PROCs so that AUZ.SAUZPENU is placed ahead of ISP.SISPPENU in the ISPPLIB concatenation. Alternatively, copy AUZ.SAUZSAMP(FLMDMN) to such a library. This causes the SCLM Administrator Toolkit version of FLMDMN to be used instead of the version provided with ISPF.

If you are running z/OS 1.6 or later:

1. Customize the job AUZ.SAUZSAMP(AUZFLM16) for your installation. These jobs rename the AUZFLMD panel member to FLMDMN and one or the other is

needed to display the SCLM Main Menu with the SCLM Administrator Toolkit option.

2. Run job AUZ.SAUZSAMP(AUZFLM16).
3. Modify your users' logon PROCs so that AUZ.SAUZPENU is placed ahead of ISP.SISPPENU in the ISPPLIB concatenation. Alternatively, copy AUZ.SAUZSAMP(FLMDMN) to such a library. This causes the SCLM Administrator Toolkit version of FLMDMN to be used instead of the version provided with ISPF.

Note: Files AUZ.SAUZSAMP(AUZFLMRN) and AUZ.SAUZSAMP(AUZFLM16) contain both lower and upper case characters. The case of the text must be preserved. Also, the file must always be saved NONUM and some lines may have the backslash (\) character in column 80. These must also be preserved.

If you have previously modified the SCLM Main Menu and want to preserve your changes, you can add **Option 8 SCLM Administrator Toolkit** to your modified Main Menu instead of performing the above customization. Option 8 must execute the TSO command **TSO AUZ**.

If you are running with z/OS Version 1.6 or later, you can choose whether to issue TSO and SCLM commands using the standard method of entry or whether you will use Easy Cmds. The Easy Cmds option appears as option **6A** on the modified SCLM Main Menu.

Customizing the AUZ CLISTs

To start the SCLM Administrator Toolkit user interface, you run the SCLM Administrator Toolkit CLISTs. Before doing so, you must first customize two CLISTs, AUZ and AUZCLIST, located in the SAUZSAMP sample library, to work in your environment. Then, copy the customized CLISTs from AUZ.SAUZSAMP to a CLIST library that is in all users' SYSPROC concatenation for CLISTs, or modify each user's logon procedure to include AUZ.SAUZSAMP in the concatenation.

Note: When customizing the various parameters in a CLIST, you must ensure that the case of the values you enter exactly matches the case of the corresponding information in your Hierarchical File System (HFS) directory. Thus, for example, if the HFS directory where SCLM Administrator Toolkit resides is /usr/lpp/AUZ/v210/bin, you must ensure that your entry for the AUZ CLIST SPATH shows usr, lpp, v210, and bin in lower-case letters, and AUZ in upper-case letters.

These files contain both lower and upper case characters. The case of the text must be preserved. Also, the file must always be saved NONUM and some lines may have the backslash (\) character in column 80. These must also be preserved.

SCLM Administrator Toolkit CLIST member AUZ

The statements comprising member AUZ execute the contents of member AUZCLIST. The statements within member AUZ allow you to start the SCLM Administrator Toolkit user interface CLIST, AUZCLIST, as a separate application. This enables you to continue your ISPF session should you encounter a problem with this particular instance of SCLM Administrator Toolkit. The contents of the SCLM Administrator Toolkit CLIST member AUZ are shown below. You should note that this CLIST as

distributed with the product is the most current version and may differ slightly from the listing presented here.

To customize member AUZ, perform the following steps:

1. Copy the AUZ and AUZCLIST members to a CLIST library that is included in all users' SYSPROC concatenation. You must do so in order to execute the AUZ CLIST using TSO.
2. In the PROC 0 CLISTLIB(*name*) statement, specify the name of the data set to which the AUZCLIST member was copied. For example,

SCLM Administrator Toolkit CLIST member AUZCLIST

AUZCLIST starts the SCLM Administrator Toolkit user interface. The contents of the SCLM Administrator Toolkit member AUZCLIST are shown below. You should note that this CLIST as distributed with the product is the most current version and may differ slightly from the listing presented here.

To customize member AUZCLIST, alter the first lines of the CLIST as, for example:

Set the variables HILEVEL, XMLDSN, AUZNAME, and SPATH to the appropriate values.

- HILEVEL is the high level qualifier that contains the AUZ datasets.
- XMLDSN is the data set name of the load library containing the XML toolkit dynamic link libraries.
- AUZNAME is the name of the program to drive the ISPF interface. The variable should be AUZ170 for installations using the XML toolkit V1R7.
- SPATH is the path to the HFS system where scripts have been installed. (Note that the value in the parentheses requires a double slash (//) at the beginning of the variable.)

You need to ensure that any data set names after variable substitution do not exceed 44 characters in length.

Customizing the USS components

The components of the SCLM Administrator Toolkit that operate under UNIX System Services are stored in the directories listed below. The path information is case-sensitive.

- *<install-directory>/AUZ/v210/bin/*
- *<install-directory>/AUZ/v210/log/*
- *<install-directory>/AUZ/v210/rseserver631/*
- *<install-directory>/AUZ/v210/xsl/*

In addition to the foregoing, you must verify that the following installation requirements are met:

- */tmp* must be accessible to and writable by all users

- /usr/lpp/AUZ/v210/log must be writable by all users. If the log directory is relocated, the relocated directory must be writable by all users.
- /usr/lpp/AUZ/v210/bin/auzauth
 - is of size 0
 - is executable
 - has the *t* bit set when viewed with 'ls -la/usr/lpp/AUZ/v210/bin/auzauth'.
- /usr/lpp/AUZ/v210/rseserver631/auth has the *p* bit set when viewed with 'ls -la/usr/lpp/AUZ/v210/rseserver631/auth'

You must also decide whether you will use REXEC or the RSE daemon. If you will use REXEC, see “Customizing TCP/IP to invoke REXEC” on page 19. If you plan to use the RSE daemon, see “Customization for the RSE daemon” on page 20.

Log directory permissions

Review the permissions for the log directory and ensure that:

- The permissions for the log directory must be 777
- The file rexx.sh.log permissions must be 777

The log directory permissions are set by AUZUNPAX and the file permissions are set by the first user of the system.

Note: If the first user is root, the file permissions for rexx.sh.log could be other than 777 and will need to be adjusted.

Customizing IBM Workload Manager (WLM)

In order to prevent UNIX System Services scripts from taking over your system, it is recommended that you define a WLM Service Class for Unix System Services that has the same performance characteristics as low-priority batch. However, you may choose to define your USS service class as having another priority, depending on the characteristics of your enterprise’s installation.

Customizing setup.sh and ispf.sh

Customization may be required in the scripts setup.sh and ispf.sh.

- setup.sh customization is always required.
- ispf.sh customization is required only if you are using the workstation client.

You can run a batch program to perform the customization as described in “Batch program to customize setup.sh and ispf.sh” on page 15. If you would prefer to customize these two scripts by hand, you can follow the directions contained within the scripts themselves.

The statements that may need to be changed are:

- export AUZ_MVS_REXX_EXECLIB="AUZ.WRK0210.SAUZEXEC"

This statement contains the environment variables for the SCLM Administrator Toolkit.
- export AUZ_MVS_REXX_LOADLIB="AUZ.WRK0210.SAUZLOAD"
- export AUZ_MVS_REXX_ISPSLIB="AUZ.WRK0210.ISPSLIB"
- export AUZ_MVS_TRANSLATE_FILENAME_BASE="AUZ.WRK0110.LSTRANS"

- export AUZ_JAVA_SERVICES_PORT='4445'
- export AUZ_HOME=/usr/lpp/AUZ/v210
- export AUZ_LOG=/usr/lpp/AUZ/v210/log
- export JAVA_HOME=/usr/lpp/java/IBM/J1.4

JAVA_HOME is required only if you will run the workstation part of SCLM Administrator Toolkit. If Java™ is not installed in the usual directory, you must modify this statement to point to the installation directory for Java.

- export XML_VERSION="V1R7M0"
- export XML_HOME=/usr/lpp/ixm/IBM

XML_HOME defines the location where the XML toolkit for z/OS was installed and should be modified as appropriate for your installation.

Batch program to customize setup.sh and ispf.sh

If you want to customize setup.sh and ispf.sh using the batch program provided by SCLM Administrator Toolkit, use job AUZCUSTJ found in the AUZ.SAUZSAMP library.

Alternatively, should you wish to manually customize setup.sh and ispf.sh, follow the instructions provided with those scripts in the previous section entitled “Customizing setup.sh and ispf.sh” on page 14 .

Note: In order to run this batch customization, the user ID under which this program is run must have root authority.

Customizing setup.sh

If you prefer to customize setup.sh by hand, you can do so by following the instructions imbedded in the script. Alternatively, you can run a program to perform this customization. See “Batch program to customize setup.sh and ispf.sh”. A listing of setup.sh is included here for your reference. You should note that the script as distributed with the product is the most current version and may differ slightly from the listings presented here.

Customizing ispf.sh

It may also be necessary to customize the script `ispf.sh` for your installation. If you prefer to customize `ispf.sh` by hand, you can do so by following the instructions imbedded in the script. Alternatively, you can run a program to perform this customization. See “Batch program to customize `setup.sh` and `ispf.sh`” on page 15. You should note that this script as distributed with the product is the most current version and may differ slightly from the listing presented here.

If you are performing a manual customization, the statements that should be reviewed and possibly changed are:

- export TSOALLOC=ispprof:ispplib:ispmlib:isptlib:ispllib:ispslib:\
isptabl:isplog:sysexec
- export isptabl="alloc new unit (sysvio) space (1,1) cyl dir(5) \
recfm (f, b) lrecl (80) blksize (3120)"
- export ispplib=SYS1.SBPXPENU:ISP.SISPPENU
- export ispmlib=SYS1.SBPXMENU:ISP.SISPMENU
- export isptlib=ISP.SISPTENU
- export ispslib=ISP.SISPSENU
- export ispllib=SYS1.LINKLIB:ISP.SISPLOAD
- export sysexec=SYS1.SBPXEXEC:\${AUZ_MVS_REXX_EXECLIB}

Note: By default, the ISPF log is not written to the spool. If you want to see the log in the spool then you must:

- Comment out the line: export isplog="alloc dummy"
- Uncomment the line: #export isplog="alloc sysout(a) recfm(v,a) lrecl(125)
blksize(129)"

Customizing PARMLIB

If you have not done so already, make the following PARMLIB changes:

- CEE.SCEERUN and CEE.SCEERUN2 must be link-listed
- <hilev>.SAUZLOAD must be APF-authorized

Customizing TCP/IP to invoke REXEC

If you have chosen to use REXEC rather than the RSE daemon, you will need to perform this customization step. To configure and activate OMVS REXEC, you must perform the following tasks:

1. Deactivate MVSRSERVE from ports 512 and 514 and relocate to alternate ports, for example, 1512 and 1514. Guidance on setting up orexecd, the remote execution server daemon, can be found in the most recent versions of:
 - *z/OS Communications Server: IP Configuration Guide*, the chapter entitled "Remote Execution," as well as in "Appendix A: Setting up the inetd configuration file."
 - *z/OS Communications Server: IP Configuration Reference*, the chapter entitled "Remote execution server."

You should also review any informational APARS on this topic.

2. Modify TCPIP.DATA to AUTOLOG INETD. An example follows:

```
AUTOLOG 5
  FTPD JOBNAME FTPD1 L; FTP Server
  INETD JOBNAME INETD1 ; INETD Server
  OSNMPD ; SNMP Agent Server
  SNMPQE ; SNMP Client

3. Reserve ports 512 and 513 to INETD1 as follows:

512 TCP INETD1 ; OE RLOGIN SERVER
513 TCP INETD1 ; OE RLOGIN SERVER
```

The user under which INETD1 runs must have read access to the BPX.DAEMON profile in the FACILITY class.

4. Create a started task to run in the INETD daemon (inetd) under BPXBATCH. An example follows:

//STDENV DD DSN=TCPIP.TCPPARMS(INETDENV),DISP=SHR

5. Populate /etc/services with valid values including the values for exec and login as shown below:

Note: A sample copy of /etc/services is provided in /usr/lpp/tcpip/samples.

6. Modify /etc/inetd.conf so that the lines for exec and login read as follows:

login stream tcp nowait OMVSKERN /usr/sbin/rlogind rlogind -m
exec stream tcp nowait OMVSKERN /usr/sbin/orexecd orexecd -l -v
```

The format of the `inetd.conf` file is specified in the *z/OS UNIX System Services Command Reference*, the chapter entitled "INETD `inetd` daemon -- Provide Internet Service Management."

Customization for the Java Services process

This customization step involves installing the startup for the Java Services process, a component of SCLM Administrator Toolkit. The Java Services process component is required both for ISPF and GUI operation.

Your systems programmer should add the following to `/etc/rc`, as root:

```
$ nohup <base install directory/rseserver631>/bin/start_auz_daemons.sh &
```

To use an automated process: Two jobs have been provided to automate the process of customizing the Java Services. These are:

- **AUZJSTOP** -- This job stops the Java daemons.
- **AUZJSTAR** -- This job starts the Java daemons.

Both of these jobs are found in `AUZ.SAUZSAMP`, the sample library distributed with SCLM Administrator Toolkit.

To perform the actions manually: You can continue to perform the Java Services customization manually. You can verify java services is available by issuing:

```
$ netstat -a | grep <port number> where <port number> defaults to 4445
```

If Java Services ever needs to be restarted manually, issue:

```
$ <base install directory>/bin/start_jsp.sh
```

By default, SCLM Administrator Toolkit Java Services listens on port 4445. If you want to use a different port, run the `AUZCUSTJ` job in `AUZ.SAUZSAMP` and modify the `AUZ_JAVA_SERVICES_PORT`.

Customization for the RSE daemon

If you have chosen to use the RSE daemon rather than `REXEC`, you will need to perform this customization step. Your systems programmer should execute the following, as root:

```
$ cd <base install directory/rseserver631>
$ extattr +p auth
```

To use an automated process: Two jobs have been provided to automate the process of customizing the RSE daemon. These are:

- **AUZRSE** -- This job grants extended attributes to `auth.sh`, which is needed by the daemon, and uncomments RSE lines in the daemon's start and stop scripts.
- **AUZRLOG** -- This job sets appropriate permission bits on `rexx.sh.log`.

Both of these jobs are found in `AUZ.SAUZSAMP`, the sample library distributed with SCLM Administrator Toolkit.

To perform the customization manually: To perform the customization manually, follow the process described below:

1. Start the RSE daemon at boot time by modifying your USS initialization shell script. Edit the following lines to remove the pound sign (`#`) in the `start_auz_daemons.sh` script:


```
# Start RSE connection daemon
<base install directory/rseserver631>/daemon.zseries.sh &
sleep 5
```

2. By default, the RSE daemon listens on port 4035. If you want to use a different port, add that port number to the second line of the example above. This example below adds port 9000:

```
<base install directory/rseserver631>/daemon.zseries.sh 9000 &
```

3. If you change the port number to which the RSE daemon listens, you must also specify this changed port number in the appropriate field when you are using the client workstation to create a new connection (see “Configuring the client component” on page 29).

Note: After the RSE daemon has been installed, the appropriate extended attributes must be set for the user authorization program. You will need permission to the BPX.FILEATTR.PROGCTL facility class.

Customizing RACF

The following changes are required to be made to RACF to run SCLM Administrator Toolkit.

Specifying TSO(HOLDCLASS) under RACF

SCLM Administrator Toolkit requires that users have a HOLDCLASS specified in their TSO segment in order to create language definitions and architecture definitions from JCL. Thus, the system’s security administrator must take action to update each user’s RACF profile. One of the following methods can be used:

- When adding or changing a user ID:
 1. Access RACF Option 4 USER PROFILES AND YOUR OWN PASSWORD
 2. On the second (ADD AN ID) or third (CHANGE AN ID) RACF panel, type **YES** on the line
TO ADD OPTIONAL INFORMATION, ENTER YES ===>
 3. Scroll to and select
__TSO PARAMETERS
 4. Scroll to the following and type an appropriate class
Change Hold Class (HOLDCLASS__ 1-9, A-Z, or blank
- Alternatively, from the RACF command line, enter
ALU xxxxxxxxTSO (HOLDCLASS(c))
where xxxxxxxx is the user ID to be updated and c is an appropriate class.

Specifying TSO region size under RACF

SCLM Administrator Toolkit requires that users specify a maximum size value for their TSO region of at least 60000 if using XML toolkit V1R7.

Because the amount of memory below the line may be limited, a value of 20000 or greater is recommended. The system’s security administrator must take action to update each user’s RACF profile. One of the following methods can be used:

- When adding or changing a user ID:
 1. Access RACF Option 4 USER PROFILES AND YOUR OWN PASSWORD

2. On the second (ADD AN ID) or third (CHANGE AN ID) RACF panel, type **YES** on the line
TO ADD OPTIONAL INFORMATION, ENTER YES ==>
 3. Scroll to and select ___TSO PARAMETERS
 4. Scroll to the following and type an appropriate class
Change Maximum Region Size (MAXSIZE)_____0-2096128
- Alternatively, from the RACF command line, enter
ALU xxxxxxxxTSO (MAXSIZE(nnnnn))
where xxxxxxxx is the userID to be updated and nnnnnn is 60000 when using XML toolkit V1R7.

Modifying a user's OMVS segment

Each user that is to use the SCLM Administrator Toolkit must have a USS OMVS segment that specifies:

- A maximum process size set to **NONE**
- A valid home directory
- A valid shell
- A valid non-zero uid. The user id must be unique for each user.
- RACF SPECIAL authority, if and only if that user will administer Enhanced Access Control for SCLM.

Customization required if you will migrate remote assets into SCLM

If you will use the SCLM Administrator Toolkit's Remote Migration Wizard to place workstation objects under SCLM control, you will need to run an optional VSAM file definition job named AUZXLVSM located in the <hilev>.SAUZSAMP library.

You must set the transfer mode to binary when used to send files to the host from the workstation. For information on performing this task, see "Setting Remote Systems Explorer preferences" on page 33.

Customization required if you will obtain and view Enhanced Access Control for SCLM violations

If you are using Enhanced Access Control for SCLM and you want to be able to list violations, the full SMP/E life cycle for the Enhanced Access Control for SCLM product must be completed. Module HSS.AHSSLOAD(HSSGDBUF), a component of Enhanced Access Control for SCLM that is used to obtain violations, must be available to the host components of SCLM Administrator Toolkit. This module can be found in HSS.AHSSLOAD after you have performed an SMP/E ACCEPT on Enhanced Access Control for SCLM. Either copy this module to AUZ.SAUZLOAD or to another link-listed library, or place HSS.AHSSLOAD in the link list.

Starting an SCLM Administrator Toolkit host session

If you intend to use only the host component of the SCLM Administrator Toolkit, you can now begin a host session as described in Chapter 6, "Starting an SCLM Administrator Toolkit Session," on page 37.

Using the host-based download wizard to download the workstation component

SCLM Administrator Toolkit provides a wizard, available from the host system using ISPF, to assist you in downloading the workstation component. Using the wizard, you can specify the following:

- Whether you want to download the workstation component using FTP
- The workstation type to which the component will be downloaded (see Table 1 on page 27).
- The directory to copy the downloaded file to and the data set from which the file will be copied. You are given the option to create the workstation directory as part of the download process.

To download the workstation client, start an SCLM Administrator Toolkit host session. From the Main Menu, select option 4, **FTP**.

Downloading using FTP

If you will use FTP, you must ensure that:

- A TCP/IP connection exists between the z/OS host and the workstation
- An FTP server is running on the workstation

If you have specified that FTP is to be used as the download method, you must also specify:

- The IP address or host name of the workstation
- The logon ID and password of the user to whom the workstation component will be addressed

Downloading manually

If you choose to download the workstation component manually, you may do so.

Ensure that you have set the transfer mode to binary.

Complete the installation by:

1. Running the installation program on your workstation
2. Running the PTF installation program on your workstation if necessary

Chapter 4. The Installation Verification Program

An installation verification program (IVP) that can be run from USS, TSO-E, and batch is shipped with SCLM Administrator Toolkit. This job, AUZIVPJ, can be found in the product's *<hilev>*.SAUZSAMP library.

Running the installation verification program

When running the IVP, you must *not* be the root user. To run the IVP in batch mode, you will need to perform the following customization on this file:

- The AUZ installation path must be specified on the BPXBATCH PARM line.
- You will need to review the STDENV parameters as follows:
 - TESTGUI=Y|N will run a communications layer test of workstation connectivity. Specify N if you are using only ISPF.
 - Use TESTHLQ=*<hlq>* to set the valid high level qualifier for test project use (single level HLQ only).
 - Use SISPMACS=*<sispmacs dsn>* to set the SISPMACS data set (normally ISP.SISPMACS).
 - Use PSWDDSN=*<password dsn>* to specify a SAM data set name that contains your MVS password on line 1 in free format. Ensure that it is RACF-protected. This step is not required if you specified TESTGUI=N.

Note: This file contains both lower and upper case characters. The case of the text must be preserved. Also, the file must always be saved NONUM and some lines may have the backslash (\) character in column 80. These must also be preserved.

Chapter 5. Installing and Configuring the Workstation Client

Once SCLM Administrator Toolkit has been installed and configured on the host, you will want to download, install, and configure the workstation client. Note that, because enterprises vary in their installation requirements, the configuration and customization information in this chapter may not be an exhaustive list of the changes required to be made to your installation. You must also ensure that the Java Services process has been customized as described in “Customization for the Java Services process” on page 20.

Installing the client

To begin the installation process for the client, access your host system to locate the PDS or PDS-E that contains the installer for your client environment. The table that follows lists the names of the data sets that contain the installers, the names of the installers, and the environments they support. In the table, *<hilev>* identifies the high-level qualifier for the data set.

Table 1. Installation data sets and the platforms to which they apply

Installation data set name	Installer name	Platform to which it applies
<i><hilev></i> .SAUZGUIW	AUZWIN32	Windows® 2000 Windows XP
<i><hilev></i> .SAUZGUIA	AUZAIX5L	AIX 5L™
<i><hilev></i> .SAUZGUIK	AUZLNGTK	Linux® GTK

Each of the data sets above can be installed individually. You may install as many as you need. If you want to run the GUI client on a platform for which the installation data set is not present, you will need to contact your site’s systems programmer who is responsible for installation.

Note: SCLM Administrator Toolkit requires that it be installed into IBM Eclipse SDK 3.0 or later.

Downloading the workstation component

Information about downloading the workstation component from the host is found in “Using the host-based download wizard to download the workstation component” on page 23. The programs are self extracting executables. Running them will result in files being generated in the directories on your workstation that you have specified.

Performing the installation

Before installing the client component, you must ensure that a Java Runtime Environment 1.4 has been installed.

Installing on Windows: If you are running on Windows:

1. Download the installation package SAUZGUIW to your workstation by performing a binary transfer using FTP or an equivalent transfer method. Place the installation package in a Temp folder.

2. Open the Temp folder.
3. Highlight **auzwin32**. Rename this file to **auzwin32.exe**.
4. Click **auzwin32.exe** to invoke the InstallShield MultiPlatform Installer.

Installing on a UNIX®-based system: If you are running on a UNIX or Linux system, you must be running under the X Windows system.

1. Run **xterm** or **xcolor** to verify that your X server is operational.
2. Verify that the **DISPLAY** environment variable is set to the location where you will monitor the application. The statement to do so is:

```
"export DISPLAY=<display-location host name>:0"
```
3. Verify that *<display-location host name>* can accept X connections by running **xhost** there. Note that this step is not necessary if the system represented by *<display-location host name>* is the same host system on which you are installing the client; for example, "**xhost +**".
4. Change directories (**cd**) to a work directory that must have sufficient space to store an 800MB temporary file. Download the installation package appropriate to your client workstation by performing a binary transfer using FTP or an equivalent transfer method. Place the installation package in a Temp folder. The example below does so for an AIX system.

```
> "ftp <USS host>" and authenticate
> "binary"
> "lcd <local temp directory>"
> "cd 'AUZ.SAUZGUIA'"
> "get AUZAIX5L"
> "quit" or "bye" to exit
```

5. Once you have performed the binary FTP to move the appropriate installer (see Table 1 on page 27) to your client workstation, rename the downloaded file to a valid executable name for your platform; for example AUZAIX5L.bin for the AIX environment or AUXLNGTK.bin for Linux.
6. Run the installer to invoke the InstallShield MultiPlatform Installer. The example below performs this function for AIX. The statement **chmod +x *.bin** sets the execute permissions.

```
"cd <temp directory>"
"mv AUXAIX5L AUZAIX5L.bin"
"chmod +x *.bin"
"./AUZAIX5L.bin"
```

The InstallShield MultiPlatform Installer

While the InstallShield MultiPlatform Installer is executing, your screen will be blank for some period of time. This is normal. Please wait until the InstallShield Wizard appears, when you will be requested to take additional actions.

As the installation progresses, you will be asked where you would like to install SCLM Administrator Toolkit. The default directory is *<install>/IBM/SCLMAdministratorToolkit*. For Windows, *install* is C:/Program Files. For AIX and Linux, it is /opt. However, you may choose another directory if you wish.

This completes the installation.

Note: If the installation process fails, the SCLM Administrator Toolkit installer may be unable to clean up its swap files. The names of these files vary because InstallShield generates unique names during each installation. These files are usually in a directory that begins with the letters *is*. The files can be found in your temporary directory or in the directory that is specified with the command line parameter `'is:tempdir:`

`"/my/swap/directory" *`. These directories take up space and may hinder future installations. You should, therefore, backup and then safely remove these directories.

Temporary disk space for the installer

The SCLM Administrator Toolkit installation program needs a temporary area on disk with a sufficient amount of space. Having 500MB of space should be sufficient, but you may need to tune this value depending on your installation. During the installation process, you may receive the following message:

Error Writing File. There may not be enough temporary disk space.
Try using `-is:tempdir` to use a temporary directory on a partition with more disk space.

If this message is displayed, specify a temporary area as follows:

```
mmmmmmm -is:tempdir "directory-path"
```

where:

mmmmmmm

is the name of an installer such as AUZWIN32.exe or AUZLNGTK.bin.

directory-path

represents the path to the temporary area on disk; for example, `"/tmp/AUZ"`.

Uninstalling SCLM Administrator Toolkit

To uninstall SCLM Administrator Toolkit, invoke the Uninstall Wizard as follows:

1. Select **Start > Programs > IBM SCLM Administrator Toolkit > Uninstall > Uninstall SCLM Administrator Toolkit**. This invokes the Wizard.
2. When the Uninstall Wizard is displayed, you can choose to uninstall only SCLM Administrator Toolkit or you can also uninstall WebSphere® Studio Workbench (WSWB). Once you have selected one or both of these products to be uninstalled, clicking **Next** starts the uninstall process.
3. The Uninstall Wizard confirms the uninstall of the product or products. When you click **Next** on this panel, and if you have chosen to uninstal WebSphere Studio Workbench in addition to SCLM Administrator Toolkit, the Uninstall Wizard requests that you access the directory where WSWB had been installed and manually delete your `.config` and workspace folders. This step is not required if you are removing only SCLM Administrator Toolkit.

Installing the SCLM Administrator Toolkit client into an existing workspace

If you have installed the SCLM Administrator Toolkit client and choose to reinstall it into an existing workspace, you must first uninstall the previous installation of the product using the Uninstall Wizard as described in "Uninstalling SCLM Administrator Toolkit". SCLM Administrator Toolkit preserves workstation client preferences and Remote Systems Explorer (RSE) configuration specifications during the uninstallation/reinstallation process.

Configuring the client component

Follow these steps to configure your workstation client. Once you have configured your client component, it will be unnecessary to repeat these steps unless you want to configure additional host connections.

1. From the task bar, select **Start > Programs** and then **IBM SCLM Administrator Toolkit** to open a session.
2. When the initial SCLM Administrator Toolkit panel opens, select the SCLM Administrator Toolkit perspective by:
 - Clicking the **SCLM Perspective** icon at the left of the screen, or
 - Clicking the **Open a Perspective** icon at the left of the screen and selecting **SCLM Admin Toolkit**, or
 - From the **Window** pull-down, select **Open Perspective > SCLM Admin Toolkit**.
3. Configure a connection to the host system by expanding the **New Connection** in the Remote Systems View in the left-hand pane of your workspace. From the list of host systems, click on the type of host you want to configure, in this case, **z/OS**.
 SCLM Administrator Toolkit presents you with the New Remote System Connection dialog. Fill out the fields on this panel. You may have to obtain the information specific to your site from your systems programmer. Information on completing the dialog can also be found in the Remote Systems Explorer User's Guide that is part of the Eclipse online Help.
 - **Parent Profile.** Select the appropriate profile from the drop-down list.
 - **Connection Name.** Enter the information required to create a connection to the host system where the SCLM project you want to administer resides. You may choose any arbitrary value for the connection name. The value you choose is the one that will be displayed in the Remote System View.
 - **System Type.** If this entry field is included on the dialog, select the appropriate system type from the drop-down list. (This field will not be present if you selected the host type in the Remote System View.)
 - **Host Name.** Enter the name of the host to which the workstation client will connect.
 - **Description.** Enter a description for this host connection.
 - **Verify Host Name** checkbox. Place a check in this box if you want to verify the host name. SCLM Administrator Toolkit will confirm that this host is available to be connected to.
4. When you have completed the New Remote System Connection dialog, click **Finish**.
5. Configure the Files subsystem Server Launcher Settings page:
 - a. Right-click **Files** in the Remote Systems View Navigation Tree in the left pane of your workspace and, from the pop-up menu, select **Properties**. SCLM Administrator Toolkit displays the Properties for Files dialog.
 - b. On the Properties for Files dialog, from the Navigator, select **Server Launcher Settings**.
 - c. To indicate how the remote server should be launched, select either **Remote daemon** or **REXEC** by selecting the appropriate radio button.
 - d. Enter the Port number for the port on the host system to which the client is to connect. The standard daemon default is 4035. The standard REXEC default is 512. If your installation will use a different value, you may need to obtain this value from your systems programmer.
 - e. If you are using REXEC, enter the path to the remote server. The path information is case-sensitive. The format of the path is
 /<install-directory>/AUZ/v210/rseserver631
 where the recommended installation directory is */usr/lpp*.

- f. If you are using REXEC, enter the name of the Server Launcher script by overtyping the default text with the text **server.zseries**.
- g. Click **Finish** to complete this dialog.

Setting preferences for SCLM Administrator Toolkit

Use the Preferences page to:

- Determine whether your SCLM Administrator Toolkit jobs will run in batch or in the foreground
- Set default job card information
- Suppress **RC=0** messages
- Specify the label for the project qualifier. This value appears on the edit window tab and in the title bar after you have selected a project to work with
- Specify preferences for log files
- Define default types and associated parameters

To access the Preferences page, from the Window pull-down, click **Preferences**. In the Navigation Tree that is presented to you, click **SCLM Admin Toolkit**. After you have specified or modified your preferences, click **OK** to return to your project.

Some preferences, such as whether you want to run in foreground or in batch, and whether you want to use PDSs or PDS-Es, are stored in the project definition markup language (PDML). The PDML is the XML representation of your project. If you choose to change the value you have selected for these preferences, your change does not take effect until you save or rebuild the project.

Running jobs in batch or foreground and setting job card information

To set your preference for running jobs, access Preferences as described above. Click the appropriate radio button. Then enter the job card needed to run your jobs in the text boxes provided.

Suppressing RC=0 messages

Access Preferences as described above. To suppress any **RC=0** messages, place a check in the checkbox provided. When you have completed your entries on this page, click **Apply**. At any time, you can return to this page to modify your selection or to restore the product's default settings.

Setting a label for the Edit tab and title bar

Access Preferences as described above. You can specify a label to be applied to the Edit tab and title bar when working with a project. To provide information for the Title Name Display Preference, select either **Connection name** or **Host name** from the pull-down box. The default is the **Connection name**, which is the name that appears in the Remote Systems tree at the left of your window. When you have completed your entries on this page, click **Apply**. At any time, you can return to this page to modify your selection or to restore the product's default settings.

Preferences for log files

The SCLM Administrator Toolkit Preferences page provides two options for log files. One permits you to specify the maximum size for log files and is labeled **Maximum size of log files in MB**. The maximum size, by default, is set to 5 megabytes.

A check box labeled **Automatically prune messages**, if checked, will cause SCLM Administrator Toolkit to check for log files size only once after a connection to a remote system is established. If the size is greater than the maximum size you have specified for log files, log files automatically will be deleted, oldest first, until the total size is less than the specified maximum size. By default, **Automatically prune messages** is checked to enable the validation. If this checkbox is not checked, a warning message showing the current size of the log files is displayed.

Defining default Types and setting their DCB values

SCLM Administrator Toolkit provides a number of fully-defined default Types which you can choose to include in your project as is. You can use the Default Types Preference page to modify the Type definition for these types or to define new Types. You may already have worked with the product's default Types when customizing the workstation client. To access the Default Types Preference page, expand the SCLM Admin Toolkit item in the Preferences Navigator Tree by selecting the following from the Window pull-down: **Window > Preferences > SCLM Admin Toolkit > Default Types Preference Page**.

To add a default Type to your project, on the Preferences page, select the Type to be added from the list of default Types and click the **Add** button. To edit an existing default Type, click the **Edit** button. SCLM Administrator Toolkit displays the Type Dialog on which you can specify or edit the selected Type information:

1. A name of up to 8 characters and a description for the Type. (If you are editing an existing Type, its name is filled in this field.)
2. The average number of records contained in the top-level data set of this Type. This mandatory value, together with the number of members value and the DCB, is used to calculate the space required for the PDS or PDS-E at the top of the promotion tree.
3. The number of members contained in the top-level Type data set. This mandatory value, together with the average number of records value and the DCB, is used to calculate the space required for the PDS or PDS-E at the top of the promotion tree.
4. An extended Type name of up to 8 characters that can be used as an alternate Type if it is necessary to resolve include dependencies.

If a Type has been defined as using package backout:

1. Specify a number in the Reuse Days text box to indicate the number of days for which a backout can be performed. This field can only be specified if you check Backout IsaPack for this Type.
2. Click the Package Backup check box to specify that this Type of file is to be backed up during a promote.
3. Click the IsaPack check box to specify that this architecture definition will be used to drive the packages that are permitted to be backed out. This flag can be specified only for architecture definition (ARCHDEF) Types.
4. Click the Packfile box to specify that this Type is to hold the package detail files.

Specify the following default DCB information for the Type:

- The default DCB record format. Valid formats are FB, FBA, VB, VBA, FBM, VBM, or U.

- The default DCB block size. Valid value is an integer from 32 — 32760
- The default DCB logical record length. Valid value is an integer from 32 — 32756.

Note: When you add a new Type to your project, you should ensure that:

- If RECFM=U, LRECL must be equal to 0. BLKSIZE must not be equal to 0, and must be less than or equal to 32760.
- If RECFM=VBx, LRECL must not be equal to 0. BLKSIZE must be equal to 0, or must be greater than LRECL + 4 and less than or equal to 32760.
- If RECFM=FBx, LRECL must not be equal to 0. BLKSIZE must be equal to 0, or must be an exact multiple of LRECL and less than or equal to 32760.

When you have completed your entries on this page, click **OK**. At any time, you can return to this page to modify your entries, to remove a default Type from your profile, or to restore the product's default settings.

Setting Remote Systems Explorer preferences

To set your Remote Systems Explorer preferences, select **Window > Preferences > Remote Systems**.

- You should ensure that the Default File Transfer Mode is set to Binary in **Window > Preferences > Remote Systems > Files** in order to get project lists.
- Optionally, check **Show "New Connection" prompt in Remote Systems tree**
- Checking **Reopen Remote Systems View to previous state** is used to reconnect open sessions, but can take a long time to complete. If you just want to work with one specific connection, it is recommended that you leave this box unchecked. This gives you additional flexibility in the time required to initiate a session.

For information about Remote Systems Explorer, see the *Remote Systems Explorer User's Guide* that is part of the Eclipse online Help.

Note: A Preferences page in RSE permits you to control file cache size and clear the cache. If you do so while you have an open project, you will impact your ability to correctly save your project. Thus, you must not clear the cache while you have projects open in SCLM Administrator Toolkit.

Setting Enhanced Access Control preferences

Information about setting preferences for Enhanced Access Control for SCLM can be found in the *SCLM Administrator Toolkit: User's Guide* in the chapter entitled "Getting Started with Enhanced Access Control for SCLM Administration."

Setting a project filter

You can filter the list of objects presented to you in the Navigator tree. The filters you define are host-specific. That is, if you create a filter on host A, that filter will apply only to host A and not to host B.

When you first install SCLM Administrator Toolkit, the project filter is set to an asterisk (*). All projects appear in your Navigator tree. To change the filter, at any time, you can right-click **Project Filter** in the Navigator Tree, then click **Change** in the pop-up menu that displays. This causes SCLM Administrator Toolkit to display the Change System Filter menu on which you can add or change project filters. You can also right-click on a filter listed in the Filter Strings list box on this menu to see additional options you can take against a specific filter. You can define as many filters you desire for each host connection.

Note: A project filter is case-sensitive.

To add a new filter, right-click **SCLM Administrator Toolkit** in the Remote System View. From the displayed pop-up, select **New > Filter**. Type in the filter string that will perform the filter action. Click **Next** to continue. Enter a unique name for the filter and specify whether or not this filter will apply only to this connection by checking the appropriate check-box. Select the filter pool to which the filter will belong. Click **Next** to see some hints and tips about filters. Then click **Finish** to save the filter you have defined.

To change or add to the filtering capabilities of an existing filter, right click its name in the Remote Systems View and select either **Change** or **Properties > Filter Strings** from the pop-up menu that is displayed. Here you may add to or change the filter string for a named filter, or create an entirely new filter string for the filter.

Starting an SCLM Administrator Toolkit session

Your SCLM Administrator Toolkit client is now ready for use. To start a work session, see Chapter 6, “Starting an SCLM Administrator Toolkit Session,” on page 37.

Part 3. Starting a Session

This part describes the way in which you start an SCLM Administrator Toolkit session.

Chapter 6. Starting an SCLM Administrator Toolkit Session

Once you have completed the installation and customization tasks, you are ready to begin using the product. Follow the directions below to start a session. Detailed information about using SCLM Administrator Toolkit are available in the *IBM SCLM Administrator Toolkit : User's Guide*.

Starting a session from the workstation client

To start a new SCLM Administrator Toolkit session

1. Under Windows, log onto the product from the Start menu:
Start > Programs > IBM SCLM Administrator Toolkit. Alternatively, open a DOS window to the directory where you have installed SCLM Administrator Toolkit. At the command prompt enter `sclmadmintoolkit.bat`.

In the UNIX or Linux client environments, ensure you are running under the X Window system and the DISPLAY environment variable is set. Change directories to the eclipse directory by entering `cd eclipse`. From a command prompt, enter `sclmadmintoolkit.sh`.

Note: Using `sclmadmintoolkit.sh` is the *only* recommended way to begin your use of SCLM Administrator Toolkit. Do not execute Eclipse. Do not start multiple instances of SCLM Administrator Toolkit simultaneously from the same user ID, since unpredictable results can occur.

2. To connect to the host, click **SCLM Admin Toolkit** in the Remote Systems View navigator tree.
3. Enter your logon ID and password when prompted. The first time you use the product, you should place a check next to **Save ID** on the logon pop-up. You may optionally want to place a check next to **Save Password**, which makes it unnecessary to reenter your password once you have logged onto the system.

If you have saved your ID or password and need to reset one or both at a later date:

- a. From the Window pull-down, select **Preferences > Remote Systems > Passwords**.
 - b. From the list that displays, select the system on which you want to add, change, or remove password information and press **OK**.
4. When your logon has been accepted, your host session begins. You can now create a new project or modify an existing project.

Starting a session from the host

To begin a host session, log onto ISPF and enter **10.8** on the command line. This displays the SCLM Administrator Toolkit Main Menu from which you can choose the task you want to perform.

Note: When you initially log onto TSO to use SCLM Administrator Toolkit, your user profile should have been modified to specify an adequate maximum size for your TSO region under RACF. Typically, this profile modification will have been made for you by your site's systems programmer when setting up SCLM Administrator Toolkit. If you are using XML toolkit V1R7, your TSO maximum region size should be 60000.

Appendix A. Messages and Codes

The messages and codes that may be displayed during the operation of SCLM Administrator Toolkit, together with actions that may be taken by the system, as well as actions that you may need to take are documented in "Appendix A. Messages and Codes" in the *SCLM Administrator Toolkit: User's Guide*.

Appendix B. Accessibility Features of the Workstation Component

Accessibility features help users who have a physical disability, such as restricted mobility or limited vision, to use software products successfully. This appendix describes the most commonly used accessibility features of SCLM Administrator Toolkit. The following sections explain how to use these accessibility features on the Windows platform.

To review a complete list of the accessibility features supported by the Eclipse platform, refer to "Accessibility Features in Eclipse" in the "Concepts" section of the WebSphere Studio Workbench User Guide. To access this user's guide, from SCLM Administrator Toolkit menu bar, select **Help > Help Contents**. Select **Workbench User Guide** from the list of topics that is displayed.

Operating SCLM Administrator Toolkit by using the keyboard

SCLM Administrator Toolkit allows you to use the keyboard in place of the mouse for many functions. The product can be controlled to a large extent using keyboard shortcuts. You can use keys or key combinations to perform operations that can also be accomplished through mouse actions. You can access menu items from the keyboard. You can review a subset of the keyboard shortcuts available to you using the **Window > Keyboard Shortcuts** dialog. When using a pull-down menu, the keyboard equivalent typically appears to the right of the menu item. Some keyboard items also have shortcuts. Typically, the shortcut letter is underlined in the pull-down menu item's command.

Optionally, you can customize the function of your keyboard. Information on how to do so can be found in the "Concepts" section of the WebSphere Studio Workbench User Guide. Access the User Guide and then search on the term *keys*. To customize your keyboard while using SCLM Administrator Toolkit, select **Window > Preferences > Workbench > Keys**.

To navigate through a window or dialog by using the keyboard instead of the mouse, use the following keyboard shortcuts:

Activate a menu item in the menu bar	Enter

In addition to the keyboard features described in this section, SCLM Administrator Toolkit permits the use of the following accessibility features provided by the Eclipse platform:

- Screen-reader software and a digital speech synthesizer to hear what is displayed on the screen
- Voice recognition software to enter data and to navigate the user interface
- The ability to magnify what is displayed on the screen in the graphical views
- The ability to modify fonts and colors using the **Window > Preferences** dialog

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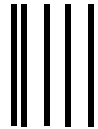
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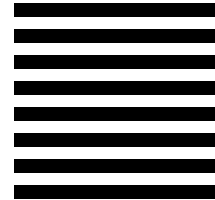
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
