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Chapter 1. Migration, coexistence, and interoperability

The goal of migration is to reconstruct the environment of your previous version of WebSphere® Application Server in a Version 8.0 environment. Coexistence allows you to create a mixed-version environment that is not in conflict and allows the nodes of all versions to start and run at the same time. Coexistence also facilitates rollback and allows one or the other version to run at one time. Interoperating is exchanging data between two coexisting product installations or between products on different systems.

Overview of migration, coexistence, and interoperability

The goal of migration is to reconstruct your earlier version of WebSphere Application Server in a Version 8.0 environment. Coexistence allows you to create a mixed-version environment that is not in conflict and allows the nodes of all versions to start and run at the same time. Coexistence also facilitates rollback and allows one or the other version to run at one time. Interoperating is exchanging data between two coexisting product installations or between products on different systems.

Frequently asked questions

Can I simply point to the new WebSphere Application Server for z/OS® Version 8.0 datasets and restart my servers?

No. WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0 requires that you migrate your Version 6.x or 7.x configuration up to the Version 8.0 level.

Be aware of the following issues when migrating to Version 8.0:

- Any variables that belong to applications or products other than WebSphere Application Server are not migrated but are brought over to the new environment as is. Therefore, check any other product upgrades before migrating to ensure that all of these variables are still accurate after migration.
- Before performing migration from Version 6.x or 7.x to Version 8.0, verify that you do not have any region constraints (such as IEFUSI limits) in place. These constraints can cause unpredictable Java Virtual Machine (JVM) errors.

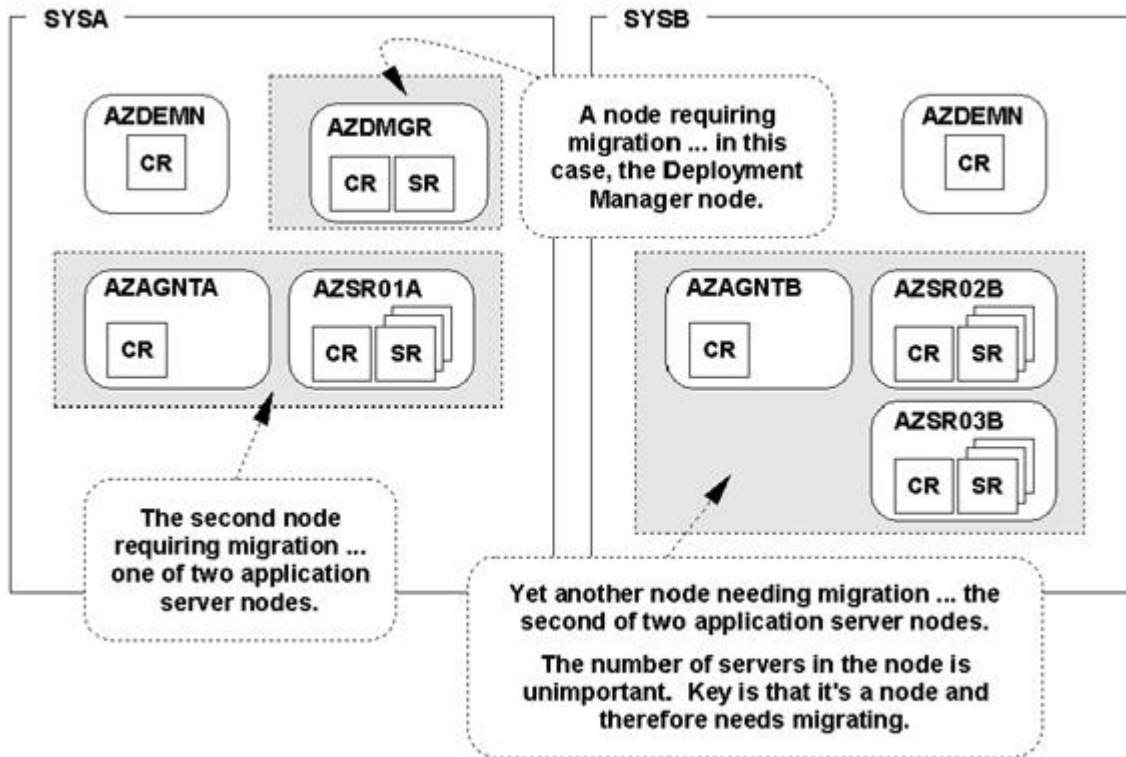
What is the basic migration process?

1. Install the SMP/E code for WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0.
2. Use the z/OS Migration Management Tool or the zmmt command to create the migration utilities that you need to perform the migration.
3. Run these jobs.

A new Version 8.0 configuration is created—separate from your existing Version 6.x or 7.x configuration—that is based on the Version 6.x or 7.x configuration information.

Is migration a node-by-node activity?

Yes. The process of migrating the configuration involves running the supplied utilities against each node in your configuration.



Although a stand-alone application server only has one node, that node needs to be migrated. The steps are essentially the same as the steps for migrating any other node, except that you do not have to have a deployment manager running. Read “Migrating a z/OS stand-alone application server: Checklist” on page 60 for a checklist of activities for migrating a stand-alone application server node.

What do the migration utilities do?

The migration utilities serve the following purposes:

Table 1. Migration utilities and their purposes. The table lists the various migration utilities and their purposes.

Utility	Purpose
BBOWMG1B (stand-alone application server migrations)	Enables all servers on the node being migrated to be configured to start in Peer Restart and Recovery (PRR) mode
BBOWMG1F (federated node migrations)	<p>After this job completes, you must start all servers on the node being migrated and wait for them to stop. PRR processing mode resolves any outstanding transactions, clears the transaction logs, and stops the server. Where should you run the migration jobs?

Run the jobs on the same system on which the node being migrated resides.

What happens when a node is migrated?

The migration utilities transform the contents of your present WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x or 7.x configuration file system and merge them into a new, separate Version 8.0 configuration file system.

Are my existing configuration lost during migration?

During the migration, the original WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x or 7.x configuration tree is unaffected. If for some reason the migration fails before completing, your previous configuration still exists.

If my node has multiple application servers, are all of them migrated?

Yes. The utility detects all servers and migrate all, including the node agent. One invocation of the migration utilities against the node migrates all the servers in the node.

Must I stop the servers in a node to perform the migration?

Yes. In a multinode configuration it is possible to have the other nodes still running. But any node that you want to migrate must have its servers stopped.

When an application server node that is part of a WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment configuration is being migrated, the previously migrated Version 8.0 deployment manager for that cell must be running. This is because part of the migration involves the use of the wsadmin scripting function to synchronize the newly migrated application server node with the deployment manager. The deployment manager must be running in order to perform that synchronization.

Is it possible to have a cell operating with only some of the nodes migrated and others not?

Yes, that is possible. WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x or 7.x can coexist with Version 8.0 in the same cell and on the same logical partition (LPAR).

Can my newly migrated WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0 deployment manager still communicate with the Version 6.x or 7.x nodes?

Yes. A deployment manager that is migrated to the Version 8.0 level of code can manage a Version 6.x or 7.x node. Changes made through the administrative console are applied to the node. Remember the following points:

- When a deployment manager is migrated to Version 8.0, a new Version 8.0primary configuration is created. The Version 6.x or 7.x primary configuration still exists. But when the Version 8.0 deployment manager makes changes to the configuration, the changes are made to the new Version 8.0 primary configuration. While it is still possible to use the Version 6.x or 7.x code, therefore, any changes made in Version 8.0 are not seen when the older code is restored.
- A Version 6.x or 7.x deployment manager has no ability to manage a Version 8.0 node.
- A WebSphere Application ServerVersion 8.0 WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment cell can contain mixed releases of Version 6.x nodes, but there is no mixed-node management support for Version 6.0.1.x.

The Version 8.0 migration tools still migrate these nodes during deployment-manager migration, but they issue a warning message that the nodes cannot be managed by the Version 8.0 deployment manager. You can then perform one of the following actions based on your needs.

- Upgrade all Version 6.0.1.x nodes to at least Version 6.0.2.

This action allows the nodes to be administered by a Version 8.0 deployment manager.

- Migrate these nodes to Version 8.0.

Is there a sequence to performing a multinode migration?

Yes. Migrate according to the following sequence:

1. Always migrate the deployment manager first.
2. Application server nodes on the same system as the deployment manager or on other Multiple Virtual Storage (MVS™) images can then be migrated.

Is it possible to have cells at WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0 coexist with other cells at Version 6.x or 7.x?

Yes. It possible to have cells at WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0 coexist with other cells at Version 6.x or 7.x for a sysplex or any given MVS image. The following restrictions exist:

- A cell can contain servers at Version 6.x or 7.x levels.
- A cell can contain z/OS and non-z/OS nodes; however, the deployment manager must be at the highest version level in the cell and any nodes on platforms other than that on which the deployment manager is located must be at Version 6.0 or later.
- A server on a z/OS node cannot be clustered with a server on a non-z/OS node.
- An LPAR can contain more than one node from the same cell.
- Each LPAR has at most one daemon per cell with servers on that LPAR regardless of how many nodes from that cell are configured for that LPAR.
- For a given LPAR, a daemon must be at or above the version level of all servers on that LPAR that are in the daemon's cell, regardless of node.
- All servers in the same node must be at the same version level.
- The deployment manager must be at or above the version level of any server in the cell.
- The controller and its servants must be at the same version level.
- No two cells can have the same cell short name.
- Other considerations exist for separate cells, regardless of whether they are at different versions of the code. For example, you must have a separate configuration file system mount point and separate JCL procedures.

Migrating and coexisting application servers

Migrating involves collecting the configuration information from a previous release of a WebSphere Application Server and merging it into a configuration for a new release. Coexisting involves running a new release of a WebSphere Application Server and an earlier release simultaneously on the same machine.

Before you begin

The migration tools basically save the existing WebSphere configurations and user applications in a backup directory and then process the contents of this backup directory to migrate the configurations and your applications from previous WebSphere Application Server releases to the latest release.

If you have a previous version of WebSphere Application Server, you must decide whether to migrate the configuration and applications of the previous version to the new version.

Migration does not uninstall the previous version.

- For stand-alone application server migrations and for deployment-manager migrations in which you do not choose to disable the previous deployment manager during migration, the earlier release is still functional.
- For federated-node migrations and for deployment-manager migrations in which you do choose to disable the previous deployment manager during migration, the earlier release is disabled after migration completes successfully. You can re-enable the earlier version using the `migrationDisablementReversal.jacl` script.

If you run two different versions of the application server at the same time, the two versions are *coexisting*. For example, if Version 6.1 and 8.0 application servers are running on the same machine, they are coexisting.

Procedure

1. Update product prerequisites and corequisites to supported versions.
Refer to the IBM® WebSphere Application Server supported hardware, software, and APIs site for current requirements.
2. Install the Version 8.0 product.
3. Migrate your WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x product configuration to Version 8.0.
4. Migrate web server plug-ins as described in Chapter 6, “Migrating web server configurations,” on page 131.
5. Optional: Set up multiple versions of WebSphere Application Server to coexist.

Premigration considerations

Before you begin the process of migrating to WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0, there are some considerations of which you need to be aware.

Considerations for z/OS

Consider the following before migrating Application Server for z/OS:

- The migration progress usually carries forward the values for user-defined variables or variables that are defined by Application Server. There are some special variables, however, for which the values are not carried forward. These values are:
 - `WAS_INSTALL_ROOT`
 - `USER_INSTALL_ROOT`
 - `WAS_PRODUCT_ROOT`
 - `WAS_LIBS_DIR`
 - `WAS_PROPS_DIR`
 - `WAS_TEMP_DIR`
 - `APP_INSTALL_ROOT`
 - `DRIVER_PATH`
 - `WAS_INSTALL_LIBRARY`

- JAVA_HOME
- DEPLOY_TOOL_ROOT
- CONNECTOR_INSTALL_ROOT
- TRANLOG_ROOT
- MQJMS_LIB_ROOT
- WAS_ETC_DIR
- CLOUDSCAPE_JDBC_DRIVER_PATH
- WEMPS_USER_ROOT
- MQ_INSTALL_ROOT
- WAS_DAEMON_ONLY_ICU_DATA
- WAS_DAEMON_ONLY_CONFIG_ROOT
- WAS_DAEMON_primordial_root
- WAS_DAEMON_daemon_was_env_file

The values for these variables are picked up from the profile template when migration creates profiles. If you defined custom values for these variables, they are not maintained in the Application Server release to which you are migrating. These variables are not migrated, because they are Application Server properties that are profile attributes. If you need to override their values with entries that are not the default, you must change the value outside of the product install, profile creation, and migration processes.

Note: Be particularly aware of the APP_INSTALL_ROOT variable. Even if the APP_INSTALL_ROOT had a custom location that you defined, by default the migration process will install applications in the following location:

```
${USER_INSTALL_ROOT}/installedApps
```

To have the migration process honor an application install location that is not the default:

- Specify the location in the Application Install Directory field of zMMT.
 - Select the **Migrate applications and use the previous application installation directory** option during migration to honor the install path without the need to enter it again. If the install path for the previous release contains variable references, Application Server will resolve those variables with the migrated values.
- After you install WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 on the z/OS operating system, you might want to build a complete WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment cell configuration and verify that it works correctly before you attempt to migrate an existing cell or node.
This process ensures that your system has all of the necessary prerequisites and supports the new level of the product.
 - Before you perform the migration, evaluate the items deprecated in WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0.
For more information, read the "Deprecated and removed features" article in the information center.
 - Before you migrate from WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x to Version 8.0, connect the application servant region ID to a keyring and verify that the keyring has the WebSphereCA certificate associated with it. Otherwise, security errors occur if you have global security turned on.
 - High availability manager and core group functionality are included in WebSphere Application Server Version 6.0 and later.
Read the "Core group migration considerations" article in the information center for core-group configuration and topology considerations that might impact your migration from Version 6.x to Version 8.0.
 - If you are migrating from WebSphere Application Server Version 6.0.1 to Version 8.0 and security is enabled for Version 6.0.1, you must upgrade to service level 6.0.2.12 or later before migrating to Version 8.0.

If security is not enabled for WebSphere Application Server Version 6.0.1, this requirement does not apply and there is no specific service-level requirement for the migration.

- If you are migrating from WebSphere Application Server Version 6.0.2.x to Version 8.0 and your configuration uses XA connections, you must have Version 6.0.2.9 or later before migrating.
- If you plan on running an Internet Inter-ORB Protocol (IIOP) client that is earlier than Version 6.1 and it will be interacting with a Version 8.0 server on the same logical partition (LPAR), the daemon procedure library for the Version 8.0 daemon must include the earlier release's SBBOLD2 and SBBOLPA libraries in its STEPLIB.
- Migration support requires that both the source and target WebSphere Application Server systems be on the LPAR.

Therefore, you cannot migrate an existing configuration to a different z/OS LPAR. You also cannot migrate to or from a non-z/OS operating system using the WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 migration utilities.

- Migrating cells that span Sysplex environments or operating systems should not present any unique migration issues. You migrate at the node level, and you use the tools provided based on the platform of the node that you are migrating.

For information on setting up a mixed-platform cell, read the WebSphere for z/OS -- Heterogeneous Cells white paper.

- WebSphere Application Server on the z/OS operating system does not support the WASPreUpgrade, WASPostUpgrade, and manageprofiles command-line tools that are supported by the distributed and i5/OS® versions of the product.

You must generate the migration jobs using the z/OS Migration Management Tool or the zmmt command and then submit them according to the generated instructions.

- The amount of storage that your system requires during migration to Version 8.0 depends on your environment.
 - The size of the file system is provided by the value of the primary allocation in cylinders specified in the z/OS Migration Management Tool or the zmmt command when you generate a migration definition. In addition, this file system is automatically expandable based on the secondary allocation that you specify. The default values provided for these allocations by the migration tools is normally sufficient for the configuration data.
 - The migration backup directory requires a considerable amount of temporary space. The exact amount needed depends on several factors, but 100 cylinders is sufficient in most situations (including tracing if needed). If you are in doubt about the space available for your temporary directory, use the option in the z/OS Migration Management Tool or the zmmt command to move the temporary directory to a custom location with more space and mount your own temporary file system there. Failure to have adequate temporary space can lead to a premature end to the migration process.
- Before you migrate to Java Standard Edition (SE) Development Kit (JDK) 6 from JDK 5 or JDK 1.4 , review your applications for necessary changes based on the Sun Microsystems Java specification. Read “Migrating API and specifications” on page 15 for more information.

- When migrating a cell with multiple nodes, the applications must remain at lowest JDK level until all nodes are migrated.

- The migration articles assume that WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 is being installed in an environment where it must coexist with prior levels of WebSphere Application Server.

Consider the following items while planning to enable coexistence:

- Update prerequisites to the levels required by WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0. Prior levels of WebSphere Application Server continue to run aWebSphere Application Server the higher prerequisite levels.
- Review the ports that have been defined to ensure that the WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 installation does not conflict.

In particular, note that the default daemon port definition for both versions is the same when installing to coexist with WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x.

Read the "Default port assignments" article in the information center for default port information.

Read Chapter 8, "Running multiple application server versions," on page 137 for more information.

- Consider the following information if you are planning to have any mixed-release cells:
 - You can upgrade a portion of the nodes in a cell to WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 while leaving others at the previous release level. This means that, for a period of time, you might be administering servers that are at the previous release level and servers that are running the newer release in the same cell.

In this mixed-release environment, some restrictions on what you can do with servers at the previous release level might exist. For details, read the "Creating application servers" article in the information center. Restrictions on creating clusters and cluster members might also exist. For details, read the "Creating clusters" article in the information center.

- A WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment cell can contain mixed releases of Version 6.x nodes; however, there is no mixed-node management support for Version 6.0.1.x.

The Version 8.0 migration tools still migrate these nodes during deployment-manager migration; however, these tools issue a warning message that the nodes cannot be managed by the Version 8.0 deployment manager. You can then perform one of the following actions based on your needs.

 - Upgrade all Version 6.0.1.x nodes to at least Version 6.0.2. This upgrade allows them to be administered by a Version 8.0 deployment manager.
 - Migrate these nodes to Version 8.0.
- During migration, Version 8.0 cluster information is distributed throughout the cell. Version 6.0.x nodes that are not at Version 6.0.2.11 or later fail to read this information and the cluster function might fail. Therefore, upgrade all Version 6.0.x nodes that will be contained in or interoperating with a Version 8.0 cell to Version 6.0.2.11 or later before migrating your deployment managers to Version 8.0.
- WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 migration converts HTTP transports to channel-framework web container transport chains.

For more information on WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 transport support, read the following articles in the information center:

- Include maintenance considerations when developing your configuration file system strategy.

If you configure your WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment environment using the default value for the product file system path in the z/OS Migration Management Tool, all the nodes point directly at the mount point of the product file system. This configuration makes rolling maintenance in a nondisruptive way almost impossible. If a cell is configured in this way, applying service to the product file system affects all the nodes at the same time. If multiple cells are configured in this way, applying service to the product file system affects all the cells at the same time.

You might want to specify what is referred to as an "intermediate symbolic link" between each node's configuration file system and the actual mount point of the product file system. This strategy is described in the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS V5 - Planning for Test, Production and Maintenance white paper.

Read the Washington Systems Center Sample WebSphere for z/OS ND Configuration white paper for more information about this issue and its relationship to applying maintenance. Read the WebSphere for z/OS: Updating an Existing Configuration HFS to Use Intermediate Symbolic Links instructions for information on obtaining and using a utility that you can use to update an existing configuration Hierarchical File System (HFS) to use intermediate symbolic links.

- The migration tools create a migration backup directory containing a backup copy of the configuration from the previous version. The space available for this directory must be at least the size of the configuration directory and applications from the previous version plus the size of the batch-job output from the migration.

Typically, the batch-job output from the migration is very small unless you enable trace. The trace output size varies depending on the parts of migration for which you have enabled trace. The largest trace producer is the WASPostUpgrade phase of migration. You can typically see trace output of approximately 30 MB for this phase.

- WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 does not support the DB2 for zOS Local JDBC Provider (RRS).

If you use the DB2 for zOS Local JDBC Provider (RRS) in the Version 6.x configuration that you are going to migrate, you must change your configuration to use the DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Provider before or immediately after you migrate to Version 8.0. The Version 8.0 migration tools do not migrate the provider for you.

If you use the DB2 for zOS Local JDBC Provider (RRS) in the version to be migrated and do not change your configuration to use the DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Provider before migrating to Version 8.0, the following events occur:

- When running the migration tools, you receive the following message:
MIGR0442W: Not migrating DB2 for zOS Local JDBC Provider (RRS) jdbc provider. Manually create a DB2 Universal Driver provider as a replacement. See DB2 documentation for further details.
- After migration, DB2 access is broken and you receive the following runtime message:
DSRA8213W: JDBC provider, DB2 for zOS Local JDBC Provider (RRS), is no longer supported by WebSphere Application Server. Applications should use DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Provider Type 2.

If you determine that you must change your configuration to use the DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Provider, you can do so by completing one of the following tasks:

- Before migrating to Version 8.0, change your Version 6.x configuration to use the DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Provider.

If you do this, the Version 8.0 migration tools handle the migration to the DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Provider and no post-migration activity is required.

Perform one of the following actions:

- Manually change your configuration to use the DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Provider.

Search the information center for your Version 6.0.2 product to find information on configuring a DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Provider for WebSphere Application Server running on the z/OS operating system.

- If you are migrating from Version 6.1.0 or later, use the JDBC Migration Utility for DB2 on z/OS to migrate from the DB2 for zOS Local JDBC Provider (RRS) to the DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Provider.

This tool is a script that migrates DB2 for zOS Local JDBC Providers (RRS) to DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Providers one node at a time. A white paper that accompanies the tool explains how to install and configure the DB2 Universal JDBC Driver before running the tool to migrate your configuration. - After migrating to Version 8.0, perform one of the following actions:

- Manually change your configuration to use the DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Provider.
- Use the JDBC Migration Utility for DB2 on z/OS to migrate from the DB2 for zOS Local JDBC Provider (RRS) to the DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Provider.

This tool is a script that migrates DB2 for zOS Local JDBC Providers (RRS) to DB2 Universal JDBC Driver Providers one node at a time. A white paper that accompanies the tool explains how

- After you migrate a base application server to WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 running on the z/OS operating system, the administrative and user applications continue to be defined under the virtual host `default_host` as they were in the previous release. However, a migrated deployment manager is defined under the virtual host `admin_host` that was introduced in Version 6.1.
- If you use isolated data repositories—specifically, nonshared data repositories such as transaction logs for SIB and IBM Cloudscape or Apache Derby databases—and you migrate from a previous release, your existing databases and transaction logs are saved. If you have mission-critical information that is stored in these local data repositories, you should safely shut down all servers that interact with those repositories before attempting migration. Those servers should remain offline until the migration has been successfully completed or rolled back.

After the migration is complete or you have rolled back to the previous version, you can restart the servers that interact with these isolated data repositories.

- Before you migrate an Apache Derby database, ensure that any application servers hosting applications that are using the Apache Derby database are closed. Otherwise, the Apache Derby migration fails.
- You should be aware of the following rules related to migrating security domains:
 - If you migrate a deployment manager that has a security domain with a cell-level scope, the migration tools take the following actions:
 - Migration creates a domain in the new configuration called *PassThroughToGlobalSecurity* if it does not already exist.
 - Migration adds a cluster mapping to the new configuration for all clusters that existed in the old configuration.
 - Clusters that only existed in the Version 8.0 deployment-manager configuration before migration do not have their mappings to *PassThroughToGlobalSecurity* changed.
 - If mappings for the Version 8.0 clusters exist before migration, they still exist after migration.
 - If no mappings for the Version 8.0 clusters exist before migration, they still do not exist after migration.
 - If a cluster exists in both the previous configuration and the Version 8.0 configuration before migration, the cluster in the new configuration is added to the *PassThroughToGlobalSecurity* domain and behaves like the cluster in the previous release.
 - Migration adds a bus mapping for any busses that exist in a migrated Version 6.1.x configuration. Bus mappings are updated following the same rules as those for cluster mapping that are described above.
 - Administrative servers (deployment manager) are not added to the *PassThroughToGlobalSecurity* domain.
 - If you migrate a federated node that has a security domain with a cell-level scope, the migration tools take the following actions:
 - Migration creates a domain in the new configuration called *PassThroughToGlobalSecurity* if it does not already exist.
 - Migration adds a server-level mapping to the *PassThroughToGlobalSecurity* domain for all non-clustered servers in the old node's configuration.
 - Servers on the node that is being migrated that are part of a cluster do not receive entries in the *PassThroughToGlobalSecurity* domain because this was addressed through a cluster mapping during deployment-manager migration.
If you have removed that mapping, migration maintains that behavior.
 - Administrative servers (node agents) are not added to the *PassThroughToGlobalSecurity* domain.

Read the "Security domains in a mixed-version environment" section of the "Multiple security domains" article in the information center.

- Modifications to the java.security file are lost during migration. If you've updated your java.security file in the previous version of WebSphere Application Server, the new version will not have your updates. For example, if you modified your provider list to use FIPS or Hardware crypto, your migrated cell will not use these providers, and therefore will not use FIPS or Hardware Crypto. To migrate your modified java.security file, use the following steps:
 1. Before migrating, copy the java.security file from the old WAS_HOME/java/lib/security to a temporary directory.
 2. Migrate WebSphere Application Server to Version 8.0.
 3. Compare the old java.security file with the new Version 8.0 java.security file that is located in V8WAS_HOME/properties/java.security.
 4. Update V8WAS_HOME/properties/java.security with changes to the provider list from the old java.security file.
 5. Repeat this procedure for each installation of WebSphere Application Server.
- After you use the migration tools to migrate to WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0, you might need to perform some actions that are not performed automatically by the migration tools.
 - Examine any Lightweight Third-Party Authentication (LTPA) security settings that you might have used in WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x, and verify that Version 8.0 security is set appropriately.

Read the "Lightweight Third Party Authentication" article in the information center for more information.

- If necessary, create new System Authorization Facility (SAF) profiles before you start your migrated servers on WebSphere Application Server Version 8.

Beginning with Version 6.1, certain security facilities are controlled using SAF profiles.

- In Version 6.1 and later, the **Enabling trusted applications** setting is controlled with a SAF security profile instead of an internal WebSphere variable as in previous releases.

The **Enabling trusted applications** option, which permits the WebSphere Application Server run time to perform certain privileged operations on behalf of application code, is required for all servers that use the LocalOS registry or SAF authorization.

- In Version 6.1 and later, the **Sync to OS thread allowed** feature (which allows an application to access resources using an operating system identity other than the server identity) is controlled with a SAF security profile and the com.ibm.websphere.security.SyncToOSThread variable.

This implementation allows both the administrator and the system security administrator to determine whether or not the feature is used. This implementation also allows restrictions on which identities the application can assume.

If you migrate from a previous version of WebSphere Application Server and need these features, you must create the required SAF profiles. If these profiles are not present and correctly set up, a cell using the LocalOS user registry or SAF authorization fails when started on Version 8.0.

If you use Resource Access Control Facility (RACF®) for your security system, use the following instructions. If you use another SAF-compliant security system, contact the security system vendor for appropriate information.

- Check your Multiple Virtual Storage (MVS) system log or use the administrative console to determine whether or not **Enable trusted applications** is enabled for your server.

Look for control_region_security_enable_trusted_applications in the startup log. If this value is set to 1, **Enabled trusted applications** is enabled. If this option is enabled, create the following SAF profile and grant READ access to the application server control region user ID:

```
BBO.TRUSTEDAPPS.cell_shortname.cluster_transition_name
```

Use the following RACF commands to complete this action:

```
RDEFINE FACILITY
  BBO.TRUSTEDAPPS.cell_shortcode.cluster_transition_name
  UACC(NONE)
PERMIT FACILITY
  BBO.TRUSTEDAPPS.cell_shortcode.cluster_transition_name
  ID(controller_userid) ACCESS(READ)
SETROPTS RACLIST(FACILITY) REFRESH
```

The *cluster_name* SAF facility profile is replaced by the cluster transition name for unclustered servers. If you want all servers in the cell to have **Enabling trusted applications** enabled, replace the cluster name with a wild card (*).

For more information, read the "System Authorization Facility classes and profiles" article in the information center.

- Check your Multiple Virtual Storage (MVS) system log or use the administrative console to determine whether or not **Sync to OS thread allowed** is enabled for your server.

If this option is enabled, create the following SAF profile and grant either READ or CONTROL access to the application server control region user ID:

```
BBO.SYNC.cell_shortcode.cluster_transition_name
```

The following example contains RACF commands that you might use to complete this action:

```
RDEFINE FACILITY
  BBO.SYNC.cell_shortcode.cluster_transition_name
  UACC(NONE)
PERMIT FACILITY
  BBO.SYNC.cell_shortcode.cluster_transition_name
  ID(controller_userid) ACCESS(CONTROL)
SETROPTS RACLIST(FACILITY) REFRESH
```

The cluster name is replaced by the cluster transition name for unclustered servers. If you want all servers in the cell to have **Sync to OS thread allowed** enabled, replace the cluster name with a wild card (*).

Important:

- Granting the control region READ access to the application server control region user ID restricts the user IDs to which the thread identity can be changed based on SAF SURROGAT profiles.

If the controller user ID has READ access to the BBO.SYNC profile and the com.ibm.websphere.security.SyncToOSThread variable is set to true, an application might request Sync to the OS Thread. The application might assume the identity of either the caller or a role-related user ID to access resources. In order for the servant to run with a different application ID, however, the servant needs READ access to the SURROGAT profile BBO.SYNC.*application_userid*.

- Granting the control region CONTROL access to the application server control region user ID allows the thread identity to be switched to any user ID that requests Sync to OS thread.

If the controller user ID has CONTROL access to the BBO.SYNC profile and the com.ibm.websphere.security.SyncToOSThread variable is set to true, then an application might request Sync to OS Thread. The application might assume the identity of either the caller or any role-related user ID to access resources. SURROGAT profiles are not checked.

For more information, read the "Application Synchrony to OS Thread Allowed" article in the information center.

- If you use SAF EJBROLE profiles for role-based authorization, create EJBROLE profiles for the two administrative roles—the deployer and admin security manager roles—that were introduced in Version 6.1.
- Review your Java Virtual Machine (JVM) settings to verify that you are using a heap size of at least 50 for improved startup performance.

Read the "Java virtual machine settings" article in the information center for more information.

If you have used a smaller heap size before, you can use the default heap size of 50.

- Verify the results of the automatic Apache Derby database migration, and manually migrate any Apache Derby databases that are not automatically migrated by the tools.

Read "Migrating IBM Cloudscape or Apache Derby databases" on page 113 for more information.

- WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 does not include the WebSphere Connect JDBC driver for SQL Server. The WebSphereConnectJDBCdriverConversion tool is provided to convert data sources from the WebSphere Connect JDBC driver to the DataDirect Connect JDBC driver or the Microsoft SQL Server JDBC driver.

Read "Migrating from the WebSphere Connect JDBC driver" on page 115 for more information.

- During cell migrations to Version 8.0, the Version 6.0.x server user ID is not migrated or mapped to the Version 8.0 **Primary administrative user name** field as shown in the administrative console at **Security > Global security > user_account_repository > Configure**. The server user identity value is transferred, and the proper user ID from the Version 6.0.x cell is migrated along with a password.

The primary administrative user name is required when defining Lightweight Directory Access Protocol (LDAP) as the security repository in Version 8.0.

The **Primary administrative user name** field and server user identity value are used by the product when you use administrative scripts (wsadmin) to update the configuration. Version 6.0.x and earlier versions of the product store a valid username-and-password pair in the authenticating registry inside the local product configuration files. Beginning with Version 6.1, an administrative user ID can be set but the authentication information is not stored in the local product configuration files (thereby improving security).

If you migrate from an older release of the product to Version 6.1 or later, the old model is still used in order to maintain backward compatibility and to allow the mixed cell to function properly. When you are ready to upgrade to the new model, which requires that all nodes in the cell be at Version 6.1.x or later, you can perform the following actions:

- Input a Primary administrative user name that represents a valid user identity in the authentication authority (user registry).
- Change the server user identity value from **Server identity that is stored in the repository** to **Automatically generated server identity**.

If you are still using a mixed cell in Version 8.0 that contains Version 6.0.x nodes, you must continue to use the old model or the older nodes will not be able to communicate with the new nodes. You should not make any changes to the security settings in the mixed cell. If editing the user registry becomes necessary in a mixed cell that is not ready to be upgraded to the new model, however, select a valid user identity in the authentication authority (user registry) and put that value into the **Primary administrative user name** field but do **not** change the value of the server user identity. On all platforms, it is important to select a user ID that is valid for the scripting tools (wsadmin).

- If you have multiple node agents on the same logical partition (LPAR), IPC_CONNECTOR_ADDRESS port conflicts might exist after running the migration jobs. Reconfigure the conflicting ports.
- If you have applications that attempt to send a request to a Session Initiation Protocol (SIP) Uniform Resource Identifier (URI) over Transport Layer Security (TLS), you should be aware of a difference in behavior between WebSphere Application Server Version 6.1 and Version 8.0.

When a SIP application sends a request to a SIP URI over TLS in Version 6.1, the request URI scheme changes from "sip" to "sips". In Version 8.0, the scheme remains without a change.

This difference is seen when your applications attempt to send a SIP request in which the request URI contains a "sip" scheme and a "tls" transport parameter. For example, if an application in Version 6.1 creates a request with the following request URI:

```
sip:alice@atlanta.com;transport=tls
```

and sends it to the network, the SIP container changes both the scheme and the transport parameter to produce the following request URI:

```
sips:alice@atlanta.com;transport=tcp
```

In Version 8.0, the SIP container does not change the scheme.

If you want to retain the old behavior after migrating the Version 6.1 application server to Version 8.0, change the application code. If the application intends to send a "sips" URI, it should create the URI that way before requesting to send out the message. With a "sips" URI, the behavior remains the same as in Version 6.1.

Migrating API and specifications

Migrating application programming interfaces (APIs) and specifications involves moving to the current Java component level as well as to other technologies that WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 supports. If your existing applications currently support different specification levels than are supported by this version of the product, it is likely that you must update at least some aspects of the applications to comply with the new specifications.

In many cases, IBM provides additional features and customization options that extend the specification level even further. If your existing applications use IBM extensions from earlier product versions, it might be necessary for you to perform mandatory or optional migration to use the same kinds of extensions in Version 8.0.

Notes on the use of Java SE Development Kit 6:

- WebSphere Application Server began supporting Java SE Development Kit (JDK) 6 in Version 8.0. Read JSR 270: Java SE 6 Release Contents and Java SE 6 for more information about JDK 6.
- In general, existing Version 6.x application binaries that were developed using JDK 1.4 and 5 are highly compatible and typically do not require modifications to run. However, recompilation of the JDK 1.4 or 5 applications at the JDK 6 level might necessitate modifications of the source code to conform to incompatible changes that are present in JDK 6. As part of your migration planning, you should review the JDK compatibility restrictions that are documented by Sun Microsystems at Java SE 6 Release Notes[®]: Compatibility.
- A mixed cell containing Version 6.x and Version 7.0 nodes requires that all application binaries deployed on Version 6.x remain at the lowest JDK level associated with the Version 6.x nodes. Although you can successfully migrate Version 6.x applications to Version 8.0, this is only meant to be a temporary state as you transition to Version 8.0. After you begin migration to Version 8.0, plan to complete the migration of the entire cell, update your tooling to Version 8.0, and update your applications to conform to JDK 6 requirements. Complete this action before any further application changes. After you have completely migrated your cell to Version 8.0, upgrade your application binaries to the JDK 6 level the next time that you

make application modifications that require recompiling. This action might require source code changes to your application to conform to the JDK 6 API changes as documented by Sun Microsystems.

Note: The Java Virtual Machine Debug Interface (JVMDI) and the Java Virtual Machine Profiler Interface (JVMPI) were deprecated in JDK 5 and removed in JDK 6. Read [Java SE 6 Release Deprecated API](#) for more information.

Read the "Specifications and API documentation" article in the information center for a summary of the specifications and API documentation supported in current and prior product releases.

For more information on the items deprecated in WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0, read the "Deprecated, stabilized, and removed features" article in the information center.

Chapter 3. Migrating product configurations

Use the WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 migration tools to migrate your product configurations. These migration tools support migration from Version 6.x or 7.x.

Before you begin

Read “Overview of migration, coexistence, and interoperability” on page 1 and “Premigration considerations” on page 6. For resources to help you plan and perform your migration, visit Knowledge Collection: Migration planning for WebSphere Application Server.

The following configuration upgrades of WebSphere Application Server versions and offerings are directly supported.

Table 2. Profiles that can be migrated from Version 6.x or Version 7.x to Version 8.0. The table lists the supported profiles that can be migrated to WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0.

* WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0 supports the migration of a subset of programming model extensions (PMEs) from WebSphere Business Integration Server Foundation.

Before using the migration tools, consult the IBM WebSphere Application Server supported hardware, software, and APIs website to understand what fixes you must apply to earlier versions. Applying fixes to an earlier version might also apply fixes to files that have a role in the migration. Apply any fixes to ensure the most effective migration of configurations and applications.

Note: The deployment manager maintains the master configuration data for all of the nodes that it manages. This configuration data is updated through the configuration manager. When the configuration manager detects that the updates to the configuration data were not made against the latest saved copy, it rejects the updates and creates an exception. To avoid this situation, following these best practices:

- Migrate each node independently. For example, let the first node complete the migration process before starting the process for the second node, and so on.
- Ensure that the administrative console for the deployment manager is not running when the migration process is in progress.

If you need to migrate federated nodes concurrently, use the following steps to minimize the potential failures:

1. Run the backupConfig command for the deployment manager and each federated node before you begin. For more information, see the documentation about the backupConfig command.
2. Stagger the start of the migration process for each node by 3 to 5 minutes.
3. Run the restoreConfig command on that node and rerun the migration process if a failure occurs. For more information, see the documentation about the restoreConfig command.

Configuration mapping during product-configuration migration

Various configurations are mapped during product-configuration migration.

Migration involves the copying of your configuration from a previous release of a WebSphere Application Server into a new release.

Many migration scenarios are possible. The migration tools map objects and attributes existing in the version from which you are migrating to the corresponding objects and attributes in the Version 8.0 environment.

Bootstrap port

The migration tools carry the old release value into the Version 8.0 environment.

Command-line parameters

The migration tools convert appropriate command-line parameters to Java Virtual Machine (JVM) settings in the server process definition. Most settings are mapped directly. Some settings are not migrated because their roles in the WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 configuration do not exist, have different meanings, or have different scopes.

For information on how to change the process-definition settings, read the "Process definition settings" article in the information center. For information on how to change the JVM settings, read the "Java virtual machine settings" article in the information center.

Generic server

In Version 6.x and later, a generic server has its own type, called `GENERIC_SERVER`. Migration will perform this conversion, but migration cannot accurately migrate the external resources that the generic server references. After migration has completed migrating the generic server settings, you might need to perform additional tasks. If the old resource that the generic server was managing is located under the old WebSphere Application Server installation, perform the following tasks:

1. Copy any related files to the new installation.
2. Run any setup required to put the external application back into a valid and working state.

It is best that you reinstall the resource into the new WebSphere Application Server directory. Whatever you choose to do, the final step is to reset the reference to the new location of the application.

If the old resource that the generic server was managing is not installed under the old WebSphere Application Server installation, nothing further is required.

Migration of a Version 6.x or above node to a Version 8.0 node

You can migrate a WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x or above node that belongs to a cell without removing the node from the cell.

Migrate the deployment manager first, before migrating any base nodes in the cell.

Important: Use the same cell name when migrating WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment from Version 6.x or above to Version 8.0. If you use a different cell name, federated nodes cannot successfully migrate to the WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment Version 8.0 cell.

Migrating a base WebSphere Application Server node that is within a cell to Version 8.0 also migrates the node agent to Version 8.0. A cell can have some Version 8.0 nodes and other nodes that are at Version 6.x or above levels. Read "Coexistence support" on page 137 for information on restrictions on using mixed-release cells.

Policy files

WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 migrates all the policy files that are installed with Version 6.x or above by merging settings into the Version 8.0 policy files with the following characteristics:

- Any comments located in the Version 8.0 policy files will be preserved. Any comments contained in the Version 6.x or above policy files will not be included in the Version 8.0 file.
- Migration will not attempt to merge permissions or grants; it is strictly an add-type migration. If the permission or grant is not located in the Version 8.0 file, the migration will bring it over.
- Security is a critical component; thus, the migration makes any additions at the end of the original .policy files right after the comment MIGR0372I: Migrated grant permissions follow. This is done to help administrators verify any policy-file changes that the migration has made.

Properties directories

Migration copies files from prior version directories into the WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 configuration.

Property files

WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 migrates all the property files that are installed with Version 6.x or above by merging settings into the Version 8.0 property files.

Resource adapter archives (RARs) referenced by J2C resources

RARs that are referenced by J2C resources are migrated if those RARs are in the old WebSphere Application Server installation. In this case, the RARs are copied over to the corresponding location in the new WebSphere Application Server installation. Relational Resource Adapter RARs will not be migrated.

Migrating cluster-level resources:

WebSphere Application Server Version 6.0 introduced the concept of cluster-level resources. These are configured in resourcexxx.xml files under the cluster directories. For example:

```
<resources.j2c:J2CResourceAdapter xmi:id="J2CResourceAdapter_1112808424172"
  name="ims" archivePath="${WAS_INSTALL_ROOT}\installedConnectors\2.rar">
  ...
</resources.j2c:J2CResourceAdapter>
```

If you have a cluster-level resource, this resource must be in the same location on each cluster member (node). Using the above example, therefore, each cluster member must have the RAR file installed at location `${WAS_INSTALL_ROOT}\installedConnectors\2.rar`. `${WAS_INSTALL_ROOT}` is resolved on each cluster member to get the exact location.

In the migration of a deployment manager, the tools migrate the cluster files on the deployment manager, including the resourcexxx.xml files.

In the migration of a federated node, the tools process each J2C adapter.

RAR files in a Version 6.x to Version 8.0 migration:

Migration from Version 6.x to Version 8.0 copies files such as RAR files from `WAS_INSTALL_ROOT` to `WAS_INSTALL_ROOT` and from `USER_INSTALL_ROOT` to `USER_INSTALL_ROOT`.

If you have a RAR file in the WAS_INSTALL_ROOT for Version 6.x, for example, the migration tools do not automatically copy the file from WAS_INSTALL_ROOT to USER_INSTALL_ROOT. This maintains the integrity of the cluster-level J2C resources. If you hardcoded a path to a RAR file (archivePath="C:/WAS/installedConnectors/x2.rar" for example) in Version 6.x, however, the Version 8.0 migration tools cannot change the archivePath attribute to reflect this because that would break all of the other cluster members that have not been migrated.

Samples

No migration of samples from previous versions is available. There are equivalent WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 samples that you can install.

Security

Java 2 security is enabled by default when you enable security in WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0. Java 2 security requires you to grant security permissions explicitly.

When migrating to WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0, your choice of whether or not to migrate to support script compatibility results in one of two different outcomes.

- If you choose to migrate to support script compatibility, your security configuration is brought over to Version 8.0 without any changes.

This is the default.

- If you choose not to migrate to support script compatibility, the security configuration is converted to the default configuration for WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0. The default security configuration for Version 6.1 and later acts almost the same as in the previous versions, but there are some changes.

For example, existing keyfiles and trustfiles are moved out of the SSLConfig repertoire and new keystore and truststore objects are created.

All SSL configuration repertoires of the System Secure Sockets Layer (SSSL) type, except those that belong to the daemon, are converted to the Java Secure Socket Extension (JSSE) type.

For more information on migrating your security configurations to Version 8.0, read the "Migrating, coexisting, and interoperating – Security considerations" article in the information center.

Stdin, stdout, stderr, passivation, and working directories

In WebSphere Application Server for z/OS, outputs for stdin, stdout, and stderr are directed to SYSOUT by default. If they are redirected to the configuration directory of a previous version, you might need to change this in the Version 8.0 JCL.

The migration tools attempt to migrate existing passivation and working directories. Otherwise, appropriate Version 8.0 defaults are used.

If WebSphere Application Server for z/OS user IDs have home directories in the configuration directory of a previous version, you should update them before migration to reside in another location.

Note: In a coexistence scenario, using common directories between versions can create problems.

Transport ports

The migration tools migrate all ports. You must resolve any port conflicts before you can run servers at the same time.

Note: If ports are already defined in a configuration being migrated, the migration tools fix the port conflicts in the Version 8.0 configuration and log the changes for your verification .

You must manually add virtual host alias entries for each port. For more information, read the "Configuring virtual hosts" article in the information center.

Web modules

The specification level of the Java Platform, Enterprise Edition (Java EE) implemented in WebSphere Application Server Version 6.0.x required behavior changes in the web container for setting the content type. If a default servlet writer does not set the content type, not only does the web container no longer default to it but the web container returns the call as "null." This situation might cause some browsers to display resulting web container tags incorrectly. To prevent this problem from occurring, migration sets the `autoResponseEncoding` IBM extension to "true" for web modules as it migrates enterprise applications.

JVM system properties

If you migrate a Version 6.1 configuration that has feature packs installed, the migration tools might add one or two JVM system properties for each Java server in your configuration, including your administrative servers. Web servers are not affected. The properties are set to indicate to the JVM that the configuration should use a Java annotation scan policy other than the Version 8.0 default scan policy.

- If you migrate a Version 6.1 profile that has the Feature Pack for EJB 3.0 installed, the migration tools add the following system property to the JVM definitions for all Java servers defined on that node:

```
com.ibm.websphere.ejb.UseEJB61FEPScanPolicy = true
```

- If you migrate a Version 6.1 profile that has the Feature Pack for Web Services installed, the migration tools add the following system property to the JVM definitions for all Java servers defined on that node:

```
com.ibm.websphere.webservices.UseSFEP61ScanPolicy = true
```

- If you migrate a Version 6.1 profile that has both the Feature Pack for EJB 3.0 and the Feature Pack for Web Services installed, the migration tools add both of the system properties to the JVM definitions for all Java servers defined on that node:

```
com.ibm.websphere.ejb.UseEJB61FEPScanPolicy = true  
com.ibm.websphere.webservices.UseSFEP61ScanPolicy = true
```

A WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment configuration requires that the deployment manager profile be augmented with all of the feature packs used in the cell. This means that the deployment-manager profile can potentially have both feature packs installed even if none of its federated nodes have both installed.

If these properties are set, the following two changes take place in the default Version 8.0 behavior:

- Application installation generates classes based on the annotation scan policy associated with the settings for those two properties.

This means that you can potentially use the following four annotation scan policies:

- Version 8 default behavior
 - Feature Pack for EJB 3.0 behavior
 - Feature Pack for Web Services behavior
 - Net behavior from having both the Feature Pack for EJB 3.0 and the Feature Pack for Web Services installed
- The servers use the generated annotation classes based on the properties set, resulting in four potential behaviors.

You can change the scan policy behavior by adding or removing the custom JVM system properties from your `server.xml` files.

Important: To evoke the correct installApp behavior, the server.xml file for the deployment manager must retain any property specified for any node in the cell. After changing the properties, you must reinstall or update your applications and then resynchronize the cell to implement the change.

Planning to migrate product configurations for z/OS

You must prepare your system to migrate from WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 6.x and Version 7.x to Version 8.0.

Before you begin

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS supports migration paths to Version 8.0 from the following releases:

- Version 6.x
- Version 7.x

In addition to migration, it is possible for these WebSphere Application Server versions to coexist with Version 8.0.

These tools primarily provide support for saving the configuration and applications from a previous version of the product into a migration-specific backup directory and then importing that configuration into the latest version of the application server.

About this task

The z/OS Migration Management Tool itself does not perform the migration; it creates batch jobs and instructions that you can use to perform the actual migration tasks. The jobs and instructions that you

generate using the z/OS Migration Management Tool form a migration definition on your workstation that you then upload to your z/OS system and use for the migration.

In WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0, you can use the z/OS Migration Management Tool and the jobs as well as instructions that it generates to migrate to Version 8.0 nodes. After you actually migrate a node, however, you must use the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0 administrative console or scripting to administer it.

Tip: The z/OS Migration Management Tool creates a response file to hold the various values that you enter when you generate a WebSphere Application Server for z/OS migration definition. This response file remains on the workstation on which the z/OS Migration Management Tool is run, and you can use this file as a basis for creating similar migration definitions later. Using the zmmt command to create migration definitions on z/OS

Note: The zmmt command is intended for use by a systems programmer or administrator who is familiar with the z/OS target system on which the migrated Version 8.0 nodes run.

About this task

Overview

You can use the zmmt command to create migration jobs for migrating WebSphere Application Server Version 6.1.x or Version 7.x nodes to Version 8.0. The zmmt command itself does not perform the migration; it creates batch jobs and instructions that you can then use to perform the actual migration tasks.

The zmmt command is an alternative to the z/OS Migration Management Tool. You might want to use this command rather than the tool to create migration jobs if you have no workstations with the WebSphere Customization Toolbox available or need to automate the generation of your migration jobs.

You run the zmmt command using a migration response file that you create manually.

Tip: Migrating a WebSphere Application Server application-serving environment requires a fair amount of planning and coordination. If you have not previously migrated an application server, you should first migrate a "practice" standalone application server using a sample response file.

Note: In WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0, you can use the z/OS Migration Management Tool or the `zmmt` command and the jobs that they generate to migrate from Version 6.1.x or Version 7.x to Version 8.0 nodes. After you actually migrate a node, however, you use the WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 administrative console or scripting to administer it.

Location of the shell script

The `zmmt.sh` shell script is located in the `smpe_root/bin` directory.

Parameters

-responseFile

This parameter is used to specify the path to your response file.

This cannot be used with the `-profilePath` parameter.

-profilePath

This parameter is used to specify a fully qualified path name to an existing set of generated jobs.

This cannot be used with the `-responseFile` parameter.

-workspace

This required parameter is used to specify the Eclipse workspace directory.

This must match the path specified in the response file before the `.metadata` directory for the `profilePath` and `templatePath` variables.

-transfer

This optional parameter is used to copy generated jobs from a UNIX System Services (USS) file system to a pair of partitioned datasets.

The `zmmt` command first writes the migration jobs to a USS file system.

-allocate

This optional parameter is used to attempt to allocate the target datasets.

This parameter cannot be used without the `-transfer` parameter.

Datasets are determined by appending the values `".CNTL"` and `".DATA"` to the `zTargetHLQ` value for the profile containing the jobs that are being copied. This operation overwrites existing files of the same name in those datasets.

Examples

The following examples describe typical command lines with attributes for the `zmmt` command. In these examples, `/xxx` can be any directory to which the user invoking the `zmmt.sh` script has read and write access.

- `zmmt.sh -workspace /xxx -responseFile /xxx/ZAppSrvcmd.responseFile`

This example generates the migration jobs in the location specified by the `profilePath` option in the response file.

- `zmmt.sh -workspace /xxx -responseFile /xxx/ZAppSrvcmd.responseFile -transfer -allocate`
. This example performs the following actions:
 - Generates the migration jobs in the location specified by the `profilePath` option in the response file
 - Transfers the jobs from the file system to the `CNTL` and `DATA` datasets

- Allocates the target CNTL and DATA datasets using the high-level qualifier specified by the targetHLQ option in the response file
- `zmmt.sh -workspace /xxx -profilePath /xxx/ZAppSrvcmd -transfer -allocate`
This example performs the following actions:
 - Transfers the generated jobs at the location specified by the `-profilePath` parameter to those datasets
 - Allocates the target CNTL and DATA datasets using the high-level qualifier specified by the targetHLQ option in the response file

Note: This usage assumes that migration jobs have already been generated with a previous invocation of the `zmmt.sh` script.

- `zmmt.sh -workspace /xxx -transfer -responseFile /xxx/ZAppSrvcmd.responseFile`
This example transfers the generated jobs from the location specified by the `profilePath` option in the response file to the generated CNTL and DATA datasets.

Note: This usage assumes that the jobs have already been generated with a previous invocation of the `zmmt.sh` script and that the target CNTL and DATA datasets have already been allocated.

Procedure

1. Prepare the type of response file that you need.
 - To prepare a response file for creating jobs for migrating a standalone application server, see “Specifying a z/OS stand-alone application server migration configuration in the `zmmt` command response file: Worksheet” on page 58.
 - To prepare a response file for creating jobs for migrating a deployment manager, see “Specifying a z/OS federated node migration configuration in the `zmmt` command response file: Worksheet” on page 105.
 - To prepare a response file for creating jobs for migrating a federated node, see “Specifying a z/OS deployment manager migration configuration in the `zmmt` command response file: Worksheet” on page 86.
2. On your target z/OS system, run the `zmmt.sh` shell script using your prepared response file.
The command creates the CNTL and DATA files needed to run the required jobs. The response file needs to be located in the UNIX (USS) file system.

Results

After you run the `zmmt.sh` script, you should see something similar to the following output:

```
smpc_root/bin:> zmmt.sh /zmmt/workspace
-responseFile /ZMigDmgr01.responseFile -allocate -transfer<

osgi> Customization definition successfully written to
/zmt/workspace/.metadata/.plugins/com.ibm.ws390.mmt.config/profiles/ZMigDmgr01

Attempting to allocate dataset: ZMMT.CNTL
Allocation successful.
Attempting to allocate dataset: ZMMT.DATA
Allocation successful.
Copying CNTL files to ZMMT.CNTL...
Copy successful.
Copying DATA files to ZMMT.DATA...
Copy successful.
```

The migration jobs have been copied to the CNTL and DATA datasets. Follow the generated instructions provided in the CNTL dataset to perform the actual migration.

clientUpgrade command

Use the **clientUpgrade** command to migrate previous versions of client resources to Version 8 level resources.

Use the **clientUpgrade** command to migrate Version 6.x and Version 7 client resources to Version 8 level resources. In the process of migrating these resources, the `client-resources.xmi` file that is located in the client JAR files is migrated to the latest level. A backup of the `client-resources.xmi` file is also located in the client JAR file. If this command is not launched against the client EAR files before they are installed on Version 8, the client EAR files do not operate or install correctly.

Locate the command file in the `app_server_root/bin` directory.

```
clientUpgrade EAR_file [-clientJar client_jar ][-logFileLocation logFileLocation]
[-traceString trace_spec [-traceFile file_name ]]
```

Parameters

Supported arguments include the following:

EAR_file

Use this parameter to specify the fully qualified path to the EAR file that contains client JAR files to process.

-clientJar

Use this optional parameter to specify a JAR file for processing. If not specified, the program transforms all client JAR files in the EAR file.

-logFileLocation log_file_location

Use this optional parameter to specify an alternate location to store the log output.

-traceString trace_spec -traceFile file_name

Use these optional parameters to gather trace information for IBM Service personnel. Specify a `trace_spec` of `"*=all=enabled"` (with quotation marks) to gather all trace information.

The following example demonstrates correct syntax:

```
clientUpgrade EAR_file -clientJar ejbJarFile
```

convertScriptCompatibility command

The `convertScriptCompatibility` command is used by administrators to convert their configurations from a mode that supports backward compatibility of WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x or Version 7.0.x administration scripts to a mode that is fully in the Version 8.0 configuration model.

The scope of the configuration changes depend on the type of profile that is being processed.

- For stand-alone configurations, the default is to convert all servers owned by the node in that configuration.
Use the `-serverName` parameter for more granular control.
- For WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment configurations, the default behavior is to convert all nodes and all servers owned by those nodes.
Use the `-nodeName` and `-serverName` parameters for more granular control.

Nodes are checked to verify that they are at a WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 level before they are processed in order to support mixed-node configurations. Client environments are not processed.

The following conversions take place with this tool:

- transports to channels

Existing transport entries in the configuration from WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x are mapped to channel support. This affects `server.xml` and `serverindex.xml` files. The values of the transport settings are used to create new channel entries.

- **SSL configuration**

WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 contains enhancements to SSL configuration that result in refactoring the existing SSL configuration model. Both the old and the new model are supported. The default is to map to the WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x or Version 7.x SSL configuration model.

- **bootstrapAddress to bootstrapAddresses**

Each single bootstrap address configuration is converted to a new bootstrap address list configuration containing that single bootstrap address.

- **ObjectRequestBroker from not using the server thread pool to using it**

For example, `<ObjectRequestBroker useServerThreadPool="false" ...>` is changed to `<ObjectRequestBroker useServerThreadPool="true">`.

Location

The `convertScriptCompatibility` command is located in the following directory.

- `profile_root/bin`

Syntax

The syntax is as follows:

```
convertScriptCompatibility.sh [-help]
```

```
convertScriptCompatibility.sh [-backupConfig true | false]
                             [-nodeName node_name [-serverName server_name]]
                             [-traceString trace_spec [-traceFile file_name]]
```

Parameters

Supported arguments include the following parameters:

-help

This displays help for this command

-backupConfig

This is an optional parameter that is used to back up the existing configuration of the current profile. The default is `true`—that is, to use the `backupConfig` command to save a copy of the current configuration into the `profile_name/temp` directory.

Use the `restoreConfig` command to restore that configuration as required.

Read the "restoreConfig command" article in the information center for more information.

-nodeName

This is an optional parameter that is used to specify a particular node name be processed rather than every node in the configuration. If this is not specified, all nodes in the configuration are converted.

-serverName

This is an optional parameter that is used to specify a particular server name to be processed rather than every server in the configuration. It can be used on all profile types and can be used in conjunction with the `-nodeName` parameter when processing WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment configurations. If this parameter is not specified, all servers in the configuration are converted. If it is used in conjunction with the `-nodeName` parameter, all processing is limited to the specified node name.

-traceString

This is an optional parameter. The value *trace_spec* specifies the trace information that you want to collect. To gather all trace information, specify "**=all=enabled*" (with quotation marks). The default is to not gather trace information. If you specify this parameter, you must also specify the `-traceFile` parameter.

-traceFile

This is an optional parameter. The value *file_name* specifies the name of the output file for trace information. If you specify the `-traceString` parameter but do not specify the `-traceFile` parameter, the command does not generate a trace file.

Usage

Stand-alone application server profile

Example scenario

1. Choose to migrate to support script compatibility when you migrate the stand-alone application server.
2. Follow these steps to convert all servers under this stand-alone profile:
 - a. Open a command window.
 - b. Change to the Version 8.0 profile's *profile_root/bin* directory.
 - c. Run the following command:

```
convertScriptCompatibility.sh
```

Deployment manager with federated nodes

Example scenario 1

1. Choose to migrate to support script compatibility when you migrate the deployment manager and all of its federated nodes.
2. Follow these steps to convert all nodes and servers in this cell.

Important: The following steps should be taken against the deployment-manager management profile. If you run the `convertScriptCompatibility` command against a federated profile, the changes will be removed the next time the deployment manager synchronizes with the federated node.

- a. Open a command window.
 - b. Change to the Version 8.0 deployment-manager management profile's *profile_root/bin* directory.
 - c. Run the following command:

```
convertScriptCompatibility.sh
```
3. Perform a full resynchronization of the deployment manager's configuration with each federated node to produce a consistent configuration.

Example scenario 2

1. Choose **not** to migrate to support script compatibility when you migrate the deployment manager.
2. Choose to migrate to support script compatibility when you migrate the deployment manager's federated nodes.
3. Follow these steps to convert all non-converted nodes and servers in the cell.

Important: The following steps should be taken against the deployment-manager management profile. If you run the `convertScriptCompatibility` command against a federated profile, the changes will be removed the next time the deployment manager synchronizes with the federated node.

- a. Open a command window.

- b. Change to the Version 8.0 deployment-manager management profile's *profile_root/bin* directory.
- c. For each federated node that has not been converted, run the following command:

```
convertScriptCompatibility.sh -nodeName ${non_converted_nodename}
```
4. Perform a full resynchronization of the deployment manager's configuration with each federated node to produce a consistent configuration.

For more information about where to run this command, read the "Using command line tools" article in the information center.

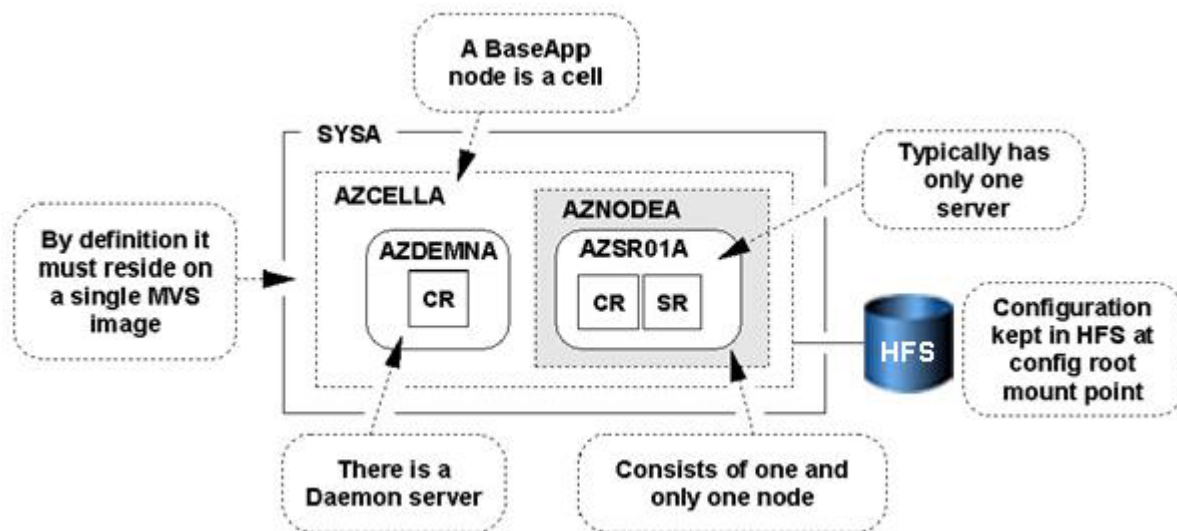
Preparing to migrate a z/OS stand-alone application server

Preparing to migrate a stand-alone application server node to WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0 includes activities related to inventorying your existing configuration as well as generating CNTL and DATA datasets that you will use in the actual migration.

Before you begin

Read “Overview of migration, coexistence, and interoperability” on page 1 and “Premigration considerations” on page 6.

Migrating a stand-alone application server node is relatively simple because it consists of a single server and a daemon.



You might have configured multiple application servers inside a stand-alone application server node. Generally, this configuration is not recommended; but if you have this configuration, the migration utilities will migrate all servers in the node just as it would all the servers in a Network Deployment application server node.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0 supplies migration jobs in the target dataset that you allocate when you generate your migration jobs. Use these jobs to perform the actual migration.

- BBOWMG1B
- BBOWMG2B
- BBOMBHFS or BBOMBZFS
- BBOWMG3B
- BBOWBPRO
- BBOWBPRES
- BBOWBPOS
- BBOMBPCP

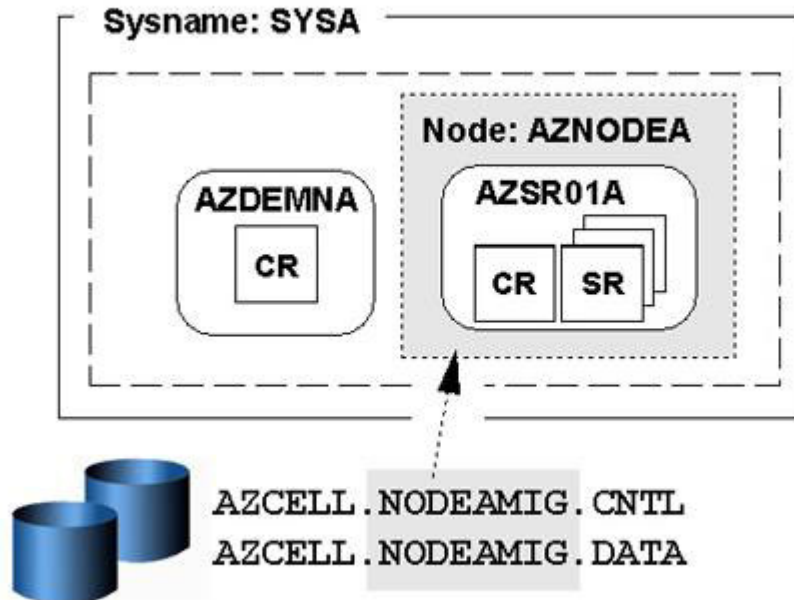

2. Produce migration CNTL and DATA datasets for the node.

You must provide a set of CNTL and DATA datasets for the migration utilities to read in order to perform the migration. Generate a set of customized jobs for the node in your configuration that you want to migrate.



Some important points about these steps:

- You submit these customized jobs
- When you go through the panels to generate these customized datasets, you must supply information related to your configuration on most of the panels. This information is used to generate your customized jobs.

For a description of what you must do in the z/OS Migration Management Tool to generate your customized CNTL and DATA datasets, read “Preparing to migrate a stand-alone application server using the z/OS Migration Management Tool.”

For a description of what you must do to use the zmmt command to generate your customized CNTL and DATA datasets, read “Using the zmmt command to create migration definitions on z/OS” on page 32.

The purpose of creating these customized CNTL and DATA datasets is to give the migration utilities access to key information about your new Version 8.0 configuration as well as access to shell scripts customized with this new information. The migration utilities get the bulk of the configuration information from your existing Version 6.x or Version 7.x configuration file system.

Preparing to migrate a stand-alone application server using the z/OS Migration Management Tool

Before you migrate a WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 6.x or Version 7.x node to Version 8.0, you must create Job Control Language (JCL) jobs (CNTL and DATA datasets) that you will run on z/OS during the actual migration. You can use the z/OS Migration Management Tool to create a migration definition and upload jobs for migrating a stand-alone application server.

 - Fill in the fields on the panels using the values from your “Specifying a stand-alone application server migration configuration in the z/OS Migration Management Tool: Worksheet” on page 48.
2. Review the stand-alone application server migration definition to make sure that all the values are correct.
 - a. In the **WebSphere Application Server for z/OS migration definition** table, select the migration definition that you want to review.
 - b. Click **View**.
 - c. Click the **Summary**, **Instructions**, or **Response file** tab for information about the migration definition.
3. Upload the migration jobs to the target z/OS system.

Configuration variables for migrating a stand-alone application server using the z/OS Migration Management Tool:

Before you migrate a WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 6.x or 7.x node to Version 8.0, you must create Job Control Language (JCL) jobs (CNTL and DATA datasets) that you will run on z/OS during the actual migration. You can use the z/OS Migration Management Tool to create a migration definition and upload the appropriate migration jobs. The z/OS Migration Management Tool presents you with a set of configuration variables when creating a definition for migrating a stand-alone application server.

Migration Node Type Selection

Migration node type

Type of WebSphere Application Server node to migrate

Migration Definition Name

This section identifies the migration definition name and directory path to contain the batch jobs and instructions that will be used to migrate a WebSphere Application Server for z/OS node.

Migration definition name

Name of the z/OS migration definition

This name is used solely on the workstation to identify the migration jobs and instructions that are generated. The name chosen will have no effect on the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS configuration.

Response file path name (optional)

Full path name of a response file that contains default values to be preloaded in the tool

A response file is written each time a z/OS migration definition is created. It contains all of the variable data that was used to create the migration definition, and it can be used to preload the default values when defining a similar migration definition. The response file for a given migration definition is written to the *migration_definition_name.responseFile* file within the root directory for the migration definition.

Normally, you should specify a response file from a migration definition of the same type as that which you are about to define.

Note: A copy of the response file is included in the .DATA dataset that is included in the migration definition that you upload to a z/OS target system. This response file is not used on the z/OS system, but it is there for reference. The member name of the dataset is ZMMTBASE.

Target Datasets

High-level qualifier (HLQ)

High-level qualifier for the target z/OS datasets that will contain the generated jobs and instructions

When a z/OS migration definition is uploaded to the target z/OS system, the migration jobs and files are written to a pair of partitioned datasets. While it is possible to reuse these datasets, it is safest to create separate datasets for each z/OS system that is to be migrated.

- **HLQ.CNTL** - a partitioned dataset with fixed block 80-byte records to contain migration jobs
- **HLQ.DATA** - a partitioned dataset with variable length data to contain other data contained in the migration definition

Note: A multilevel high-level qualifier can be specified as the dataset high-level qualifier.

Dataset Names and Product Directory

JCL procedure library dataset name

Existing procedure library to which the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS cataloged procedures are to be copied

WebSphere Application Server product directory

Location of your WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 installed product file system

Intermediate symbolic link

Select this option to allow to set up an intermediate symbolic link, and specify the path name of that link if you select it.

If you specify an intermediate symbolic link, symbolic links are created from the configuration file system to the intermediate symbolic link; otherwise, they are created directly to the product file system.

Selecting this option will allow you to specify the path name of an intermediate symbolic link. This link will be created by the customization jobs, pointing to the product file system directory.

Path name of intermediate symbolic link

Path name of intermediate symbolic link

Configuration File System

The configuration file system is where the configuration for the node being migrated is physically stored. You can choose to use an existing Version 8.0 file system if you already have an appropriate file system on the node being migrated. If you choose to use an existing Version 8.0 file system, you need to ensure that the mount point that you specify here is present before running the migration utilities (BBOWMG1B, BBOWMG2B, and so on) that are created using this tool. If you choose to create a new Version 8.0 file

system on the node being migrated, the actual creation of the new file system will not occur until you run the optional BBOMBHFS or BBOMBZFS job during the actual migration process. In any case, you must specify the correct value here for the mount point.

Refer to the customized instructions generated by this tool for specific information on setting the correct ownership and permissions on the configuration mount point. Read the generated instructions and “Migrating a stand-alone application server on the z/OS operating system” on page 62 for more information on specifying these variables.

Mount point

Read/write file system directory mount point where application data and environment files are written

If this mount point does not already exist, the migration process creates it when you run the optional BBOMBHFS or BBOMBZFS job.

Name File system dataset that you will create and mount at the above mount point

Volume, or '*' for SMS

Specify either the DASD volume serial number to contain the above dataset or "*" to let SMS select a volume.

Using "*" requires that SMS automatic class selection (ACS) routines be in place to select the volume. If you do not have SMS set up to handle dataset allocation automatically, list the volume explicitly.

Primary allocation in cylinders

Initial size allocation in cylinders for the configuration file system dataset

In an application server, the total space needed for this dataset increases with the size and number of installed applications.

Recommendation: The minimum suggested size is 420 cylinders.

Secondary allocation in cylinders

Size of each secondary extent in cylinders

Recommendation: The minimum suggested size is 100 cylinders.

File system type

Hierarchical File System (HFS)

Allocate and mount your configuration file system dataset using HFS

zSeries® File System (ZFS)

Allocate and mount your configuration file system dataset using ZFS

When migrating to Version 8.0, you must upgrade your JCL started procedures. A new started procedure will be generated for you during migration. You can specify a new name for the daemon procedure or use the old one.

Controller procedure name

Name of the JCL started procedure used to start the migrated controllers

When migrating to Version 8.0, you must upgrade your JCL started procedures. A new started procedure will be generated for you during migration. You can specify a new name for the controller procedure or use the old one.

Servant procedure name

Name of the JCL started procedure used to start the migrated servants

When migrating to Version 8.0, you must upgrade your JCL started procedures. A new started procedure will be generated for you during migration. You can specify a new name for the servant procedure or use the old one.

Adjunct procedure name

Name of the JCL started procedure used to start the migrated adjunct

When migrating to Version 8.0, you must upgrade your JCL started procedures. A new started procedure will be generated for you during migration. You can specify a new name for the adjunct procedure or use the old one.

Replace started procedure command names

If you specified new names for your JCL procedures, then the corresponding START commands in the WebSphere Application Server configuration must be updated to match the new procedure names. Select this option to perform this configuration update.

If you choose to use the same procedure names, then do not select this option. If you are not using consistent procedure names for all the servers of a given process type (all servants for example) for the node that you are migrating, then it is recommended that you do not select this option. In this case, you will need to keep the same START commands and manually replace the procedures using the procedure that is generated during migration as a template.

Notes:

- Your Version 8.0 configuration must use different JCL procedures from those used by your Version 6.x configuration. The migration process creates new Version 8.0 JCL procedures using the procedure names specified here.
- If you use the same names as you used in your Version 6.x configuration, the migration process overlays the existing procedures. If you are using the same names, make sure that you back up the existing Version 6.x procedures before running the migration jobs in case you need to roll back later.

Server Customization (Part 2)**Migrate to support script compatibility**

Whether or not to migrate to support script compatibility

This specifies whether or not migration should create the following Version 6.x configuration definitions:

- Transport
- ProcessDef
- Version 6.x SSL

- Version 6.x ORB service threadpool

instead of the following Version 8.0 configuration definitions:

- Channels
- ProcessDefs
- Version 8.0 SSL
- Version 8.0 ORB service threadpool

Choose to migrate to support script compatibility if you want to minimize impacts to existing administration scripts. If you have existing wsadmin scripts or programs that use third-party configuration APIs to create or modify the Version 6.x configuration definitions, for example, you might want to choose this option.

Note: This is meant to provide a temporary transition until all of the nodes in the environment are at the Version 8.0 level. When they are all at the Version 8.0 level, you should perform the following actions:

1. Modify your administration scripts to use all of the Version 8.0 settings.
2. Use the `convertScriptCompatibility` command to convert your configurations to match all of the Version 8.0 settings.

Application migration preference

How you would like to migrate your installed applications

Note: WebSphere Application Server system applications will migrate regardless of the value set here.

Migrate applications and use the default application installation directory

Install user enterprise applications in the default application installation directory as part of the migration

Migrate applications and use the specified application installation directory

Install user enterprise applications in a specified application installation directory as part of the migration

Application installation directory

Location where WebSphere Application Server installs your enterprise applications

This location is used when you specify that you want to migrate and install applications as your application migration preference. You have the option to choose a customized environment-specific location or use the default location.

Migrate and generate administrative scripts to install applications later

Prepare user enterprise applications for installation in the WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 `installableApps` directory without actually installing them during migration

Scripts that can be used to install these applications are generated and saved in the migration backup directory. For WebSphere Application Server for z/OS, the location of this backup directory is relative to the temporary directory that you specify on this same panel. The location of the backup directory is also determined by the derived migration identifier and the type of node being migrated. If you specify `/tmp/migrate` as the temporary directory and the derived migration identifier is 55449, for example, then the location of the generated scripts is:

```
/tmp/migrate/55449/nodetype_backup/
```

where *nodetype* is `dmgr`, `fed`, or `base` depending on the type of node that you are migrating.

You can then run these files at any point and in any combination after migration has completed. You can also reorganize and combine these files for better application installation efficiency. Read the "Wsadmin tool" article in the information center for additional information.

Migrate applications and use the previous application installation directory

Install user enterprise applications as part of the migration, and keep the same application installation directories as the previous version

Restrictions: If you select this option, the location is shared by the existing WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x installation and the Version 8.0 installation. If you keep the migrated applications in the same locations as those of the previous version, the following restrictions apply:

- The WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 mixed-node support limitations must be followed. This means that the following support cannot be used when evoking the wsadmin command:
 - Precompile JSP
 - Use Binary Configuration
 - Deploy EJB
- You risk losing the migrated applications unintentionally if you later delete applications from these locations when administering (uninstalling for example) your Version 6.x installation.

In other words, the absolute location is not preserved—the application is migrated to the relative location within the new Version 8.0 environment. If the binariesURL in the deployment.xml file for an application being migrated has a path that is relative to WebSphere Application Server—that is, it begins with \$(APP_INSTALL_ROOT), \$(WAS_INSTALL_ROOT), and so on—the new WebSphere Application Server variable value is used to resolve the path when the application is installed in the new location. This leads to the following results when you select this option:
 - Any application that is installed in a directory location relative to a WebSphere Application Server variable is installed under that variable value in Version 8.0.

Before you migrate a WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 6.x or Version 7.x node to Version 8.0, you must create Job Control Language (JCL) jobs (CNTL and DATA datasets) that you will run on z/OS during the actual migration. You can use the zmmt command to create jobs for migrating a stand-alone application server.

Before you begin

Procedure

1. Print and complete the “Specifying a z/OS stand-alone application server migration configuration in the zmmt command response file: Worksheet” on page 58.
2. Follow the instructions in “Using the zmmt command to create migration definitions on z/OS” on page 32.

Use the values from your “Specifying a stand-alone application server migration configuration in the z/OS Migration Management Tool: Worksheet” on page 48.

What to do next

1. Follow the instructions in the BBOMBINS member of the CNTL dataset that you generated using the zmmt command.

where *nodetype* is `dmgr`, `fed`, or `base` depending on the type of node that you are migrating.

- You risk losing the migrated applications unintentionally if you later delete applications from these locations when administering (uninstalling for example) your Version 6.x installation.

Migrating a z/OS stand-alone application server: Checklist

Activities for migrating a stand-alone application server to WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 after you generate the appropriate Job Control Language (JCL) jobs include activities related to general preparation, transaction-log clearance, and node migration. Migrating a stand-alone application server on the z/OS operating system

After you generate Job Control Language (JCL) jobs for migrating a stand-alone application server node to WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0, you can perform the actual migration by running those jobs. When you generated your custom migration jobs, you also created customized instructions for preparing and running the migration jobs in the BBOMBINS members of the CNTL dataset that was used to generate your jobs. Follow these customized instructions to complete the process of migrating your stand-alone application server to Version 8.0.

Before you begin

- Read “Overview of migration, coexistence, and interoperability” on page 1 and “Premigration considerations” on page 6.
- You will not be able to proceed if you did not generate the JCL migration jobs.
- The BBOWMG1B, BBOWMG2B, BBOWMG3B, BBOWBPRO, BBOWBPRES, and BBOWBPOS jobs referenced in these instructions must be submitted by a WebSphere Administrator User ID. All other jobs must be submitted by a user ID that has control over the file system.
- **Tip:** Before migrating a WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x or 7.x stand-alone application server, use the backupConfig command or your own preferred backup utility to back up your existing configuration if you want to be able to restore it to its previous state after migration. Read the “backupConfig command” article in the information center for more information. Make sure that you note the exact name and location of this backed-up configuration.

For help, read Chapter 11, “Troubleshooting migration,” on page 143.

Procedure

1. Create and mount a new Version 8.0 configuration file system.

Before you perform the migration, Version 8.0 requires a file system to be present for your new configuration. You can run the BBOMBHFS or BBOMBZFS job to create and mount a new configuration file system, or you can mount one manually. Either way, you must have a file system for your Version 8.0 configuration created and mounted before you proceed. This configuration file system is the target of the migration; your Version 6.x or 7.x configuration file system is the source.

The BBOMBHFS or BBOMBZFS job creates a mount point directory, allocates the configuration's file system, and mounts the file system at whatever value you specified for the mount point when you generated your migration jobs.

Ensure that you allocated, created, and mounted your configuration file system datasets either manually or using the BBOMBHFS or BBOMBZFS job before you proceed. The mount point should be owned by the WebSphere Admin ID and have permissions of at least 755. The new configuration file system structures should be included in BPXPARM so that they will be mounted at the next IPL.

2. Copy your generated JCL procedures.

The migration utility BBOMBCP copies the generated JCL procedures used to start the servers to the specified procedure library. Your Version 8.0 configuration must use different JCL procedures from those used by your Version 6.x or 7.x configuration. This utility will update the new Version 8.0 configuration, substituting your new JCL names in place of the names that existed in your original Version 6.x or 7.x configuration.

Caution: This utility copies the generated JCL to your procedure library. If you specified the same names as you used in your Version 6.x or 7.x configuration when you generated your migration jobs, this utility will overlay the existing procedures. If you are using the same names, make sure that you back up the existing Version 6.x or 7.x procedures before running this utility in case you need to roll back later.

Submit the BBOMBCP job, and verify a return code of 0.

- If you specified new procedure names, update your RACF STARTED profiles for the controller and daemon.

The STARTED profile used by controller regions is based on the procedure name and JOBNAME. You must ensure that a STARTED profile will apply so that the proper identity will be assigned to the started task. If your Version 6.x or 7.x controller JCL procedure name is AZACR and you specified AZ6ACR for Version 7, for example, then you would need to create a STARTED profile for that new procedure name:

new controller	same identity used in
JCL name	V6.x or V7.x configuration

```
RDEFINE STARTED AZ6ACR.* STDATA(USER(AZACRU) GROUP(AZCFG) TRACE(YES))
```

Note:

- Do not use a different user ID to start. There are other things tied to the user ID; and if you change the user ID, other changes would also be required.
- If your original STARTED profile was generic, STARTED AZ*.* ... for example, you would not need to create a new STARTED profile.
- Servant region STARTED profiles are based on JOBNAME, not procedure name. So there is no issue with the servant when you use a different procedure name.
- Daemons and node agents are controllers, so using different procedure names for those implies a new STARTED profile.

- Submit the BBOWMG1B and BBOWMG2B jobs.

Note: If you are not using XA connectors, submitting the BBOWMG1B and BBOWMG2B jobs is optional. However, you should submit both jobs to ensure that your transaction logs are clear.

The BBOWMG1B job enables all servers on the application server node being migrated to start in Peer Restart and Recovery (PRR) processing mode. PRR processing mode resolves any outstanding transactions, clears the transaction logs, and stops the server. The BBOWMG2B job disables PRR mode and returns all servers to normal operating state.

Follow these steps to clear the XA transaction logs:

- Submit the BBOWMG1B job, and verify a return code of 0.
 - Restart the application server, and wait for it to perform PRR processing and stop automatically.
 - Submit the BBOWMG2B job, and verify a return code of 0.
- Stop the Version 6.x or 7.x daemon and application server.

The daemon must be at the highest version level of any of the servers that it manages on the same LPAR. It will be at the Version 8.0 level when the server is started.

You must stop the Version 6.x or 7.x application server before proceeding.

- Delete and redefine the log stream.

Perform this step only if you previously configured the transaction XA partner log or compensation log on the Version 6.x or 7.x server to use a log stream.

- Make sure that the node is stopped.
- Delete and redefine the log stream.

You can use the BBOLOGSD and BBOLOGSA jobs that were created during Version 6.x or 7.x customization if you configured the server initially to use the log stream.

The following sample shows an example of such a job:

7. Perform one of the following actions:

a. Submit the BBOWMG3B job.

The BBOWMG3B job performs the physical migration of the Version 6.x or 7.x node to Version 8.0 based on the information that you supplied when you generated your migration jobs. Submit the BBOWMG3B job, verify that you are getting return codes of 0, and review the log files in the migration temporary directory on the file system. The migration temporary directory is *temporary_directory_location/nnnnn*, where *temporary_directory_location* is the directory specified for the temporary directory location (/tmp/migrate by default) and *nnnnn* is the numeric value generated for the migration identifier when you generated your migration jobs.

b. Submit the following three jobs:

1) Submit the BBOWBPRO job.

BBOWBPRO creates the Websphere Application Server home and default profile.

2) Submit the BBOWBPRES job.

BBOWBPRES runs the migration pre-upgrade process.

3) Submit the BBOWBPOS job.

BBOWBPOS runs the migration post-upgrade and finish-up (change file permission) processes.

8. Start the new application server node.

Use the existing commands that you would use to start a Version 6.x or 7.x application server, but replace the RACF STARTED procedure name with the value that you entered for the controller procedure name when you generated your migration jobs. This command starts the Version 8.0 application server. Wait until the server is finished initializing before proceeding.

The following message is displayed on the console and in the job log of BBOS001:

At this point, your migration to Version 8.0 is complete.

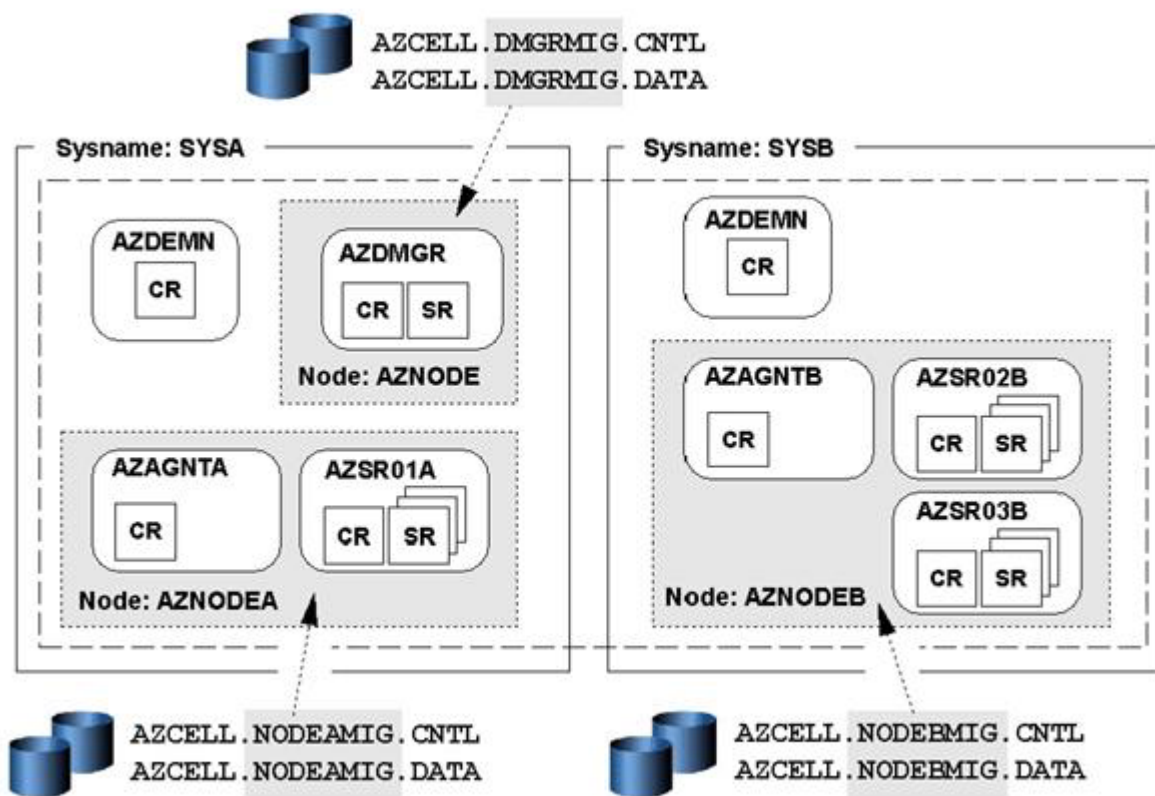

Response file path name (optional)

Full path name of a response file that contains default values to be preloaded in the tool

A response file is written each time a z/OS migration definition is created. It contains all of the variable data that was used to create the migration definition, and it can be used to preload the default values when defining a similar migration definition. The response file for a given migration definition is written to the *migration_definition_name.responseFile* file within the root directory for the migration definition.

Normally, you should specify a response file from a migration definition of the same type as that which you are about to define.

Note: A copy of the response file is included in the .DATA dataset that is included in the migration definition that you upload to a z/OS target system. This response file is not used on the z/OS system, but it is there for reference. The member name of the dataset is ZMMTDMGR.

Target Datasets

High-level qualifier (HLQ)

High-level qualifier for the target z/OS datasets that will contain the generated jobs and instructions

When a z/OS migration definition is uploaded to the target z/OS system, the migration jobs and files are written to a pair of partitioned datasets. While it is possible to reuse these datasets, it is safest to create separate datasets for each z/OS system that is to be migrated.

- **HLQ.CNTL** - a partitioned dataset with fixed block 80-byte records to contain migration jobs
- **HLQ.DATA** - a partitioned dataset with variable length data to contain other data contained in the migration definition

Note: A multilevel high-level qualifier can be specified as the dataset high-level qualifier.

Configuration File System

The configuration file system is where the configuration for the node being migrated is physically stored. You can choose to use an existing Version 8.0 file system if you already have an appropriate file system on the node being migrated. If you choose to use an existing Versions 8.0 file system, you need to ensure that the mount point that you specify here is present before running the migration utilities (BBOMDHFS or BBOMDZFS, BBOMDCP, and so on) that are created using this tool. If you choose to create a new Version 8.0 file system on the node being migrated, the actual creation of the new file system will not occur until you run the optional BBOMDHFS or BBOMDZFS job during the actual migration process. In any case, you must specify the correct value here for the mount point.

Refer to the customized instructions generated by this tool for specific information on setting the correct ownership and permissions on the configuration mount point. Migrating a z/OS deployment manager

After you generate JCL jobs for migrating a deployment manager to WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0, you can perform the actual migration by running those jobs. When you generated your custom migration jobs, you also created customized instructions for preparing and running the migration jobs in the BBOMDINS members of the CNTL dataset that was used to generate your jobs. Follow these customized instructions to complete the process of migrating your deployment manager to Version 8.0.

Before you begin

- Read “Overview of migration, coexistence, and interoperability” on page 1 and “Premigration considerations” on page 6.
- You will not be able to proceed if you did not generate the Job Control Language (JCL) migration jobs.
- Always migrate the deployment manager node first.
- Review the applicable coexistence requirements for your system.
- The BBOWMG3D job referenced in these instructions must be submitted by a WebSphere Administrator User ID.

All other jobs must be submitted by a user ID that has control over the file system.

- Note on maintaining high availability during migration from Version 6.x or 7.x to Version 8.0:

Migrating a deployment manager from Version 6.x or 7.x to Version 8.0 redeploys all application binaries when the deployment manager is restarted. This action results in the deployment manager recycling all the applications across the sysplex. This can cause an outage in a sysplex that is set up for high availability if the synchronization settings are not disabled.

To maintain high availability during the migration, turn off all synchronization options for all of the node agents in the sysplex before restarting the deployment manager.

1. Open the administrative console.
 2. Go to **System administration > Node agents**.
 3. For each node agent in the sysplex, go to *node_agent_server_name* > **File synchronization service** and disable all synchronization processing.
- **Tip:** Before migrating a WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x or 7.x deployment manager, use the backupConfig command or your own preferred backup utility to back up your existing configuration if you want to be able to restore it to its previous state after migration. Read the "backupConfig command" article in the information center for more information. Make sure that you note the exact name and location of this backed-up configuration.

For help, read Chapter 11, "Troubleshooting migration," on page 143.

Procedure

1. Create and mount a new Version 8.0 configuration file system.

Before you perform the migration, Version 8.0 requires a configuration file system to be present for your new configuration. You can run BBOMDHFS or BBOMDZFS to create and mount a new configuration file system, or you can mount one manually. Either way, you must have a configuration file system for your Version 8.0 configuration created and mounted before you proceed. This configuration file system is the target of the migration; your Version 6.x or Version 7.x configuration file system is the source.

BBOMDHFS or BBOMDZFS creates a mount point directory, allocates the configuration's file system, and mounts the file system at whatever value you specified for the mount point when you generated your migration jobs.

Ensure that you have allocated, created, and mounted your configuration file system data sets either manually or using BBOMDHFS or BBOMDZFS before you proceed. The mount point should be owned by the WebSphere Admin ID, and have permissions of at least 755. The new configuration file system structures should be included in BPXPARM so that they will be mounted at the next IPL.

2. Copy your generated JCL procedures.

The migration utility BBOMDCP copies the generated JCL procedures to start the servers to the specified procedure library. Your Version 8.0 configuration must use different JCL procedures from those used by your Version 6.x or Version 7.x configuration. This utility will update the new Version 8.0 configuration, substituting your new JCL names in place of the names that existed in your original Version 6.x or Version 7.x configuration.

Caution: This utility copies the generated JCL to your procedure library. If you specified the same names as you used in your Version 6.x or Version 7.x configuration when you generated your migration jobs, this utility will overlay the existing procedures. If you are using the same names, make sure that you back up the existing Version 6.x or Version 7.x procedures before running this utility in case you need to roll back later.

Submit BBOMDCP, and verify a return code of 0.

3. If you specified new procedure names, update your RACF STARTED profiles for the controller and daemon.

The STARTED profile used by controller regions is based on the procedure name and JOBNAME. You must ensure that a STARTED profile will apply so that the proper identity will be assigned to the

started task. For example, if your Version 6.x or Version 7.x deployment manager controller JCL procedure name is AZDCR, and you specified AZ1DCR for Version 8.0, then you would need to create a STARTED profile for that new procedure name:

	new controller	same identity used in
	JCL name	V6.x or V7.x configuration
RDEFINE	STARTED AZ1DCR.*	STDATA(USER(AZDCRU) GROUP(AZCFG) TRACE(YES))

Note:

- Do not use a different user ID to start. There are other things tied to the user ID, and other changes would also be required if you change the user ID.
- If your original STARTED profile was generic, STARTED AZ*.* ... for example, you would not need to create a new STARTED profile.
- Servant region STARTED profiles are based on JOBNAME, not procedure name. So there is no issue with the servant when you use a different procedure name.
- Daemons and node agents are controllers, so using different procedure names for those implies a new STARTED profile.

4. Perform one of the following actions:

a. Submit the BBOWMG3D job.

A deployment manager migration does not require bringing the node into and out of Peer Restart and Recovery (PRR) mode as stand-alone application server and federated node migrations do. There are two less jobs to submit for a deployment manager migration, therefore, and you are ready to perform the physical migration.

BBOWMG3D is the job that performs the physical migration of the Version 6.x or Version 7.x deployment manager to Version 8.0 based on the information that you supplied when you generated your migration jobs. Submit BBOWMG3D. Verify that you are getting return codes of 0, and review the log files in the migration temp directory on the configuration file system. The migration temporary directory is *temporary_directory_location/nnnnn*, where *temporary_directory_location* is the directory specified for the temporary directory location (/tmp/migrate by default) and *nnnnn* is the numeric value generated for the migration identifier when you generated your migration jobs.

b. Submit the following three jobs:

1) Submit the BBOWDPRO job.

BBOWDPRO creates the Websphere Application Server home and default profile.

2) Submit the BBOWDPRE job.

BBOWDPRE runs the migration pre-upgrade process.

3) Submit the BBOWDPOS job.

BBOWDPOS runs the migration post-upgrade and finish-up (change file permission) processes.

5. Shut down the old application servers and daemon.

Ensure that all nodes on the deployment manager's LPAR in the same cell are shut down.

6. Update daemon JCL procedure if necessary.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0 requires that the daemon process be at the highest level of code of any of the servers that it manages on the same LPAR. It will be at the Version 8.0 level when the deployment manager is started.

After you migrate all nodes to Version 8.0 and before you remove the previous version's libraries from the system, you must update the daemon JCL procedure. Failure to do so will result in a failure of the daemon to start.

Note:

- If you are migrating from Version 6.x or 7.x to Version 8.0, the daemon needs to have a STEPLIB that includes the Version 7.x SBBOLD2 and SBBOLPA datasets.

- If a Version 8.0 cell has a Version 8.0 server that is communicating with a Version 6.0.1.x or 7.x server in a Version 6.0.1.x or 7.x cell that is on the same system as the Version 8.0 cell, you also need to add the version 6.0.1.x SBBOLD2 and SBBOLPA datasets to the STEPLIB of the Version 8.0 daemon.
7. Start the new deployment manager.
- Use the existing commands that you would use to start a Version 6.x or Version 7.x application server, but replace the RACF STARTED procedure name with the value that you entered in the deployment manager panel for the controller procedure name when you generated your migration jobs. This command starts the Version 8.0 deployment manager. Wait until the server is finished initializing before proceeding.

The following message is displayed on the console and in the job log of BBODMGR:

```
BB000019I  INITIALIZATION COMPLETE FOR WEBSHERE FOR z/OS CONTROL PROCESS BBODMGR
```

What to do next

After you verify a successful migration to Version 8.0 and are successfully running a migrated configuration, you should delete the following items:

- Everything in the source configuration's file system
- Everything in the target configuration's *temporary_directory_location/nnnnn* directory, where *temporary_directory_location* is the directory specified for the temporary directory location (/tmp/migrate by default) and *nnnnn* is the numeric value generated for the migration identifier when you created your migration jobs
- The `bbomigrt2.sh` file

A response file is written each time a z/OS migration definition is created. It contains all of the variable data that was used to create the migration definition, and it can be used to preload the default values when defining a similar migration definition. The response file for a given migration definition is written to the *migration_definition_name.responseFile* file within the root directory for the migration definition.

Normally, you should specify a response file from a migration definition of the same type as that which you are about to define.

Note: A copy of the response file is included in the .DATA dataset that is included in the migration definition that you upload to a z/OS target system. This response file is not used on the z/OS system, but it is there for reference. The member name of the dataset is ZMMTFED.

Target Datasets

High-level qualifier (HLQ)

When a z/OS migration definition is uploaded to the target z/OS system, the migration jobs and files are written to a pair of partitioned datasets. While it is possible to reuse these datasets, it is safest to create separate datasets for each z/OS system that is to be migrated.

- **HLQ.CNTL** - a partitioned dataset with fixed block 80-byte records to contain migration jobs

Migrating a z/OS federated node

After the deployment manager is migrated and restarted, you can perform the actual migration of its federated application server nodes by running the Job Control Language (JCL) jobs that you generated. When you generated your custom migration jobs, you also created customized instructions for preparing and running the migration jobs in the BBOMMINS members of the CNTL dataset that was used to generate your jobs. Follow these customized instructions to complete the process of migrating your federated nodes to Version 8.0.

Before you begin

- You will not be able to proceed if you did not generate the JCL migration jobs.
- The BBOWMG1F, BBOWMG2F, and BBOWMG3F jobs referenced in these instructions must be submitted by a WebSphere Administrator user ID.
All other jobs must be submitted by a user ID that has control over the file system.
- To migrate a federated node on another MVS image, make sure that you run the jobs on the same system on which the node itself resides.
- **Tip:** When migrating a WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x or Version 7.x federated node, you must perform the following actions if you want to be able to roll it back to its previous state after migration:
 1. Back up your existing configuration using the backupConfig command or your own preferred backup utility.
 - Run the backupConfig command or your own preferred utility to back up the Version 8.0 deployment manager configuration.

Important: Make sure that you note the exact name and location of this backed-up configuration.

- Run the backupConfig command or your own preferred utility to back up the Version 6.x or Version 7.x federated node configuration.

Important: Make sure that you note the exact name and location of this backed-up configuration.

2. Migrate the federated node.

If necessary, you can now roll back the federated node that you just migrated. Read "Rolling back a federated node" on page 119 for more information.

Procedure

1. Ensure that the application servers and the node agent are stopped for the federated node being migrated.
You must stop the Version 6.x or Version 7.x federated node before proceeding.
2. Ensure that the newly migrated deployment manager is up and running.
For the application server node to be properly migrated, the deployment manager must be running. For this migration to work, the deployment manager must be up and listening on its SOAP port.

3. Create and mount a new Version 8.0 configuration file system.
Before you perform the migration, Version 8.0 requires that a configuration file system be present for your new configuration. You can run BBOMMHFS or BBOMMZFS to create and mount a new configuration file system, or you can mount one manually. Either way, you must have a file system for your Version 8.0 configuration created and mounted before you proceed. This configuration file system is the target of the migration; your Version 6.x or Version 7.x configuration file system is the source.
BBOMMHFS or BBOMMZFS creates a mount-point directory, allocates the configuration's file system, and mounts the file system at whatever value you specified for the mount point when you generated your migration jobs.
Before you proceed, ensure that you have allocated, created, and mounted your configuration file system datasets either manually or using BBOMMHFS or BBOMMZFS. The mount point should be owned by the WebSphere Administrator user ID and have permissions of at least 755. The new configuration file system structures should be included in BPXPARM so that they will be mounted at the next IPL.
4. Submit BBOWMG1F and BBOWMG2F.

Note: If you are not using XA connectors, submitting BBOWMG1F and BBOWMG2F is optional. However, you should submit both jobs to ensure that your transaction logs are clear.

BBOWMG1F enables all servers on the federated application server node being migrated to start in Peer Restart and Recovery (PRR) mode. PRR processing mode resolves any outstanding transactions, clears the transaction logs, and stops the server. BBOWMG2F disables PRR mode and returns all servers to normal operating state.

Follow these steps to clear the XA transaction logs:

- a. Stop the application server.
- b. Submit the job BBOWMG1F, and verify a return code of 0.
- c. Restart the federated application server, and wait for it to perform PRR processing and stop automatically.

Tip: After the transactions are resolved and the server stops, a nonzero return code is normal and expected. The following is an example of an acceptable result code from the server process:

```
BB000035W TERMINATING THE CURRENT PROCESS, REASON=C9C218D5
```

- d. Submit the job BBOWMG2F, and verify a return code of 0.
5. Copy your generated JCL procedures.

The migration utility BBOMMCP copies the generated JCL procedures to start the servers to the specified procedure library. Your Version 8.0 configuration must use different JCL procedures from those used by your Version 6.x or Version 7.x configuration. This utility will update the new Version 8.0 configuration, substituting your new JCL names in place of the names that existed in your original Version 6.x or Version 7.x configuration.

Caution: This utility copies the generated JCL to your procedure library. If you specified the same names as you used in your Version 6.x or Version 7.x configuration when you generated your migration jobs, this utility will overlay the existing procedures. If you are using the same names, make sure that you back up the existing Version 6.x or Version 7.x procedures before running this utility in case you need to roll back later.

Submit BBOMMCP, and verify a return code of 0.

6. If you specified new procedure names, update your RACF STARTED profiles for the controller and daemon.

The STARTED profile used by controller regions is based on the procedure name and JOBNAME. You must ensure that a STARTED profile will apply so that the proper identity will be assigned to the started task. If your Version 6.x or Version 7.x controller JCL procedure name is AZACR and you specified AZ1ACR for Version 8, for example, then you would need to create a STARTED profile for that new procedure name:

new controller	same identity used in
JCL name	V6.x or V7.x configuration

```
RDEFINE STARTED AZ1ACR.* STDATA(USER(AZACRU) GROUP(AZCFG) TRACE(YES))
```

Note:

- Do not use a different user ID to start. There are other things tied to the user ID, and other changes would also be required if you change the user ID.
- If your original STARTED profile was generic, STARTED AZ*.* ... for example, you would not need to create a new STARTED profile.
- Servant region STARTED profiles are based on JOBNAME, not procedure name. So there is no issue with the servant when you use a different procedure name.
- Daemons and node agents are controllers; so, using different procedure names for these implies a new STARTED profile.

7. Delete and redefine the log stream if necessary.

Perform this step only if you previously configured the transaction XA partner log or compensation log on the Version 6.x or Version 7.x server to use a log stream.

- a. Make sure that the node is stopped.
- b. Delete and redefine the log stream.

You can use the BBOLOGSD and BBOLOGSA jobs that were created during Version 6.x or Version 7.x customization if you configured the server initially to use the log stream.

The following sample shows an example of such a job:

If you are migrating nodes in a sysplex, follow this procedure for each federated node that you migrate.

8. Perform one of the following actions:

- a. Submit the BBOWMG3F job.

Attention: When running in an z/OS environment and configured with multiple TCP/IP stacks, you may need to add the environment variable `_BPXK_SETIBMOPT_TRANSPORT` to direct the migration job to the proper TCP/IP stack that should be used. If you use the incorrect stack, the result leads to a `java.net.UnknownHostException` that causes the subsequent `wsadmin` login to fail.

An `export _BPXK_SETIBMOPT_TRANSPORT=<stack.name>` statement is required in the JCL to identify the appropriate stack. Your JCL might look something like this:

BBOWMG3F is the job that performs the physical migration of the Version 6.x or Version 7.x node to Version 8.0 based on the information that you supplied when you generated your migration jobs. Submit BBOWMG3F, verify that you are getting return codes of 0, and review the log files in the temporary migration directory on the configuration file system. The migration temporary

directory is *temporary_directory_location/nnnnn*, where *temporary_directory_location* is the directory specified for the temporary directory location (/tmp/migrate by default) and *nnnnn* is the numeric value generated for the migration identifier when you generated your migration jobs.

b. Submit the following three jobs:

1) Submit the BBOWMPRO job.

BBOWMPRO creates the Websphere Application Server home and default profile.

2) Submit the BBOWMPRE job.

BBOWMPRE runs the migration pre-upgrade process.

3) Submit the BBOWMPOS job.

BBOWMPOS runs the migration post-upgrade and finish-up (change file permission) processes.

9. Ensure that the old daemon is stopped.

Ensure that all federated nodes in the same cell on this LPAR are stopped.

10. Update the daemon JCL procedure if necessary.

WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 8.0 requires that the daemon process be at the highest level of code of any of the servers that it manages on the same LPAR. It will be at the Version 8.0 level when this federated node is started.

After you migrate all nodes to Version 8.0 and before you remove the previous version's libraries from the system, you must update the daemon JCL procedure. Failure to do so will result in a failure of the daemon to start.

Note:

- If you are migrating from Version 5.1.x to Version 8.0, the daemon needs to have a STEPLIB that includes the Version 5.1.x SBBOLD2 and SBBOLPA datasets.
- If you are migrating from Version 6.0.1.x to Version 8.0, the daemon needs to have a STEPLIB that includes the Version 6.0.1.x SBBOLD2 and SBBOLPA datasets.
- If a Version 8.0 cell has a Version 8.0 server that is communicating with a Version 6.0.1.x server in a Version 6.0.1.x cell that is on the same system as the Version 8.0 cell, you also need to add the version 6.0.1.x SBBOLD2 and SBBOLPA datasets to the STEPLIB of the Version 8.0 daemon.

11. Start the new federated application server node.

a. Start the node agent.

The following message is displayed on the console and in the job log of BBON001:

```
BB000019I INITIALIZATION COMPLETE FOR WEBSHERE FOR z/OS CONTROL PROCESS BBON001
```

b. Start the federated application server.

Use the existing command that you would use to start a Version 6.x or Version 7.x application server, but replace the RACF STARTED procedure name with the value that you entered in the federated node panel for the controller procedure name when you generated your migration jobs. This command starts the Version 8.0 federated application server. Wait until the server is finished initializing before proceeding.

The following message is displayed on the console and in the job log of BBOS001:

```
BB000019I INITIALIZATION COMPLETE FOR WEBSHERE FOR z/OS CONTROL PROCESS BBOS001
```

At this point, your migration to Version 8.0 is complete.

What to do next

After you verify a successful migration to Version 8.0 and are successfully running a migrated configuration, you should delete the following items:

- Everything in the source configuration's file system

- Everything in the target configuration's *temporary_directory_location/nnnnn* directory, where *temporary_directory_location* is the directory specified for the temporary directory location (/tmp/migrate by default) and *nnnnn* is the numeric value specified for the migration identifier when you created your migration jobs
- The `bbomigrt2.sh` file

Migrating IBM Cloudscape or Apache Derby databases

The migration tools migrate any IBM Cloudscape database instances to Apache Derby instances in the new configuration, and they copy any Apache Derby instances that are stored in the previous release's WebSphere Application Server configuration tree to the new release's configuration tree. After you use the migration tools, you should verify the results of the database migration and manually migrate any Cloudscape database instances or copy any Derby database instances that are not automatically migrated or copied by the tools.

Before you begin

Tips:

- Before you run the migration tools, ensure that any application servers hosting applications that are using a Cloudscape or a Derby database are closed. Otherwise, the database migration will fail.
- Before you run the migration tools, ensure that the *debug migration trace* is active. By default, this trace function is enabled. To reactivate the debug migration trace if it is disabled, set one of the following trace options:
 - `all traces*=all`

Apache Derby Version 10.3 is a pure Java database server that combines the Derby runtime with the opportunity to use the full services of IBM Software Support. Important: Derby-to-Derby migration performs a file-system copy of the data at a given point in time. This snapshot will not remain in sync with the database in the previous installation. If you roll back to the previous release, any updates to the database that you made after migration will not be reflected in the previous installation.

Procedure

1. Migrate the configuration to Version 8.0.
2. Verify the automatic migration of Cloudscape database instances or copying of Derby database instances.

When you migrate from WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x to Version 8.0, the migration tools automatically upgrade Cloudscape or Derby database instances that are accessed through the embedded framework by some internal components such as the UDDI registry. The tools also attempt

to upgrade Cloudscape or Derby instances that your applications access through the embedded framework. You must verify these migration results after running the migration tools.

- To distinguish between a partially and a completely successful Cloudscape-to-Derby migration, verify the automatic-migration results by performing the following tasks:

- a. Check the general migration post-upgrade log for database error messages.

These exceptions indicate database migration failures. The migration tool references all database exceptions with the prefix DSRA.

- b. Check the individual database migration logs.

These logs have the same timestamp as that of the general migration post-upgrade log. The individual logs display more detail about errors that are listed in the general post-upgrade log as well as expose errors that are not documented by the general log.

The path name of each database log is *app_server_root/profiles/profileName/logs/myFullDbPathName_migrationLogtimestamp.log*.

- c. Look at the debug log that corresponds with the database migration log.

The WebSphere Application Server migration utility triggers a *debug migration trace* by default; this trace function generates the database debug logs.

The full path name of each debug log is *app_server_root/profiles/profileName/logs/myFullDbPathName_migrationDebugtimestamp.log*.

Performing these tasks gives you vital diagnostic data to troubleshoot the partially migrated databases as well as those that fail automatic migration completely. Ultimately, you must migrate databases that were not completely migrated automatically through a manual process. The log messages contain the exact old and new database path names that you must use to run the manual migration. Note these new path names precisely.

- Verify that any Derby database instances that are stored in the previous release's WebSphere Application Server configuration tree were copied to the new release's configuration tree
Check the general migration post-upgrade log for database error messages. These exceptions indicate database migration failures. The migration tool references all database exceptions with the prefix DSRA..

3. Manually migrate Cloudscape database instances or copy Derby database instances where necessary.

- The Version 8.0 migration tools do not attempt to migrate database instances that transact with applications through the Cloudscape Network Server or the Apache Derby Network Server framework. This exclusion eliminates the risk of corrupting third-party applications that access the same database instances as those accessed by WebSphere Application Server.

To minimize the risk of migration errors for databases that were only partially upgraded during the automatic migration process, delete the new database. Troubleshoot the original database according to the log diagnostic data, then perform manual migration of the original database.

Read the "Upgrading Cloudscape manually" article in the information center for more information.

- The Version 8.0 migration tools do not copy any Derby database instances outside the WebSphere Application Server configuration tree.

If migration does not copy a Derby database instance automatically, copy the database instance manually.

4. Manually migrate your UDDI registry if it uses a database on the Cloudscape Network Server or the Apache Derby Network Server framework.

Read the "Migrating the UDDI registry" article in the information center for more information.

What to do next

Service integration bus-enabled web services use a Service Data Objects (SDO) repository for storing and serving WSDL definitions. If you migrate a configuration that uses a Cloudscape database as the SDO repository, the SDO application will still be configured to use Cloudscape in the new configuration. Migration converts the Cloudscape database to Derby, but you must still update any SDO application's backend ID to use the new database. After you migrate all of the nodes on a server with an SDO repository application that uses Cloudscape, perform the following actions to reset the database type used by the SDO application on the new configuration to Derby:

1. Read about the basic usage for the `installSdoRepository.jacl` script inside the script file.
2. Run the `installSdoRepository.jacl` script by changing to the `app_server_root/bin/` directory and running the following command:

Migrating from the WebSphere Connect JDBC driver

WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 does not include the WebSphere Connect JDBC driver for SQL Server. Use the `WebSphereConnectJDBCdriverConversion` command to convert data sources from the WebSphere Connect JDBC driver to the DataDirect Connect JDBC driver or the Microsoft SQL Server JDBC driver. The `WebSphereConnectJDBCdriverConversion` command processes `resources.xml` files, and there are many options that can be specified to indicate which `resources.xml` files to process.

Parameters

-profileName *profile_name*

This parameter is used to specify whether (true) or not (false) to back up the existing configuration before the command makes changes to the configuration.

The default is true.

-username *userID*

This optional parameter is used to specify the user name to be used by this command.

-password *password*

This optional parameter is used to specify the password to be used by this command.

-traceString *trace_spec*

This optional parameter is used with `-traceFile` to gather trace information for use by IBM service personnel.

The value of `traceString` is `"*=all=enabled"` and must be specified with quotation marks to be processed correctly.

-traceFile *file_name*

This optional parameter is used with `-traceString` to gather trace information for use by IBM service personnel.

Rolling back environments

After migrating to a WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 environment, you can roll back to a Version 6.x or 7.x environment. This returns the configuration to the state that it was in before migration. After rolling back the environment, you can restart the migration process.

Before you begin

About this task

Generally, migration does not modify anything in the configuration of the prior release; however, there are cases where minimal changes are made that are reversible.

Procedure

- To roll back a Version 8.0 deployment manager and its federated nodes to Version 6.x or 7.x, follow the instructions in “Rolling back a WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment cell.”
- To roll back a Version 8.0 federated node to Version 6.x or 7.x, follow the instructions in “Rolling back a federated node” on page 119.

Results

The configuration should now be returned to the state that it was in before migration.

Rolling back a WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment cell

Use the following parameters:

```
./wsadmin.sh -f migrationDisablementReversal.jacl -conntype NONE
```

3. If you chose to keep the installed applications in the same location as the prior release during migration to Version 8.0 and any of the Version 8.0 applications are not compatible with the prior release, install applications that are compatible.
4. Start the rolled-back stand-alone application server in the Version 8.0 environment.

Results

The configuration should now be returned to the state that it was in before migration.

What to do next

You can now restart the migration process if you want to do so.

Chapter 4. Scenario 1: Migrating an administrative agent profile and its registered set of managed base application servers on z/OS

Administrative agent profiles manage multiple base application servers in environments such as development, unit test, or that portion of a server farm that resides on a single machine. Before you can migrate managed base application servers from version 7.0 to version 8.0, you must first migrate the administrative agent.

Before you begin

Review the migration planning information. See Knowledge Collection: Migration planning for WebSphere Application Server.

Note: You can migrate administrative agent profiles and the registered set of managed base application servers from Version 7.0 to Version 8.0.

About this task

This task describes how to use the z/OS Configuration Migration Management Tool to migrate an administrative agent and its associated set of managed base application servers from WebSphere Application Server Version 7.0 to Version 8.0. A base application server becomes managed when it is registered with a single administrative agent. An administrative agent may manage one or more base application servers and must be at the same release level and on the same machine as the base application servers it is managing. z/OS restricts that only the version 7.0 or version 8.0 administrative agent be running at any one time. The following instructions will tell you when to start and stop the old and new administrative agents. This restriction requires that all managed base application servers be migrated at the same time.

Note: When migrating the managed base application server in a flexible management environment, ensure that the node names are the same on Version 8.0 and previous releases.

Procedure

1. Run the backupConfig command on the administrative agent and all the managed base application servers. In case of failure during the migration, save the current administrative agent and node configuration to a file that you can use later for recovery purposes.
 - a. Change to the *<administrative agent profile root>/bin* directory.
 - b. Run the backupConfig command with the appropriate parameters and save the current profile configuration to a file. For example:

```
/opt/WebSphereV61/profiles/v61dmgr01/bin/backupConfig.sh
/mybackupdir/v61dmgr01backupBeforeV7migration.zip
-username myuser -password mypass -nostop
```
 - c. For each node in the configuration, change to the *<profile root >/bin* directory.
 - d. Run the backupConfig command with the appropriate parameters, and save the current profile configuration to a file. For example:

```
/opt/WebSphereV70/profiles/v70mas01/bin/backupConfig.sh
/mybackupdir/v70mas01rbackupBeforeV8migration.zip
-username myuser -password mypass -nostop
```
 - e. Alternately, you can use the PAX command to back up all HFS files. For more information, see Using the z/OS UNIX pax command
2. Install WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0. Install WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 using the SMP/E tool.

- a. Install the correct version (Network Deployment, Base, Express) of WebSphere Application Server onto each target host. For more information, see How do I install an application serving environment?
3. Specify an administrative agent migration configuration in the z/OS Migration Management Tool Use the z/OS Migration Management Tool to create a migration definition and upload the jobs for migrating the administrative agent.

Note: The Version 8.0 cell name must match the cell name in the Version 7.0 configuration. If you create a profile with a new cell name, then the migration will fail

- a. Complete the worksheet found in the following information center topic: Specifying a deployment manager migration configuration in the z/OS Migration Management Tool: Worksheet
- b. On the Migration Node Type Selection panel, select **z/OS migrate a administrative agent**.
- c. Complete the fields on the subsequent panels using the values from your worksheet.
- d. Review the administrative agent migration definition to make sure that all the values are correct.
 - In the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS migration definition table, select the migration definition that you want to review.
 - Click **View**.
 - For information about the migration definition, click the **Summary, Instructions, or Response file** tab.
- e. Upload the migration jobs to the target z/OS system.
4. Ensure that all the in progress jobs are completed on the managed profiles Before running the WASPreUpgrade command on a managed application server or deployment manager, all in progress jobs must be complete.
5. Stop polling the job manager To avoid problems, stop polling the job manager before running the WASPreUpgrade on profiles that are getting jobs from the job manager. Before you start polling for jobs, complete WASPreUpgrade and WASPostUpgrade for the managed profile. For more information, see ManagedNodeAgent command group for the AdminTask object using wsadmin scripting.
6. Run the migration jobs for the administrative agent Follow the instructions in the 'Migration Instructions' view of the z/OS Migration Management Tool or in the BBOMAINS member of the CNTL dataset that you uploaded to the target z/OS system. The CRPROF (profile create), PREUPGRD (preUpgrade) and UPGRADE steps are all executed during this process.
7. Verify all of the migration output that is generated Verify all output created in the working directory of the HFS/ZFS (specified in ZMMT) and all MVS job output created by the batch jobs. Verify that you are getting return codes of 0, and review the log files in the migration temp directory on the configuration file system. The migration temporary directory is temporary_directory_location/nnnnn, where temporary_directory_location is the directory specified for the temporary directory location (/tmp/migrate by default) and nnnnn is the numeric value generated for the migration identifier when you generated your migration jobs.
8. Add STEPLIB statements that include the previous version's load modules to the migrated Daemon's startup proc Use this step if you are running a mixed cell environment only. STEPLIB statements apply to WebSphere Application Server Version 6.1 and earlier. If you are running with multiple nodes on the same LPAR, or if you are running with a node on the same LPAR as the migrated DMGR (which will create a mixed cell environment), you will need to add STEPLIB statements that include the previous version's load modules to the migrated Daemon's startup proc. This is due to the fact that the Daemon must run at the highest WAS level on that LPAR. This is necessary if for any reason you need to stop and restart the down level node agent or application server. For example, after migration of the DMGR, the BBO7DMN procedure was modified to include:

```

//*
//STEPLIB DD DISP=SHR,DSN=xxxxxxxx.SBBOLD2
// DD DISP=SHR,DSN=xxxxxxxx.SBBLOAD
// DD DISP=SHR,DSN=xxxxxxxx.SBBOLPA

```

Where xxxxxxxx = pointers to the previous WebSphere Application Server level. This enables the Daemon to manage the migrated DMGR and previous level node agents.

9. Specify a managed app migration configuration in the z/OS Migration Management Tool Use the z/OS Migration Management Tool to create a migration definition and upload the jobs for migrating the managed base application servers.

Note: The Version 8.0 cell name must match the cell name in the Version 6.x Version 7.0 configuration. If you create a profile with a new cell name, then the migration will fail.

- a. Complete the worksheet found in the following information center topic: Specifying a federated node migration configuration in the z/OS Migration Management Tool: Worksheet
 - b. On the Migration Node Type Selection panel, select **z/OS migrate a managed base application server**.
 - c. Complete the fields on the subsequent panels using the values from your worksheet.
 - d. Review the federated node migration definition to make sure that all the values are correct.
 - In the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS migration definition table, select the migration definition that you want to review.
 - Click **View**.
 - For information about the migration definition, click the **Summary, Instructions, or Response file** tab.
 - e. Upload the migration jobs to the target z/OS system.
10. Run the migration jobs for the managed base application server

Note:

- Ensure that the Version 7.0 administrative agent is running. This allows the application server to be de-registered with the administrative agent.
- If the managed application server is also registered to a job manager, you must unregister from the job manager before running a managed application server migration. After the migration is complete, register to the administrative agent and job manager again.

Follow the instructions in the 'Migration Instructions' view of the z/OS Migration Management Tool or in the BBOMDINS member of the CNTL dataset that you uploaded to the target z/OS system. The CRPROF (profile create), PREUPGRD (preUpgrade) and UPGRADE steps are all executed during this process.

11. Verify all of the migration output that is generated Verify all output created in the working directory of the HFS (specified in ZMMT) and all MVS job output created by the batch jobs. Verify that you are getting return codes of 0, and review the log files in the migration temp directory on the configuration file system. The migration temporary directory is temporary_directory_location/nnnnn, where temporary_directory_location is the directory specified for the temporary directory location (/tmp/migrate by default) and nnnnn is the numeric value generated for the migration identifier when you generated your migration jobs.
12. Add STEPLIB statements that include the previous version's load modules to the migrated Daemon's startup proc Use this step if you are running a mixed cell environment only. Where xxxxxxxx = pointers to the previous WebSphere Application Server level. This enables the Daemon to manage the migrated DMGR and previous level node agents.

13. Change to the new V8 migrated administrative agent

Note: Be sure all the managed application server registered to the old administrative agent are migrated. These should have all been de-registered during their migration process.

- a. Stop the old Version 7.0 administrative agent.
- b. Start the new Version 8.0 administrative agent.

14. Start the managed application server Check the Node Agent logs for errors.

- a. Start each managed base application server.
- b. Register each managed application server with the new administrative agent.

15. Troubleshooting See the information center documentation on troubleshooting migration.

Results

You have migrated an administrative agent profile and its associated managed base application servers from WebSphere Application Server Version 7.0 to Version 8.0 using the migration tools.

Chapter 5. Scenario 2: Migrating a job manager profile and its registered set of servers using the z/OS Configuration Migration Management Tool

You can migrate a job manager profile and its registered set of servers from Version 7.0 to Version 8.0.

Before you begin

Review the migration planning information. See Knowledge Collection: Migration planning for WebSphere Application Server.

Note: You can migrate administrative agent profiles and the registered set of managed base application servers from Version 7.0 to Version 8.0.

About this task

This task outlines the steps needed to migrate the job manager and the set of registered servers.

Job manager profiles can have one or more of the following server types registered:

- Deployment manager servers
- Managed base application servers (which are also registered to an administrative agent)

Note:

1. Managed base application servers and deployment manager servers cannot accept jobs from a job manager that is of a previous version. To avoid problems, migrate your job manager profiles to Version 8.0 before you migrate managed base application servers and deployment manager servers to Version 8.0.

Note: You can migrate job manager profiles and the registered set of servers from Version 7.0 to Version 8.0.

This is necessary if for any reason you need to stop and restart the down level node agent or application server. For example, after migration of the DMGR, the BBO7DMN procedure was modified to include:

```
//*  
//STEPLIB DD DISP=SHR,DSN=xxxxxxxx.SBBOLD2  
// DD DISP=SHR,DSN=xxxxxxxx.SBBLOAD  
// DD DISP=SHR,DSN=xxxxxxxx.SBBOLPA
```

Where xxxxxxxx = pointers to the previous WebSphere Application Server level. This enables the Daemon to manage the migrated DMGR and previous level node agents.

8. Start the Version 8.0 job manager Ensure that both Version 7.0 and 8.0 of the job manager are running.
 - a. Change to the new Version 8.0 job manager profile bin directory
 - b. Run the startServer jobmgr command
 - c. Check the SystemOut.log file for warnings or errors

9. Migrate the registered servers The Version 8.0 job manager can manage Version 7.0 registered servers. For the Version 7.0 topology to function with the new Version 8.0 job manager, you are not required to migrate the registered servers. For each registered server that you plan to migrate to Version 8.0, perform the following steps:
 - If the registered server you wish to migrate is of type deployment manager, see Scenario 1: Migrating a cell using the command line tools
 - If the registered server you wish to migrate is of type managed base application server, see Flexible Management Scenario 1: Migrating an administrative agent profile and its registered set of managed base application servers
10. Troubleshooting See the information center documentation on troubleshooting migration.

Results

You have migrated a job manager profile and its associated managed base application servers from WebSphere Application Server Version 7.0 to Version 8.0 using the migration tools.

Chapter 6. Migrating web server configurations

You can migrate a web server so that it supports the latest version of WebSphere Application Server.

Before you begin

About this task

Migrating from WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x or 7.x:

- Only web servers defined on managed nodes are migrated to WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0.
- If you are migrating a web server and plug-ins from WebSphere Application Server Version 6.x or 7.x to Version 8.0 and the web server is defined on an unmanaged node, the web server creation and application mapping must be done manually.

To create the web server definition manually, perform one of the following actions:

- Use the administration console wizard.

To generate mapping to all applications that are installed at web server creation, use the mapping ALL option in the wizard.

- Use the wsadmin command.
`$AdminTask createWebServer -interactive`

and reply ALL to the mapping applications prompt.

- Use the `configureWebserverDefintion.jacl` script.

This script maps all installed applications to the web server. The script updates all of the information related to the web server plug-in such as the locations of the plug-in installation root, log file, configuration file, and key stores on the Web-server system. However, the script does not update other properties related to the web

server if the web server
definition already exists.

Chapter 7. Migrating administrative scripts

You can migrate administrative scripts using scripting and the wsadmin tool.

Before you begin

About this task

WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 supports migrating administrative scripts from Version 6.x or 7.x.

Procedure

If you are migrating administrative scripts from Version 6.x or 7.x, see: “Migrating administrative scripts from Version 6.x or 7.x to Version 8.0” on page 135

Migrating administrative scripts from a previously Version 5.1.x application server

There are some changes you should be aware of when migrating from a version of WebSphere Application Server that was previously Version 5.1.x.

Before you begin

About this task

There are a few changes to be aware of that are required for your existing scripts when moving to WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0. In general, the administration model has changed very little. However, there are some changes required when moving from a previously Version 5.1.x to Version 8.0.

Procedure

- There are a few changes to be aware of that are required for your existing Version 5.1.x scripts when moving to WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0. These types of changes can be evolved directly without the assistance of script compatibility support. The data can be accessed from multiple locations, including the old and new locations. As long as the new location is not updated, the data is accessed from the old location. Once the new location is updated, it becomes the current data and is used for further accesses and updates. Warning messages are logged when the old location is still being used. Read “Example: Migrating - Changing transaction log directory using wsadmin scripting” on page 135 for more information.
- Be aware of removed features that might have an impact on administration scripts. These might include the following:
 - Support for the Secure Authentication Service (SAS) IIOP security protocol
 - Support for the Common Connector Framework (CCF)
 - Support for the IBM Cloudscape Version 5.1.x database
 - Support for the following Java Database Connectivity (JDBC) drivers:
 - WebSphere Connect JDBC driver
 - Microsoft SQL Server 2000 Driver for JDBC
 - WebSphere SequeLink JDBC driver for Microsoft SQL Server

Example: Migrating - Changing transaction log directory using wsadmin scripting

Prepare for evolutionary changes without script compatibility support.

The location of the transaction logs directory attribute has changed from the `ApplicationServer::TransactionService` to the `ServerEntry::recoveryLogs`. As long as the new location is not used, the value from the old location will continue to be used. Scripts that modify the old location can still be used; that value will take effect until a value in the new location is set. The change to scripts to use the new location is as follows:

Migrating administrative scripts from Version 6.x or 7.x to Version 8.0

- WebSphere SequeLink JDBC driver for Microsoft SQL Server

Chapter 8. Running multiple application server versions

You can create an environment in which multiple versions of WebSphere Application Server can run independently on the same system at the same time. A major consideration in coexistence is the avoidance of port conflicts.

Before you begin

Coexisting, as it applies to WebSphere Application Server products, involves multiple installations of WebSphere Application Server running independently on the same system at the same time. Multiple installations include multiple versions and multiple installations of one version. Coexistence also implies various combinations of Web server interaction.

Procedure

Read “Coexistence support.”

This article discusses which coexistence scenarios are supported.

Coexistence support

Coexistence is a state in which multiple installations and multiple nodes from different versions of WebSphere Application Server run independently in the same environment at the same time.

As it applies to WebSphere Application Server for z/OS products, coexistence primarily refers to the ability of multiple customizations (nodes) of WebSphere Application Server to run on the same z/OS image or sysplex at the same time. You can install WebSphere Application Server for z/OS once and customize it many times; that is, you can create many nodes from one installation. This installation can be shared by all LPARs (logical partitions) in the same sysplex.

When setting up your system for coexistence, you need to be aware of the points in the following table:

Table 66. WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 6.x,, 7.x, and Version 8.0 multiversion coexistence scenarios. The table lists the coexistence types with comments about limitations and considerations for each type.

Coexistence Type	Comments
General	<p>Multiple WebSphere Application Server for z/OS cells can coexist in the same sysplex.</p> <p>Multiple WebSphere Application Serverfor z/OS nodes can coexist on the same LPAR.</p> <p>WebSphere Application Server for z/OS Version 6.x and 7.x can coexist in the same cell with Version 8.0 nodes.</p> <p>No two cells can have the same cell short name.</p> <p>Separate cells need separate configuration file system mount points and Job Control Language (JCL) procedures.</p> <p>You need to determine port conflicts that might occur when earlier versions coexist with Version 8.0. Chapter 9. Interoperating multiple application server versions

WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 is interoperable with other versions of the product under certain conditions.

Before you begin

Read “Overview of migration, coexistence, and interoperability” on page 1 and “Premigration considerations” on page 6. For resources to help you plan and perform your migration, visit Knowledge Collection: Migration planning for WebSphere Application Server.

WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 is generally interoperable with Version 6.x and 7.0. You should apply the latest fix level to support interoperability. In order to interoperate between WebSphere Application Server for z/OS and a WebSphere Application Server product on a non-z/OS machine, however, you must follow this procedure.

You can upgrade a portion of the nodes in a cell to WebSphere Application Server Version 8.0 while leaving others at the older release level. This means that, for a period of time, you might be administering servers that are at the current release and servers that are running the newer release in the same cell.

Restrictions on using mixed-release cells:

- A mixed-release environment where some members are at an older release level might have some restrictions. For details, read the "Creating application servers" article in the information center.
- A WebSphere Application Server, Network Deployment cell can contain mixed releases of Version 6.x nodes, but there is no mixed-node management support for Version 6.0.1.x.

The Version 8.0 migration tools still migrate these nodes during deployment-manager migration, but they issue a warning message that the nodes cannot be managed by the Version 8.0 deployment manager. You can then do one of the following based on your needs:

- Upgrade all Version 6.0.1.x nodes to at least Version 6.0.2. This will allow them to be administered by a Version 8.0 deployment manager.
- Migrate these nodes to Version 8.0.

Procedure

1. On the non-z/OS machine, the property `-Dcom.ibm.CORBA.ORBCharEncoding=ASCII` should be set in the administrative console under **server_name > Java and Process Management > Process Definition > Java Virtual Machine > Generic JVM arguments**.
2. On the non-z/OS machine, the property `com.ibm.CORBA.ORBWCharDefault = UCS2` should be defined in the administrative console under **server_name > Container Services > ORB Service > Custom Properties**.
3. If you are running WebSphere Application Server for z/OS with security enabled, you must set the property `com.ibm.CORBA.validateBasicAuth=false` in `sas.client.props` on the non-z/OS machine. It is set to true by default.
4. Upgrade the Software Development Kit (SDK) used to one supported by Version 8.0.
Read Recommended fixes for WebSphere Application Server for more information.

What to do next

This information is dynamic and might be augmented by information in technical articles that are available on the IBM DeveloperWorks WebSphere site. Check the site for the latest information.

Chapter 10. Configuring port settings

When you configure WebSphere Application Server resources or assign port numbers to other applications, you must avoid conflicts with other assigned ports. In addition, you must explicitly enable access to particular port numbers when you configure a firewall.

Before you begin

You can also use the port validator tool to find port conflicts between different WebSphere Application Server profiles, products, and servers. Read the "port validator tool" article in the information center for more information.

Tip: Port conflicts might occur if you install WebSphere Application Server on multiple systems with deployment managers managing servers or clusters on different systems. The configuration-service port-resolution mechanism does not support cross profiles on different host machines.

- **Example 1:**

1. On system A, create a cell profile that includes Dmgr and AppSrv01 (Node1).
2. On system B, create AppSrv01 and federate AppSrv01 (Node2) to Dmgr on system A.
3. Create server1 on Node1 and server2 on Node2.
4. The server1 server and server2 server might contain duplicate server endpoint ports in the `serverindex.xml` file because Node1 and Node2 are located on different host systems.

- **Example 2:**

1. On system A, create a cell profile that includes Dmgr and AppSrv01 (Node1).
2. On system B, create AppSrv01 and federate AppSrv01 (Node2) to Dmgr on system A.
3. On system B, create JobManager.
4. Create a cluster and add two servers, server1 on Node1 and server2 on Node2.
5. The server2 server and the JobManager server might contain duplicate server endpoint ports in the `serverindex.xml` file because server2 and JobManager are in cross profiles. The server2 server is under Dmgr, JobManager is under the JobManager profile. and the Dmgr and JobManager profiles are located on different machines.

About this task

Procedure

1. Review the port number settings, especially when you are planning to coexist.
2. Optional: Change the port number settings.

You can set port numbers when configuring (customizing) the product after installation. Start thinking about port numbers during the planning phase described in the "Planning for product configuration" article in the information center.

Chapter 11. Troubleshooting migration

You might encounter problems while migrating from an older version of WebSphere Application Server.

Before you begin

Procedure

If you encounter a problem when you are migrating from a previous version of Version 8.0, check your log files and other available information.

- Job fails in the Verify step.

This indicates that a configuration error was detected before beginning the migration process. This can be due to either incorrect data entered when you created the migration jobs or a configuration problem. Review the log output for the error detected, then correct and rerun. The logs are located in *temporary_directory_location/nnnnn*, where *temporary_directory_location* is the value that you specified when you created the migration jobs (where the default is /tmp/migrate) and *nnnnn* is a unique number that is generated and displayed during the creation of your migration jobs as well as displayed in the JESOUT DDNAME of the WROUT and WRERR steps of your batch job stream.

- Job fails after the Verify step.

In the event of failure in the migration job after the Verify step, you can rerun the migration job; but first, you must delete the WebSphere Application Server for z/OS configuration home directory created in the CRHOME step. This corresponds to the home directory that you entered when you created the migration jobs, and it can also be found in the migration Job Control Language (JCL) environment variable *V6_HomeDir*. Because the migration procedure creates a new configuration file system for each node being migrated, it is a simple process to delete the configuration and start from scratch.

- Problems occur with a federated node migration.

A federated node is the most complex node to migrate because it is essentially two migrations rolled into one. A federated node requires a migration of the node configuration information contained in the deployment manager's primary repository as well as the configuration information contained in the federated node. Federated node migration requires an active connection to the deployment manager. If you have security enabled, it is essential that you follow the instructions that were generated when you created the migration jobs. The migration job must be submitted with a WebSphere Administrator's user ID that has been properly configured for obtaining secure connections.

- Job fails during the application-installation phase of migration.

If you select the option for the migration process to install the enterprise applications that exist in the Version 6.x configuration into the new Version 8.0 configuration, you might encounter error messages during the application-installation phase of migration.

The applications that exist in the Version 6.x configuration might have incorrect deployment information—typically, invalid XML documents that were not validated sufficiently in previous WebSphere Application Server runtimes. The runtime now has an improved application-installation validation process and will fail to install these malformed EAR files. This results in a failure during the application-installation phase of WASPostUpgrade and produces an "E:" error message. This is considered a "fatal" migration error.

If migration fails in this way during application installation, you can do one of the following:

- Fix the problems in the Version 6.x applications, and then remigrate.
- Proceed with the migration and ignore these errors.
 1. Restart the migration job in the FINISHUP step to allow the remaining migration functions to be performed.

Do this by adding the RESTART=FINISHUP parameter to the job card and resubmitting the job.
 2. Later, fix the problems in the applications and then manually install them in the new Version 8.0 configuration using the administrative console or an install script.

- Out-of-space errors occur.

The migration logs are located in *temporary_directory_location/nnnnn*, where *temporary_directory_location* is the value that you specified when you created the migration jobs (where the default is */tmp/migrate*) and *nnnnn* is a unique number that was generated during the creation of your migration jobs. Normally, the space requirements for the migration logs are small. If you enable tracing, however, the log files can be quite large. The best practice is to enable tracing only after problems have been found. If tracing is required, try to only enable tracing related to the step in the process that is being debugged. This will help to reduce the space requirements.

You can enable tracing when you create the migration jobs using the z/OS Migration Management Tool or the *zmmt* command; or you can change the variables in the migration JCL from disabled to enabled in the Job Control Language (JCL) member *BBOWMxEV* in the *DATA* dataset that is created when you use the z/OS Migration Management Tool or the *zmmt* command to create a migration definition.

Note: For a deployment manager, the member name is *BBOWMDEV*; for a federated node, the member name is *BBOWMDEV*.

During migration, a backup copy of your Version 6.x configuration is made. This backup becomes the source of the information being migrated. The default backup location is */tmp/migrate/nnnnn*. This location can be changed when you create the migration jobs. Depending on the size of the node being migrated, this backup can be quite large. If your temporary space is inadequate, then you will need to relocate this backup.

- Out-of-memory errors occur.

To improve memory usage, perform the following actions:

1. Edit your job file to prevent sharing of application space, and increase the JVM heap minimum and maximum.

The following is an example of how to edit the *BBOWM3D* job for a deployment manager migration so that it uses up to 768 MB of heap, which is more than the default of 256.

```
BPXBATCH SH + export _BPX_SHAREAS=NO; +
export IBM_JAVA_OPTIONS="-Xms256M -Xmx768M"; +
/wit/bigtmp/bbomigr2.sh WASPreUpgrade +
/wit/bigtmp/24173105/_ +
1>> /wit/bigtmp/24173105/BBOWMG3D.out +
2>> /wit/bigtmp/24173105/BBOWMG3D.err;
```

2. Edit the appropriate migration script.

If you are migrating from a system where you have access to the read-only driver file system, edit the *WASPreUpgrade.sh* and *WASPostUpgrade.sh* scripts in the *bin* directory.

If you cannot edit the read-only driver system, use the three migration jobs instead of the single migration job so that the migration pauses after profile creation and you can edit the profile scripts. Running the *BBOWMG3** migration job is equivalent to running the following three jobs in the order listed:

- *BBOWMPRO*
- *BBOWMPRE*
- *BBOWMPOS*

The *BBOWMG3** job and the three individual jobs are mutually exclusive—either run the single *BBOWMG3** job or run the three individual jobs, but not both.

The **PRO* job performs product installation and profile creation. After this job completes successfully, you have access to the Version 8.0 profile that will be used for the migration. Go into the Version 8.0 installation directory and go to the equivalent *\${WAS_HOME}/bin* location. You will find the *WASPreUpgrade.sh* and *WASPostUpgrade.sh* scripts at this location. If they are symlinks back to the read-only file system, remove the symlinks and copy the original files from the read-only file system to this location. After you have actual migration script files in *\${WAS_HOME}/bin*, edit those files and change the lines for Performance Java Options to change the heap settings to a value appropriate for your system. For example:


```
set PERFJAVAOPTION=-Xms256M -Xmx768M
```

You can now continue your migration. If you decided to run the three individual jobs, launch the BBOWMPRE job and after that is successful (RC=0) run the BBOWMPOS job. If you edited the read-only file-system copy of the migration script files, you can run the appropriate BBOWMG3* job.

- Batch job time is exceeded.

Each z/OS installation is different with respect to job classes and time limitations. Make sure you have specified appropriate job classes and timeout values on your job card.

- Migration of a deployment manager or stand-alone application server completes but no applications are installed.

The log file might show messages similar to the following:

```
MIGR0339I: Application WISO_wisoadmin_war.ear is deploying using the wsadmin command.  
MIGR0241I: Output of wsadmin.  
Error: unable to allocate 268435456 bytes for GC in j9vmem_reserve_memory.  
JVMJ9VM015W Initialization error for library j9gc23(2): Failed to instantiate heap. 256M requested  
Could not create the Java virtual machine.
```

The problem is that the WASPostUpgrade script launched from bbomigr2.sh does not have enough remaining address space to initialize the Java Virtual Machine (JVM). Typically, this indicates that the spawned process is running in the same address space as the WASPostUpgrade JVM.

You can use the environment variable `_BPX_SHAREAS` to tell the underlying process whether or not spawned processes should share the same address space as the parent process. The default value (null) is NO, but administrators can change this to YES or MUST to get a performance benefit because the address space does not need to be copied during fork or spawn actions.

If your system is experiencing the problem described here, run the migration job with the environment variable `_BPX_SHAREAS` explicitly set to NO. You can set this either in the system profile (`/etc/profile`) or in the user profile for the user running the migration job. Use the following entry to set this variable to NO:

```
export _BPX_SHAREAS = NO
```

After the migration job completes, you can update the profile to reset `_BPX_SHAREAS` to its original value.

- Failures occur during server startup after migration.

Review the instructions that were generated when you created the migration jobs. Verify that the JCL procedures have been copied over correctly to your PROCLIB, the RACF definitions have been created, and the Version 8.0 libraries have been authorized. Make sure that the daemon process associated with your cell is at the appropriate level. The daemon process must be at the highest WebSphere Application Server for z/OS version level of all servers that it manages within the cell.

After migrating to a Version 8.0 cell that contains or interoperates with Version 6.x nodes that are not at Version 6.0.2.11 or later, the cluster function might fail. When starting these Version 6.x application servers, you might see the following problems:

- You might see a first failure data capture (FFDC) log that shows a `ClassNotFoundException` error message. This exception is thrown from the `RuleEtiquette.runRules` method and looks something like the following example:

```
Exception = java.lang.ClassNotFoundException  
Source = com.ibm.ws.cluster.selection.SelectionAdvisor.<init>  
probeid = 133  
Stack Dump = java.lang.ClassNotFoundException: rule.local.server  
at java.net.URLClassLoader.findClass(URLClassLoader.java(Compiled Code))

During migration, Version 8.0 cluster information is distributed throughout the cell. Version 6.x nodes that are not at Version 6.0.2.11 or later fail to read this information. To avoid this problem, upgrade all Version 6.x nodes that will be contained in or interoperating with a Version 8.0 cell to Version 6.0.2.11 or later before migrating your deployment managers to Version 8.0.

After migration, carefully review the job output and log files for errors.

Note: WebSphere Application Server provides an interactive problem control system (IPCS) verb exit to help you to format information from dumps of WebSphere Application Server processes. This verb exit was named CBDDATA, which was an alias of the real module name, in Version 6.x and earlier. In Version 8.0, that alias was removed. In Version 8.0 and later, therefore, you must use the real name of this verb exit, BBORDATA, instead of the alias.

If you migrate a node to Version 8.0 then discover that you need to revert back to Version 6.x, read “Rolling back environments” on page 117.

For current information available from IBM Support on known problems and their resolution, read the IBM Support page. IBM Support also has documents that can save you time gathering information needed to resolve this problem. Before opening a PMR, read the IBM Support page.

New ports that are registered on a migrated Version 8.0 node agent include: WC_defaulthost, WC_defaulthost_secure, WC_adminhost, WC_adminhost_secure, SIB_ENDPOINT_ADDRESS, SIB_ENDPOINT_SECURE_ADDRESS, SIB_MQ_ENDPOINT_ADDRESS, SIB_MQ_ENDPOINT_SECURE_ADDRESS. These ports are not needed by the node agent, and can be safely deleted.

Chapter 13. Migrating, coexisting, and interoperating

This section covers all aspects of migration, coexistence, and interoperability. Migrating is copying the configuration from a previous release of this product into a new release. Coexisting is running a new release of WebSphere Application Server on the same machine at the same time as you run an earlier release or running two installations of the same release of WebSphere Application Server on the same machine at the same time. Interoperating is exchanging data between two different systems, such as coexisting product installations.

Appendix. Directory conventions

References in product information to *app_server_root*, *profile_root*, and other directories imply specific default directory locations. This topic describes the conventions in use for WebSphere Application Server.

Default product locations - z/OS

app_server_root

Refers to the top directory for a WebSphere Application Server node.

The node may be of any type—application server, deployment manager, or unmanaged for example. Each node has its own *app_server_root*. Corresponding product variables are *was.install.root* and *WAS_HOME*.

The default varies based on node type. Common defaults are *configuration_root/AppServer* and *configuration_root/DeploymentManager*.

configuration_root

Refers to the mount point for the configuration file system (formerly, the configuration HFS) in WebSphere Application Server for z/OS.

The *configuration_root* contains the various *app_server_root* directories and certain symbolic links associated with them. Each different node type under the *configuration_root* requires its own cataloged procedures under z/OS.

The default is */wasv8config/cell_name/node_name*.

plug-ins_root

Refers to the installation root directory for Web Server Plug-ins.

profile_root

Refers to the home directory for a particular instantiated WebSphere Application Server profile.

Corresponding product variables are *server.root* and *user.install.root*.

In general, this is the same as *app_server_root/profiles/profile_name*. On z/OS, this will always be *app_server_root/profiles/default* because only the profile name "default" is used in WebSphere Application Server for z/OS.

smpe_root

Refers to the root directory for product code installed with SMP/E or IBM Installation Manager.

The corresponding product variable is *smpe.install.root*.

The default is */usr/lpp/zWebSphere/V8R0*.

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
