

- It does not prescribe one Migration path
 - Varies with customer policies
 - Varies with versions involved
 - Varies with customer procedures
- Use this information as a guide to build your own plan
- Get assistance if needed



Migration Overview

Migration is the action of moving from an existing release to a newer release.


When doing a WebSphere Application Server migration, consider it a complete project because it is more than just applying a new product version.

WebSphere Application Server migration impacts the following components of your infrastructure:

- Applications
- Middleware
- Operating systems



Migration Aspects




- The whole migration process involves a variety of steps
 - Migration process needs planning and cannot compromise day-to-day business
- Each situation is unique
 - There is no one standard plan

Five Network Deployment strategies

1. Side by Side

- Create a new cell and populate with scripts or manually
- No runtime migration tools

2. In Place - Copy and replace the cell

- Recreates the exact existing configuration in the new cell
- DMgr and nodes are migrated

In Place - Copy and replace the DMgr


- Recreates the exact existing configuration in new cell
- Add new nodes and move incrementally

4. In Place - Copy and coexist

- Recreates the exact existing configuration in the new cell
- Modify the ports in the new cell and coexist

5. Side by Side - Fine Grained

- Create a new cell and incrementally copy existing configuration
- Uses an intermediate profile, runtime migration and wsadmin tools





Side by Side

- Ignores the existing configuration
- Create a new cell and populate with administration scripts or manually
- Best results with a comprehensive set of scripts or tools for configuration automation

Pros

- No dependencies on tooling
- Least risk assuming existing scripts are comprehensive
- Can easily migrate applications singly

Cons


- Comprehensive set of scripts and ongoing maintenance of those scripts can be expensive
- Any required changes to these scripts must be done before migrating
- Any tuning of the old configuration is not carried forward

Node



In Place – Copy and Replace Cell

- Use Runtime migration tools on DMgr
 - Recreates the exact existing configuration in the new cell
- Later migrate the existing nodes using the runtime migration tools
 - All applications on a managed node are migrated at the same time
- Pros
 - Does not require comprehensive set of scripts
 - All configuration is moved forward
- Cons
 - Dependency on using the runtime migration tools
 - Requires all applications on a node be ready to migrate at the same time
 - Limited value if you are refactoring your topology
 - Carries default values forward from the old cell





In Place – Copy and Replace DMgr

- Use Runtime migration tools on DMgr
 - Recreates the exact existing configuration in the new cell

Add new nodes


- Applications can be migrated singly when ready
- Remove old nodes when no longer needed


Pros

- Does not require comprehensive set of scripts
- All configuration is moved forward
- Cell and cluster level configuration accessible by older nodes

Cons

- Dependency on using the runtime migration tools
- Limited value if you are refactoring your topology
- Carries default values forward from the old cell









In Place – Copy and Co-exist

- Same steps as "Copy and replace Cell" except:
 - Use the options of the runtime Migration tools to not disable the DMgr
 - Turn off the old DMgr (the federated nodes should be able to continue running)
 - Migrate all the nodes
 - Modify the new cell to resolve port conflicts
 - Start old DMgr, new DMgr and all nodes in the new cell




Side by Side – Fine Grained

- Uses a combination of tools
 - An intermediate profile
 - The runtime migration tools
 - Properties based configuration tool (PBC)

Approach

- Migrate the existing data to an intermediate profile
- Extract portions of the configuration from that profile
- Import them into the final DMgr profile using PBC



Migration impacts overview

Migration impact is gated by two overarching factors

- 1. The versions involved in the customer Migration scenario
 - Moving from v6.1 to v8.5 would be different than v5.1 to v8.5
- 2. The amount of change introduced in and between these versions
 - Moving from v6.1 to v8.5 involves changes introduced by v7.0, v8.0 and v8.5
 - Moving from v5.1 to v8.5 involves changes introduced by v6.0, v6.1, v7.0, v8.0 and v8.5



None* means no required code changes with default of JRE6 when using traditional WAS runtime

Choosing the "right" version

- Question: "Which WebSphere Application Server version should I migrate to?"
- Answer, as always "It depends"
 - End of Service date for your current version
 - WebSphere Application Server v5.1 was September 2008
 - WebSphere Application Server v6.0.2 was September 2010
 - WebSphere Application Server v6.1 is September 2013
 - Characteristics of your targeted version
 - End of Service date for the version most likely an estimate
 - Stability in lifecycle
 - JEE/JDK levels relative to targeted version
 - New WebSphere Application Server features you want
 - Version requirements of vendor or IBM products that you have or want
 - Version your Enterprise has committed towards
 - What about fixpack level? is there an implicit company policy?
 - What else that you use that depends on a WAS version number?



Support policies

- At least 12 months notice prior to an IBM branded product release's EOS date and the availability of support extensions for an extra charge set by IBM
 - Endeavor to coordinate most EOS dates to occur on 30 April or 30 September
- Enhanced '5+3' support statement as of March 2007
 - Five years for standard, three for extended support.
 - Updated April 2008 to include selected products within the Information Management, IBM Lotus, IBM Rational, IBM Tivoli and WebSphere...

- Latest as of Summer 2011
 - One of our new initiatives will be to support, on a going-forward basis for select IBM branded products that have not previously announced an EOS date, not only the 'current' version of the product, but also <u>up to two previous</u> <u>versions</u>, in an effort to limit disruptive technology transitions.
 - In this context, a 'version' is a major functional enhancement level. While not every IBM software product will be subject to this new initiative, our initial focus is to support key products from all of our software brands, and expand the number of products over time


Migrate WebSphere environments faster with minimized risk

Assists administrators in moving their configuration when migrating

- Merges old configuration with new configuration
- Provides deep functionality, e.g. "Lights-on" WAS migration
- Especially useful for customers that have large topologies
 - Large telecom customer recently used the tool when migrating a 500+ JVM environment

Provides a framework for Stack product migration





JDK

Allow development and production environments to select the most appropriate JDK for the situation (JDK 6 or 7)


- WAS v8.5 introduces "selectable" JDK:
 - Some of the environment can use Java 7 while the rest continues to use Java 6
 - Use Java 7 in a small subset of your topology & keep the rest on Java 6
 - Switch back and forth between Java 7 and Java 6 as necessary
- Install as feature extension to new or existing WAS v8.5 installation
 - Use with either full WAS profile or Liberty profile
- Create WAS admin profiles for developer use
 - Use managesdk to set WAS new profile and command defaults to Java 7
 - Create admin profile and start server
- Build and test Java 7 applications
 - Use ant or maven to build Java 7 applications
 - See PlantsByWebSphere sample docs for information
 - Use RAD to develop, deploy, and test Java 7 applications






Resiliency of Messaging Infrastructure

- Smart Messaging Engine (ME) that will attempt to shutdown itself gracefully when it encounters irrecoverable problems without killing the JVM.
- Smart Messaging Engine (ME) that will re-enable itself after a configurable amount of time so that it can be available to be started if needed.
- Smart Messaging Engine (ME) that will persist the JMS redelivery count.








Repository Checkpoint and Admin Audit

Simplify restoration of earlier configuration checkpoints and record all configuration updates is security audit log.

 Provides "full" and "delta" checkpoints of the master configuration repository.

Simplifies restoration to a previous configuration

- Full checkpoint created manually
- Delta checkpoints, when enabled, are created automatically in checkpoint repository on every configuration-save
- New Security Audit event -ADMIN_REPOSITORY_SAVED refers to corres delta checkpoint records.
 - The delta checkpoint can be exported to review configuration changes when needed
 - See When and What configuration files were changed and by Whom





Cross-Component Trace (XCT) - Problem Determination

Improve your ability to diagnose & debug SW problems in order to minimize and eliminate application downtime

- XCT log viewer available for the IBM Support Assistant, can render log and trace content from multiple log / trace files grouped by request
 - View that detailed information on HTTP and JMS requests and responses to easily debug complicated application problems.
- High Performance Extensible Logging (HPEL) now has log / trace entry extensions
 - Filter entries by application name, by request ID or by other custom fields



Memory Leak Detection & Protection

Reduce possibilities of memory leak in your applications

Get enough info. if leak is detected to help fix my app

List stopped apps that have memory leaks

WebSphere Application Server V8.5:


- Ability to mitigate memory leak when stopping apps
- Ability to prevent leaks, receive leak warnings and get heap/system dumps
- MBean to list stopped apps that have memory leaks



High Performance Extensible Logging

Improve performance & ease of use of log & trace to improve problem determination

- Speeds up logging and tracing
 - Log primitive over 6x faster than WAS v7
 - Trace primitive 3.8x faster than WAS v7
- Provides more flexible access to log and trace data
 - Command-line access to filter and format
 - Administrative console GUI to filter and format local or remote logs and trace, even when the remote server is down
 - Programmatic access to filter, format, and merge local or remote logs and trace
- Works with existing application log and trace instrumentation
- Provides a common solution for z/OS and distributed platforms

IBM Installation Manager

Faster time to value & lower operational costs through new install & maintenance tech.

- Full local & centralized product lifecycle management:
 - Install/Uninstall
 - Update/Rollback (Fixpacks and iFixes)
 - Modify (Add/Remove features)
- Installs exactly the desired level of service in one pass
 - No need to install GA product first and then apply a fixpack and/or ifixes as a separate step
- Lays down binaries relevant to user selections and system environment
- GUI & response file modes of operation
 - GUI to perform individual operations
 - Response files can be recorded from the GUI or created by specifying the appropriate xml
 - Silent mode support for invoking multiple operations
- Single user experience across WAS, WAS components & various IBM products
 - A single instance of IIM can manage the product lifecycle for any IM based products, from WebSphere, Rational, etc.
 - Support for WAS, IHS, WCT, etc.






Centralized Installation Manager (CIM)

Faster time to value & lower operational costs through new install & maintenance tech.

- CIM V8 is available from Job Manager & DManager
 - Job Manager based solution spans the boundaries of the cell
 - Install targets are specified in agentless fashion
 - Install and config job scheduling is supported
- CIM V8 is able to remotely install WebSphere Application Server, IBM HTTP Server, Application Clients, DMZ Security Proxy Server, and Web Server Plug-ins
- Better scalability due to more distributed architecture
- Distributed & z/OS scenarios supported
- "CIM V7" function is still available with Deployment Manager along with new "CIM V8" function




Separation between Job Manager, Target Hosts and IIM repositories



OSGi Application Enhancements: EJBs

Include EJB bundles in OSGi applications to simplify the development, deployment and administration of modular enterprise applications

- OSGi bundles can now contain version 3.x EJBs
 - Local & Remote
 - Asynchronous beans, Session beans & Singleton beans
- Stateless Session Beans can be exported as services to the OSGi Service Registry
- Provisioner and Internal Bundle Repository extended to understand EJB Bundles
 - Services provided by EJBs
 - Services required by EJBs





Web 2.0 & Mobile (Mobile Application Development)

Worklight takes WAS mobile web applications to the next level

IM - Health Management

- Automatically detect and handle application health problems
 - Without requiring administrator time, expertise, or intervention
- Intelligently handle health issues in a way that will maintain continuous availability
- Each health policy consists of a condition, one or more actions, and a target set of processes
- Includes health policies for common application problems
- Customizable health conditions and health actions











IM - Application Edition Management

Applications can be upgraded without incurring outages

- Upgrade Applications without interruption to end users
- Concurrently run multiple editions of an applications
 - Automatically route users to a specific application
- Multiple editions can be activated for extended periods of time
- Rollout policies to switch from one edition to another without service loss
- Easily update OS or WebSphere without incurring down time
- Easy-to-use edition control center in admin console, plus full scripting support










IM - Intelligent Routing

Improves business results by ensuring priority is given to business critical applications

- Requests are prioritized and routed based upon administrator defined rules
 - Flexible policy-based routing and control
- On Demand Router (ODR) is the focal point for Intelligent Routing
- A routing tier that's aware of what's happening on the application server tier
 - Application server utilization, request performance, etc...
- Route work to the application server that can do it best
- Provide preference for higher priority requests
- Integrates with Health Management and Dynamic Clustering





IM - Dynamic Clustering

Proactively provision and start or stop application servers based on workload demands to meet Service Level Agreements


- Associate service policies with your applications
 - Let WebSphere manage to the service goals
- Programmatically respond to spikes in demand
 - Add or reduce application server instances as appropriate
- Automatically recover from infrastructure problems
- Includes automatic start and stop of cluster members based on load for MQ-driven applications
- Decrease administrative overhead required to monitor and diagnose performance issues



- Dynamic Cluster a virtual cluster hosting an application, spread across a defined set of Nodes.
- Cluster Members (JVM's) are automatically Updated, Created, Deleted, Started and stopped depending on the needs of the application and the policies.
