

### **Business Rule Definitions**



#### **Many Definitions**

- Declarations of policies or conditions that must be satisfied (OMG Analysis and Design Reference Model 1992)
- Units of business knowledge (Odell 1998)
- Statement that defines or constrains some aspect of the business. It is intended to assert business structure or to control or influence behavior of the business (GUIDE Business Rules Project 1995)
- A statement that can control or affect both the execution of a business process as well as the structure of the resources in the business. (Business Modeling with UML 2000)
- 10 Definitions on Pages 183 &184 of "Principles of the Business Rule Approach" (Ron Ross 2003)

Business rules are declarative, natural language statements that describe the way business people want their business to operate.

# **Business Rule Discovery**



- Business Rules are found in:
  - Business Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs)
  - Laws/Regulations
  - Contract Terms and Conditions
  - Service Level Agreements
  - "Tribal Knowledge" aka "This is how we always do it"

Business Rules may be stated in an "IF ... Then" format, but often aren't.

## **Business Rule Characteristics**



- Business Rules are expressed in natural language therefore they are almost always . . .
  - Verbose
  - Ambiguous
  - Duplicative
  - Contradictory

# The Value of Term – Fact Modeling



- Through Term Fact Analysis, we …
  - Eliminate Verbosity
  - Resolve Ambiguity
  - Eliminate Duplication
  - Resolve Contradictions

**Term – Fact Analysis is the foundation for Business Rule Analysis** 

# **Policy Statements**



- Is there a difference between a business rule and a business policy?
  - An appendectomy must be performed in an OR.
  - The minimum uninsured motorist coverage in the state of FL is \$2,000.00.
  - Destination storage in transit (DSIT) charges may be discounted a maximum of 15%.

# Business Rule (Policy) Templates



**Rejector:** <Subject> must/must not <fact> [if/when <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

**Permission Statement:** <Subject> may/need not <fact> [if/when/while <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

**Computation Rule:** <Subject> = <mathematical formula> [if/when/while <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

**Derivation Rule:** <Subject> must/must not be taken to mean <logical expression> [if/while/when <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

Inference Rule: <Subject> must/must not be considered to be a <term> [if/while/when <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

**Imprint Rule:** <Term> must/must not be set to <term/value> [if/when/while <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

**Presentation Rule:** <Subject> must/must not be displayed in <media> <display manner> [if/when/while <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

**State Mandate:** <Subject> mandates <mandate> [if/when/while <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

# System Rule (Policy) Templates



**Rule Toggle:** <Rule name> must/must not be enforced [if/when/while <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

**Process Toggle:** <Subject> must/must not be enabled/disabled [if/when/while <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

**Data Toggle:** <Data item> must/must not be created/deleted [if/when/while <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

**Imprint Rule:** <Term> must/must not be set to <term/value> [if/when/while <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

**Presentation Rule:** <Subject> must/must not be displayed in <media> <display manner> [if/when/while <condition statement>] <start date> <end date>

**Process Trigger:** <subject> must/must not be executed if/when/while <condition statement> <start date> <end date>

**Rule Trigger:** <Rule name> must/must not be fired if/when/while <condition statement> <start date> <end date>

#### What are Terms?



- Terms are nouns that are used in daily business operations.
- Terms may describe:
  - meaningful business concepts (Classes)
  - characteristics of business entities (Attributes)
  - the way business objects behave (Methods)

#### **Examples:**

Contract, Insurance Policy, Coverage, Insured, Deductible

Terms are the words of the **Business Vocabulary**

#### What are Facts?



- Facts are combinations of terms that describe what business people know about their business.
- Facts may describe
  - the relationships between terms
  - interactions between terms (collaboration)
  - the meaningful combinations of the terms in the vocabulary.

#### **Examples:**

An Insurance Policy may contain many Coverages.

A Coverage describes the amount of protection against loss.

A Deductible is the amount the Insured must pay when a loss occurs.

Facts are the **Business Knowledge** 

#### What are Rules?



- Three Rule Classifications
  - Business Rules (Statement of business policy)
  - System Rules (Statement of system operations policy)
  - Enforcement Rules
- Business Rules control the way a Business operates.
- System Rules control the way a System operates.
- Enforcement Rules are software that enforces Business and System Rules.


# Terms, Facts, and Rules



Term – A word or phrase that has meaning to business people.


Fact – A collection of terms that describe what business people know about their business. Facts are built on terms.

Rule – Uses facts to describe how business people want their business to operate. Rules may interact with other rules.



# Use the UML Object Model to Represent Business Policies

Every auto policy issued in FL must contain uninsured motorist coverage.



#### **Business Rule Characteristics**



#### Business Rules describe...

- Business Policies
- the way business people want the business to operate.
- "what should be true" at any given point in time.

#### Business Rules are...

- Declarative, atomic statements
- Defined independently of the responsibility for who, where, when, or how of their enforcement

# Business Rules, Separate from their Enforcement



- "A Business Rule is distinct from any enforcement defined for it. A Business Rule and its enforcement are separate concerns." (article 4.5 of the Business Rules Manifesto)
- Business Rule enforcement can have many, different results
  - Admonishment
  - Warning
  - Reject


