## About This Book

This book describes the administration and system operation functions of IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3 (program number 5716-PD1), in the following referred to as APD/400. APD/400 is used to integrate multiple applications into a common environment and to integrate functions common to those applications. It provides a standardized interface enabling users to access their applications and to switch between applications.

Chapter 1, "Installing APD/400" on page 1 gives instructions on how to install, delete, create a backup copy of, check the installation of, and restore APD/400. Other installation procedures for the batch system, changes to applications or your system, and sign-on displays, are also described.

Chapter 2, "Installing Applications" on page 7 gives instructions on how to install applications to run under APD/400, and describes specific tasks that are carried out by the administrator and the security officer. This chapter also details how you can delete an application.

Chapter 3, "Defining the Application Environment" on page 15 describes how to administer applications within the APD/400 environment. This consists of functions used to administer users and user groups, authorization lists, menus and menu headings, conflict management (exclusions), batch processing, data sets, applications, and parameters.

Chapter 4, "System Operator Tasks" on page 99 describes the system operator tasks, including how to use the APD/400 save and restore options, and the APD/400 service functions.

Appendix A, "APD/400 Batch System" on page 115 gives a technical overview of the APD/400 batch system, and descriptions of how to start the batch system and how the batch scheduler submits a job.

Appendix B, "Multilingual Support" on page 119 contains a description of the APD/400 multilingual support features.

Appendix C, "IBM Supplied Objects" on page 127 lists the supplied APD/400 objects, including authorization lists and the functions for which each list has authorization.

Appendix D, "APD/400 Installation Messages" on page 130 lists the APD/400 installation messages.

The back of this book provides a glossary containing definitions of terms used across the APD/400 library, a bibliography, and an index.

## Who Should Read This Book

This manual is intended for those responsible for installing, administering, and operating APD/400 and the applications running under it. Some knowledge and experience of working with Application System/400\* (AS/400\*) computers and the Operating System/400\* (OS/400\*) operating environment is assumed.

---

## Chapter 1. Installing APD/400

This chapter describes how to:

- Install APD/400
- Delete APD/400
- Save APD/400
- Restore APD/400
- Check that APD/400 is installed correctly on your system
- Install the APD/400 batch monitor system
- Install changes to applications or your system
- Install a simplified sign-on panel
- Install the standard sign-on panel.

---

### Method of Installation

The installation process of APD/400 Version 3 Release 1 is the same as for Version 2 Release 3, but different from other previous releases:

- For Version 2 Release 2, there is no longer an installation procedure specifically for APD/400. Instead, Licensed Program Management (LPM) is used to install APD/400.
- For Version 2 Release 3, you can install, save, and delete APD/400 directly from the LICPGM menu (type GO LICPGM from any AS/400 command entry for the LICPGM menu). Using LICPGM you can use menus to request services for the APD/400 program and secondary languages as you can for all other OS/400 licensed programs. In this book, a method using native OS/400 commands is described to install, save, and delete APD/400. However, you can also request these services from the LICPGM menu. See *AS/400 Licensed Programs and New Release Installation Guide* for more information on working with the OS/400 LPM.

### Before You Install

Before you install APD/400, make sure that:

- The user profile you use for installation has the special authorities \*SECADM and \*ALLOBJ. If APD Version 1 Release 1 or APD Version 1 Release 2 are installed on your system, the user profile must be enrolled in the system directory (WRKDIR). If you sign on as QSECOFR, both these requirements are met.
- If a previous release of APD or APD/400 is installed on your system, nobody is working with it. Also, the Batch Monitor Program (BMP) must not be active.
- A simplified sign-on panel is not installed.
- If a previous version of APD/400 is already installed on your system then save the entire APD. This enables you to recover your current APD release if errors occur during the installation process.
  - If APD/400 V1R2 is installed on your system, use the APD *Save Libraries* function or type the following command and press Enter:  
SAVLIB LIB(QAPD) DEV(TAP01) PRECHK(\*YES)

(The DEV(TAP01) parameter specifies the unit where you have mounted the backup tape/cartridge. Specify the correct name of that unit.)

- If IBM APD/400 V2R2 or V2R3 is installed on your system please refer to “Saving APD/400” on page 3.

## Installation Procedure

Use the command RSTLICPGM to install APD/400. On the command line, enter:

```
RSTLICPGM LICPGM(5716PD1) DEV(device name)
```

The device name is the name of your tape device where the APD/400 installation tape is mounted. APD/400 is now installed without further user interaction.

If a previous release of APD or APD/400 is installed on your system, migration to APD/400 Version 3 Release 1 takes place automatically directly after installation. Appendix C, “IBM Supplied Objects” on page 127 lists the objects supplied with APD/400, and describes the values that are used when you migrate from one release of APD or APD/400 to another.

### Notes:

1. If an error occurs during installation, corresponding error messages are written to the job log. Some of the installation messages are in English. The installation messages are listed in Appendix D, “APD/400 Installation Messages” on page 130. To display the job log, use the command WRKJOB.
2. By default, QSECOFR is used as the administrator. After installation, you can change this using Administer Applications or Administer Applications (Developer).

If any errors occur during installation you can recover the previous version of APD/400.

- If APD/400 V1R2 was installed then type the following command:

```
RSTLIB LIB(QAPD) DEV(TAP01)
```

(The DEV(TAP01) parameter specifies the unit where you have mounted the backup tape/cartridge. Specify the correct name of that unit.)

- If APD/400 V2R2 or V2R3 or V3R1 was installed on your system please refer to “Restoring APD/400” on page 3

You can then analyze the cause of the installation error and start the installation again.

---

## Deleting APD/400

You can delete APD/400 from your system with command DLTLICPGM. Before you delete APD/400 make sure that:

- You have saved all APD/400 data that you may need. Use the OS/400 save commands or the APD/400 Save and Restore options (see “Saving and Restoring Data” on page 99).
- The user profile you use has \*SECADM and \*ALLOBJ authorization.
- Nobody is currently working with APD/400.

- There are no applications installed under APD/400.
- The simplified sign-on panel is not installed.

Delete APD/400 with the following command:

```
DLTLICPGM LICPGM(5716PD1)
```

Deleting APD/400 means that:

- All objects in library QAPD and library QAPD itself are deleted.
- All APD/400 objects in QUSRSYS are deleted.
- All APD/400 objects in QSYS are deleted.
- User profiles QAFOWN, QAFUSR, and QAFDFTUSR are deleted.
- All user profiles that have APD/400 as the initial start program are changed so that they do not have an initial start program.

## Saving APD/400

The following describes how to save the License Program and APD/400 data from QUSRSYS.

### Saving of APD/400 Base Code

You can use the SAVLICPGM command to save a copy of the installation version of APD/400. Use the command as follows:

```
SAVLICPGM LICPGM(5716PD1) DEV(device name)
```

This allows you to create a backup copy of the installation tape. The copy you create will not include any changes you have made to data (menus, authorizations, and so on).

### Backup of APD/400 Data in QUSRSYS

To backup APD/400 data, you must save the APD/400 data base and several APD/400 data areas in library QUSRSYS.

```
SAVOBJ OBJ(QAAF* QAF*) LIB(QUSRSYS) DEV(YOURDEVICE) +  
OBJTYPE(*FILE *DTAARA) PRECHK(*YES)
```

## Restoring APD/400

The following describes how to restore APD/400 should damage occur.

### Restoring APD/400 Base Code

If APD/400 base code is damaged (that is, you cannot start APD/400 and the CHKPRDOPT command reports errors), you must first reinstall APD/400. To do this, follow the procedure described under “Installation Procedure” on page 2.

The APD/400 data in library QUSRSYS will not be replaced.

## Restoring APD/400 Data in QUSRSYS

If the data in library QUSRSYS is damaged (for example, you can start APD/400 but the data appears to be outdated or system messages tell you that files are damaged), you must restore the latest backup of this library. Find the tape that contains the latest backup of library QUSRSYS:

- If you have saved QUSRSYS with the OS/400 SAVLIB command, retrieve the correct tape from your archive.
- If you have saved QUSRSYS with the APD/400 Save and Restore functions, you can determine the tape containing the latest backup from the “List of saved libraries/folders” report that is created with every APD/400 save operation. However, you cannot restore QUSRSYS using the APD/400 Save and Restore functions.

Whether you used the OS/400 SAVLIB command or the APD/400 Save and Restore functions, you must restore the data using the following commands:

```
/*-----*/
/* Restore the APD/400 non-file objects          */
/*-----*/
RSTOBJ OBJ(QAF*)          OBJTYPE(*PGM *DTAARA) +
        SAVLIB(QUSRSYS) DEV(device name)

/*-----*/
/* Restore the APD/400 file objects             */
/*-----*/
RSTOBJ OBJ(QAAF*)        OBJTYPE(*FILE) +
        SAVLIB(QUSRSYS) DEV(device name)

/*-----*/
/* Delete the APD/400 journal objects in QUSRSYS */
/*-----*/
ENDJRNPF FILE(*ALL) JRN(QUSRSYS/QAFJN0)
DLTJRNRCV JRNRCV(QUSRSYS/QAFJR*)
DLTJRN    JRN(QUSRSYS/QAFJR0)

/*-----*/
/* Re-create the APD/400 journal and start journaling */
/*-----*/
CALL      PGM(QAPD/QAFIDSTJR) +
        PARM(QUSRSYS QUSRSYS QAFJN0 QAFJR00000 '0')
```

## Restoring Save and Restore History Data

If you work with the APD/400 Save and Restore functions, you may have a backup of the history data (used in the APD/400 Save and Restore functions) that is more recent than the last backup of library QUSRSYS. In this case, restore the history data from the history tape or diskette.

If you have multiple generations of history data on your tape or diskette, use the DSPTAP command to determine the sequence number of the last backup. Also, look for the save date of the history data. Restore the objects only if the save date of the history data is greater than the save date of library QUSRSYS. To restore the history data, type the following command:

```
RSTOBJ OBJ(QAAFSRA*) SAVLIB(QUSRSYS) SEQNBR(last sequence number) +  
DEV(device name)
```

---

## Checking APD/400

The CHKPRDOPT (Check Product Option) command can be used as follows to check whether APD/400 is installed correctly on your system:

```
CHKPRDOPT PRDID(5716PD1)
```

This command checks whether all required objects of the installed APD/400 exist, and returns a message for each missing object.

If any of the objects do not exist, you can install APD/400 over the existing copy of APD/400.

---

## Installing the APD/400 Batch Monitor Program

APD/400's Batch Monitor Program (BMP) is not automatically started during the installation of APD/400. However, it must be started if it is to be used for the control of batch jobs. Starting the BMP is described in Appendix A, "APD/400 Batch System" on page 115.

To install the APD/400 BMP:

- Start APD/400 with the command STRAPD.
- On the APD/400 main menu, specify 1 (Application Program Driver).
- On APD/400's initial menu, specify 2 (Install and Delete Applications).
- Specify option 3 (Install APD/400 Batch Monitor Program) on Install and Delete Applications.

An autostart job entry is added to the controlling subsystem, which starts the APD/400 BMP. This is the default method of installing the BMP. The other method that you can use is to add the following command to a startup program:

```
STRSBS QAPD/QAFSBS
```

---

## Installing Changes

Select option 4 (Install Changes) on Install and Delete Applications to install changes to applications, or to the system itself, from tape, cartridge or diskette. The changes must be in the "Load and Run" (LODRUN) format.

---

## Installing a Simplified Sign-On Panel

Select option 5 (Install a Simplified Sign-On Panel) on Install and Delete Applications to install a sign-on display with entries only for user and password.

---

**Notes:**

1. The change takes effect only after the system has been powered down and on again.
2. If you want to delete APD/400, the simplified sign-on panel must not be installed.

---

**Installing the Standard Sign-On Panel**

Select option 6 (Install a Standard Sign-On Panel) on Install and Delete Applications to return to the standard sign-on panel that allows entries for program, menu, current library, user, and password.

**Note:** The change takes effect only after the system has been powered down and on again.



## Chapter 2. Installing Applications

This chapter describes:

- Installing an application to run under APD/400
- Tailoring an application to run under APD/400
- Additional installation procedures
- Deleting an application from the APD/400 environment.

Start APD/400 using the command STRAPD. The main menu displays:

```
Options Environment Operations Services Office Help
.....

From APD/400's Main Menu, select option 1 or enter the expert code APD to display the APD/400 initial menu. A window displays the options on the initial menu:

The options that are not available have an asterisk (\*) instead of a number. For example, before a tape is mounted only the options 5 (Display installed applications) and 6 (Mount tape) are available; numbers for the other options are replaced with asterisks.

Specify 6 and press Enter. On the Mount Installation display you specify your tape device. Select a tape device from those listed and press Enter to return to Install Applications. Header information is now shown at the top of the display, and all menu options are now available. (The Define a Data Set option displays only for applications that work with data sets.)

**Note:** The Help text for each selection explains when the selection is not available.

The options are:

- Install this application  
APD/400 installs the application from the tape into the installation and data set as displayed.
- Install all applications  
Installs the current application and all subsequent applications on the tape.
- Skip to next application  
Skips to the next application on the current tape.
- Search for application  
Allows you to enter the application name, abbreviation, or program number, and searches for the application on the current tape.
- Display installed applications  
Displays the applications already installed.
- Mount tape  
Mounts the installation tape when you select a tape unit.

Select another installation

Allows you to select from a list of existing installations and then switches to the installation you choose. The installation you select is displayed in the header information.

Create installation

Allows you to enter an abbreviation and installation name and then creates a new installation.

An installation is a specific processing environment that contains applications and data sets.

You must select the `Select another installation` option to install under the installation you have created.

Define a data set

Allows you to choose a name and an abbreviation and then defines a data set. This option is available only if a data set can be defined for your application.

Select the appropriate options and install your applications. When you exit `Install Applications`, the applications you have installed are displayed.

---

## Tailoring Applications

An application originally written as a stand-alone program to run under a different driver will have a different method of menu handling, exclusions, and authorization control, and these areas must be modified to run under APD/400. This is a task for the APD/400 administrator and the developer of the application.

*IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: Developer's Guide* contains helpful information on library naming conventions, common libraries, data names, and so on.

---

## Additional Installation Procedures

In addition to the installation procedure described, you must perform the following tasks to use APD/400 and the applications installed under it.

### APD/400 Administrator or Security Officer Tasks

You must create the AS/400 user profiles of the application users (the user profile of the application administrator is created during installation of the application, if it is not already on the system). "Administering User Entries" on page 17 describes how to do this.

If you use the OS/400 function `CRTUSRPRF` to create user profiles, specify the command as follows:

```
CRTUSRPRF INLPGM(QSYS/QAFINLPG) LMTCPB(*YES)
```

This creates a user profile for a user:

- To go directly to APD/400 at sign-on
- With no access to the OS/400 command level (QCMD).

## Application Administrator Tasks

If the application is installed with authorization lists, users must be assigned to these authorization lists according to their requirements. For an explanation of how to do this, refer to “Administering Authorization Lists” on page 23.

---

### Deleting an Application

Select option 2 on the Install and Delete Applications menu to display Delete Applications.

When you delete an application, the following are deleted:

- All application data from APD/400 libraries
- All application libraries
- All application data sets
- The application interface program (AIP)
- All APD/400 control information for the application (menus, authorization lists, and so on)
- All textual data for the application
- All application Help folders (if not used by other applications).

#### Notes:

1. Delete Applications can be used only by the application administrator.
2. Users must not be working with applications (this includes any pending restarts).

#### Installation

Enter the name of the installation under which the application is installed. This is a required input field.

## Application

Enter the name of the application to be deleted. This is a required input field.

After you have confirmed your entries, several checks are performed. Errors are displayed as messages on the **Delete Applications** display. These errors must be corrected before you can delete the application.

During deletion, APD/400 performs the following checks:

- **Installation exists**

The installation that includes the application to be deleted must exist. If it does not exist, an error message is issued and the delete operation is interrupted.
- **Authorization to delete**

Only the authorized application administrator can delete an application. If another user tries to delete the application, an error message is issued and the delete operation is interrupted.
- **Application exists**

The application to be deleted must exist. If it does not exist, an error message is issued and the delete operation is interrupted.
- **APD/400 must not be deleted**

APD/400 must not be specified as the application to be deleted. If it is, an error message is issued and the delete operation is interrupted.
- **Application is required for other applications**

The application to be deleted must not be used by other applications. If it is, an error message is issued and the delete operation is interrupted.
- **Data libraries saved**

The data libraries of the application must have been saved on the day of deletion. If this has not been done, the delete operation is interrupted and a message is displayed for each library that does not have the current date assigned as the date of the last save operation. You can confirm, or cancel the deletion and save the libraries concerned.

If libraries need to be saved, the **Confirm Deletion of Application** display appears:

If you type Y because you do not want to save any libraries, the deletion process continues. Enter N or press F12 (Cancel) to end Confirm Deletion of Application. The contents of the current library are not saved.

When all libraries have been saved, the following display appears:

Entering N (No) or pressing F12 (Cancel) ends Confirm Deletion of Application without deleting. The Delete Applications display reappears.

Enter Y (Yes) and press Enter and the delete process is started. Completion or error messages are displayed as applicable.

If the Help for the deleted application was provided through display files or panel groups, the library containing the Help objects is not deleted, unless it is identical to an application library. A message informs you that the library was not deleted.

**Note:** Deleting the application does not automatically delete the user profile of the application administrator. If you want to delete this user profile, use the DLTUSRPRF system command or the Administer User Entries option (see “Administering User Entries” on page 17).



## Chapter 3. Defining the Application Environment

This chapter provides information on defining users and applications within the APD/400 environment. Tasks include user, user group, and authorization assignment, menu creation and manipulation, conflict management (exclusions), and batch environment definition.

**Note:** If you change APD/400 definitions, refer to Appendix C, "IBM Supplied Objects" on page 127. Your changes may be replaced by new APD/400 definitions in future releases.

Select 1 on the APD/400 initial menu or enter the expert code ADMMDTA to display Administer Master Data.

- 8 Administer Batch Environments
- 9 Administer Timetables

From Administer Master Data you can work in the following areas:

## **User and Authorization**

### **Administer User Entries**

Used to assign user entries to the APD/400 user file, the OS/400 user profile, and, where applicable, the OfficeVision/400 user file. See “Administering User Entries” on page 17.

### **Administer User Groups**

Used to group users with identical authorizations (access rights to APD/400 or application functions such as tasks, data sets, or batch environments). See “Administering User Groups” on page 20.

### **Administer Authorization Lists**

Used to assign authorizations for users and user groups to APD/400 or application functions such as tasks, data sets, and batch environments. See “Administering Authorization Lists” on page 23.

### **Print Authorization Environment**

Used to define parameters for producing reports on the authorizations currently defined in your APD/400 environment. See “Print Authorization Environment” on page 29.

## **Menus**

### **Administer Menus**

Used to create and change menus, and to assign task options and authorizations to a menu. See “Administering Menus” on page 34.

### **Administer Menu Headings**

Used to create and change menu headings (the first three lines on a menu display). This option is used in conjunction with Administer Menus. You create a heading and then assign it to a menu. See “Administering Menu Heading Formats” on page 55.

## **Exclusions**

### **Administer Exclusions**

Used to define mutually exclusive programs or program groups. See “Working with Exclusions” on page 64.

## **Batch Processing**

### **Administer Batch Environments**

Used to define the parameters necessary to run batch tasks for an application. See “Administering Batch Environments” on page 75.

### **Administer Timetables**

Used to define the timetables for recurring batch jobs. See “Administering Timetables” on page 78.

## **Miscellaneous**

### **Administer Data Sets**

Used to create data sets. For example, data sets could be created in an application for projects, departments, and clients. See “Administering Data Sets” on page 83.

### **Administer Applications**

Used to change the text of an application, to reassign the application administrator, to change the audit details, to change how application menus are presented, and to make settings such as Use Authorization Checking,

Use Exclusion Checking, Work with Data Sets and Work with Defaults in APIs. See “Administering Applications” on page 85.

#### Administer Parameters

Used to change the values of the APD/400 parameter file. See “Administering Parameters” on page 93.

#### Multilingual support

APD/400 provides multilingual support for applications. All text fields that are enabled for multilingual support are noted in the displays described in this chapter. For more information on APD/400's multilingual support features, see Appendix B, “Multilingual Support” on page 119.

---

## Specifying Users and Authorization

Tasks within the Administer User Entries menu enable you to define users of APD/400, the AS/400 system, and, where applicable, the OfficeVision/400 system.

The tasks provided by the Administer User Groups and the Administer Authorization Lists menus enable you to specify the APD/400 operating environment for individuals or groups of users by defining their authorization levels. The names of the authorization lists can then be used in Administer Menus, Administer Data Sets, and Administer Batch Environments to determine the users and user groups that are authorized to work with the respective menus, data sets, and batch environments.

## Administering User Entries

Administer User Entries enables you to register users in the APD/400 user file, the corresponding OS/400 user profile and, where applicable, the OfficeVision/400 user file, and to change default information in these files.

**Note:** Administer User Entries performs global housekeeping. Access is therefore restricted to user profiles with the special authority \*SECADM (QSECOFR has this authority).

To work with Administer User Entries, specify 1 on the Administer Master Data menu or enter the expert code ADMUSR. All user profiles available on your system are listed.

**Notes:**

1. After working on an APD/400 user file, you are taken into the corresponding OS/400 user profile. See *AS/400 Programming: Security Concepts and Planning* for more information on OS/400 procedures.
2. If OfficeVision/400 is installed on your AS/400, you are taken into the relevant administrative OfficeVision/400 menu to perform the corresponding task.

To add a user entry, press F6 (Add) and Add User Entry is displayed.

On this display you can add a user entry to the APD/400 user file. On further displays, you can create an OS/400 user profile, and (where applicable) an OfficeVision/400 user file.

User ID

The ID of the new user.

User text

For information purposes only. This can be, for example, the name or department of the user.

Start installation

The ID of the initial installation for the user. This is the installation the user works with when signing on to APD/400. This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

Start program

The name of the initial task (program, system command, or process list) called when the user signs on to APD/400. This task must exist in the defined Application. This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

Application

Enter the application to which the specified Start program belongs.

Press Enter to save the information. OS/400 Create User Profile is displayed. Follow OS/400 procedures for creating user profiles.

### Changing User Entries

Specify option 2 (Change) in the corresponding option column on Administer User Entries to change a user entry. Change User Entry is displayed. Its layout is similar to Add User Entry. You can change the fields:

- User text
- Start installation
- Start program
- Application

Make the required changes and press Enter to display OS/400 Change User Profile. Follow OS/400 procedures for changing user profiles.

### Deleting User Entries

Specify option 4 (Delete) in the corresponding option column on Administer User Entries to display Display User Entry for Deletion. If you confirm deletion, OS/400 Delete User Profile is displayed.

### Displaying User Entries

Specify option 5 (Display) in the corresponding option column on Administer User Entries for Display User Entry.

## Administering User Groups

Administer User Groups enables you to combine groups of users with the same processing characteristics, for example, users with the same access rights for applications and data sets.

User groups facilitate the administration of authorization controls in the APD/400 environment. You do not have to define access rights for each individual APD/400 user. Defining access rights to menus, tasks, data sets, and so on, for groups of users reduces administrative work and clarifies authorization control.

**Note:** User groups are valid only for the application for which you define them, and cannot be used across different applications.

To work with Administer User Groups, specify 2 on the Administer Master Data menu or enter the expert code ADMUSRGRP.

### Adding Users to the User Group

Enter a descriptive text for the new user group in the field User group text.

**Note:** You can enter &msg symbols in this field to retrieve text for a specific language. For more information on multilingual support, see Appendix B, “Multilingual Support” on page 119.

No users are displayed, as no users have yet been added to the user group. Press F6 (Add) to display Add User to User Group. Enter the ID of a user to be added to the user group and press Enter. This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

**Note:** The ID you enter must exist on the system. The user text is retrieved from the OS/400 user profile.

Change User in User Group reappears. Press F5 (Refresh) to see the new ID in the list. Repeat this process for all IDs that you want to include in the new user group, and then press F5 (Refresh) on Change User in User Group. The new user group can now be specified in authorization lists to give authorization to menus, tasks, and so on, for users in the group.

### Changing User Groups

Specify option 2 (Change) in the corresponding option column of Administer User Groups to display Change User in User Group. You can add or delete a user, or change the user group text. See “Adding Users to the User Group” to add a user to the user group. To delete a user from the user group, specify option 4 (Delete) in the corresponding option column to display Delete User from User Group. Press Enter to confirm deletion, or F12 to cancel.



## Copying User Groups

Specify option 3 (Copy) in the corresponding option column of Administer User Groups to display Copy User Group, which is used to copy all members of a user group to a new user group.

Enter the name of the new user group. Press Enter to display Change User in User Group.

Add users to the group by pressing F6 (Add), or delete users by selecting option 4 (Delete). You can also enter a descriptive text for the new user group. Press Enter to create the new group.

## Deleting User Groups

Specify option 4 (Delete) in the corresponding option column of Administer User Groups to display Delete User Group. Press Enter to confirm deletion or F12 to cancel.

**Note:** You cannot delete a user group that still has an entry in an authorization list.

## Displaying User Groups

Specify option 5 (Display) in the corresponding option column of Administer User Groups to display a user group.

# Administering Authorization Lists

Authorization lists enable you to define the access rights for individual users and groups of users for APD/400 functions such as tasks, menus, batch environments, data sets, processing lists, and so on.

You determine which user is able to access a certain function by:

- Defining one or more authorization lists.
- Defining which users or user groups are authorized for defined authorization lists and what level of authorization they have.
- Defining for each function which authorization list controls access to the function.

For each authorization list, 10 levels of authorization rights can be defined (0 to 9). Level 0 means no authorization; a level greater than 0 means authorization.

### Notes:

1. Any authorization level specified for a user overrides the authorization level specified for the default user entry (\*ALL).
2. If a user is a member of a user group and also has a separate user entry, the authorization level of the single-user entry overrides that of the user group.
3. If a user is a member of several user groups with different authorization levels, the highest authorization level overrides the others.
4. The APD/400 administrator is always allowed to call Administer Authorization Lists. This is to prevent a deadlock situation in which no user is allowed to call this function while performing an interactive task.

5. If the setting Use Authorization Checking is switched off, each user operates with authorization level=9 inside this application.

To work with Administer Authorization Lists, specify 3 on the Administer Master Data menu or enter the expert code ADMAUT.

Enter the following information:

Type

The type of entry (U=Single User, G=User Group).

User/user group

The ID of a single user, or the name of a user group, already defined for the system. User text is retrieved from the user's OS/400 user profile; user group text is retrieved from Administer User Groups (see "Administering User Groups" on page 20). This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

Authorization level

The authorization level (0-9) to be assigned to the user or user group. Only authorization levels for which you have entered text are valid. This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

Press Enter to add the user or user group to the authorization list.

**Changing Entries in an Authorization List:** Specify option 2 (Change) to display Change Entry in Authorization List. On this display you can change the authorization level of the user or user group. Press Enter when you have made the change.

**Deleting Entries from an Authorization List:** Specify option 4 (Delete) to display Delete Entry from Authorization List. Press Enter to confirm the deletion.

**Working with User Groups:** Specify option 12 (Work with user groups) to display Change User in User Group (see Page 22). On this display you can add or delete a user, or change the text for the user group.

## Changing Authorization Lists

To change an authorization list, or add, change, or delete entries in the authorization list, specify option 2 (Change) in the corresponding option column of Administer Authorization Lists. Change Authorization List displays.

You can change the authorization list text, the user-exit program name, and the level texts. You cannot overwrite a level text if that level is currently specified for a list entry.

When you have made the required changes, press Enter. If you specified a user-exit program, the changes are complete, otherwise the second page of Change Authorization List is displayed. There you can add, change, delete, or work with entries (user groups).

**Changing Entries in an Authorization List:** You can change the authorization level for selected entries of an authorization list by specifying option 2 (Change) in the corresponding option column on any of the following:

- Page 3 of Add Authorization List (see Figure 16 on page 26)
- Page 2 of Change Authorization List
- Page 3 of Copy Authorization List.

Change Entry in Authorization List is displayed. You must have entered text for the level you specify in the authorization list.

**Deleting Entries from an Authorization List:** To delete an entry from an authorization list, specify option 4 (Delete) in the corresponding option column on any of the following:

- Page 3 of Add Authorization List (see Figure 16 on page 26)
- Page 2 of Change Authorization List
- Page 3 of Copy Authorization List.

To confirm deletion, press Enter on the Delete Entry from Authorization List display.

## **Copying Authorization Lists**

To copy an authorization list and all its entries to a new authorization list, specify option 3 (Copy) in the corresponding option column of Administer Authorization Lists.

On Copy Authorization List enter the name of the new authorization list, and then do one of the following:

- Press F8 (Page Down) to display the second page of Copy Authorization List
- Press Enter to copy all information from the existing authorization list to the new authorization list.

The second page of Copy Authorization List enables you to change the information that has been copied. After making any necessary changes, press Enter.

If a user-exit program is specified, the definition of the new authorization list is complete, otherwise the third page of Copy Authorization List is displayed.

On the third page of the Copy Authorization List display, you can:

- Add entries by pressing F6 (see “Adding Entries to an Authorization List” on page 26)
- Change entries by selecting option 2 (see “Changing Entries in an Authorization List” on page 27)
- Delete entries by selecting option 4 (see “Deleting Entries from an Authorization List”)
- Work with entries (user groups only) by selecting option 12 (see “Changing User Groups” on page 22).

## **Deleting Authorization Lists**

To delete an authorization list, specify option 4 (Delete) in the corresponding option column of the Administer Authorization Lists display.

To confirm deletion of the authorization list, press Enter on the Delete Authorization List display.

**Note:** You cannot delete an authorization list still assigned to a task, installation, or data set.

## Displaying Authorization Lists

To display an authorization list, specify option 5 (Display) in the corresponding option column on Administer Authorization Lists. When the authorization list is displayed, press Enter to display the associated users and user groups.

## Print Authorization Environment

Print Authorization Environment enables you to specify the print parameters for the user or object view of an authorization environment. When all parameters have been specified, APD/400 creates a report.

To work with Print Authorization Environment, specify 4 on the Administer Master Data menu or enter the expert code PRTAUT. The following is displayed:

Application

The name of the application to which the report is related. This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

Authorization list usage

State whether the report contains the authorizations, within the given range, for tasks, installations, data sets, or all combinations.

Record name

Where necessary, enter a generic name. For example, SLT\* produces a report for all tasks with the SLT (Select) feature.

When you have specified the necessary parameters, press Enter. The report is added to the output queue. The name of the spool file is QPAFSP111.

**Authorization list usage**

State whether the report contains information for tasks, installations, data sets, or all combinations.

**From authorization level / To authorization level**

State the range of the levels of authorization to be reported.

When you have specified all the necessary parameters, press Enter. The report is added to the output queue. The name of the spool file is QPAFSPP113.

## Structuring Menus

Administration of menus consists of creating tasks that can be used in menus, and combining such tasks into menus. For menu-related functions, APD/400 includes three new features:

- Menu bars and pull-downs
- Windows
- Customizable colors for menus.

Menu bars and pull-downs can be used as an alternative way for a user to work through the application tasks controlled by APD/400. This method differs from original APD/400 menus only in presentation and navigation; the control functions for processing tasks (exclusions, authorizations, restarts, and so on) are supported in the same way.

## **Menu Bars and Pull-Downs**

A menu bar is defined as follows:

- A menu bar is a “container” task that consists of pull-down tasks only.
- Menu bars cannot be contained in menus, process lists, or pull-downs.
- Menu bar tasks cannot be started using an expert code.
- A menu bar can be assigned to any menu within an application (the menu and menu bar must belong to the same application).

A new function SWTMNUBAR (switch menu bar setting) allows a user to decide whether or not to work with menu bars.

A pull-down is also a container task that is defined as follows:

- A pull-down task can contain up to nine other tasks of type Command, Process list, Menu, or Program.
- Pull-downs can be used only as menu bar choices.
- Pull-downs cannot be contained in menus or process lists.
- Pull-downs cannot be started using an expert code.

## **Windows**

Menus can now be displayed in windows. A new function SWTMNUWDW (switch window setting) allows a user to decide whether or not to work with menus in windows.

## **Customizable Colors and Styles for Menus**

You can specify how full-screen menus and menu windows are presented. The color and style of various components of displays and windows can be specified, including menu bar, title area, window border, menu option area, and command line.

## **Container and Processing Tasks**

The six task types provided with APD/400 can be divided into container tasks and processing tasks. Container tasks provide access to processing tasks. Processing tasks perform functions. The following are container tasks:

- Menu bar
- Pull-down
- Process list
- Menu.

The following are processing tasks:

- Command
- Program.

## Batch and Interactive Tasks

Tasks can be performed in batch or interactively. Command, program, and process list tasks can be performed in batch or interactively. Menu bar, pull-down, and menu tasks can be performed only interactively.

## Menus

From a menu, you can call any of the following types of task:

- Program
- Command
- Process List
- Menu.

Menu options (tasks in a menu) are displayed in one or two columns. The APD/400 administrator determines whether all the menus of an application are displayed in single-column or in double-column mode (see “Administering Applications” on page 85).

If you include a system command or a program task in a menu, the associated system command or program is run when the corresponding option number is selected.

A process list task calls a process list. A process list is a combination of program or command tasks run in sequence automatically. Another process list cannot be run within a process list. Only the last task of an interactive process list can be a menu task.

For each menu or process list, a display presents a list of all tasks currently included in the menu or process list. From this display, you can add, change, or delete tasks, or change the sequence of the tasks. If you have changed a menu, the new version of the menu is available immediately. If, however, you do not want to call the actual menu, you can use a function key to simulate the menu display.

You can see APD/400's standard menu heading layout on the menus that are shipped with APD/400. This menu heading format can be used for the new menus you create. You can, however, design your own menu heading formats.

If you are using more than one installation, select the required installation before administering menus (see “Selecting Installations” in *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: User's Guide*).

The name of an existing application for which you want to create the new task. This is a required field. This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

#### Task

The name of the new task. In the example in Figure 22 on page 35, the task is PAYCHECK. This is a required field.

**Note:** This becomes the expert code of the task.

#### Task type

Valid task types are:

- B** Menu bar
- C** System command
- D** Pull-down
- L** Process list
- M** Menu
- P** Program.

To create a program task, enter a P in this field. This is a required field.

#### Type of processing

Valid processing types are:

- B** Batch
- I** Interactive.

This is a required field.

**Note:** Only program, command, and process list tasks can be processed as batch tasks.

**Authorization**

The name of an existing authorization list that controls access to this task. This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

**Help text**

The Help source for this task is specified with these fields. Because different Help types are available, depending on the definition of the application, both prompt texts are output fields, which are filled with the respective values during run time:

If you want the user to be able to define an environment at schedule time, but want to suggest a batch environment here, specify an environment and Y for Batch environment at the bottom of the display.

If you do not know which environment may be appropriate for the user at schedule time, leave this field blank and specify Y for Batch environment at the bottom of the display.

This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

**Parameter program**

Enter the name of a parameter program, or leave the field blank.

**Note:** If you enter the name of a parameter program, it must already exist in the system.

If the batch job you are defining requires a detailed parameter, use an application program to create the parameter. The application program can be called by APD/400 at schedule time, request data from the user, check the data, and build the parameter. For more information, see the description of the Overwrite Batch Task Parameter (BCHPRM) user exit in *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: Developer's Guide*.

The application developer will supply the program name to be entered here.

#### Initial status

Enter the initial status of the job when it is scheduled.

Specify RDY to allow the APD/400 monitor to submit the job at the planned time. This is the value you will normally use.

Specify HLD to ignore the Submit time. If HLD is specified, the APD/400 monitor ignores the submit time until the user or the OS/400 operator changes the state to RDY using the Work with Scheduled Jobs (WRKSCDJOB) function.

#### Suggested submit time

Enter a time or leave this field blank.

If you want the batch job you are defining to run only at a specific time of day, enter that time here and specify N for the Submit time at the bottom of the display.

If you want the batch job you are defining to always run immediately, leave this field blank and specify N for the Submit time at the bottom of the display.

If you want the batch job you are defining to run at a specific time of day but want the user to be able to change this, enter the time here and specify Y for Submit time at the bottom of the display.

If you want the batch job you are defining to run at any time of day, leave this field blank and specify Y for Submit time at the bottom of the display. In this case, APD/400 suggests the schedule time as submit time, which implies that the job will run immediately. If you want to specify midnight, enter 00:00.

#### Show confirmation display

Enter Y or N. This value is used only if you do not specify a parameter program, and specify N for all prompts under Show a display at schedule time.

In this case, if you specify N, a user may select the task and submit a batch job without having to confirm.

Alternatively, if you specify Y and a user selects the task, a display is shown to allow the user to cancel the task.

#### Message at schedule time

Enter Y or N. When a user schedules a batch job, APD/400 sends a message confirming that it has accepted the batch job.

If an application program was used to enter parameters, this program may have already issued a similar message. In this case, specify N to avoid the APD/400 message.

#### Show a display at schedule time for Submit time

Enter Y or N. If, at schedule time, the user is allowed to enter the submit time, enter Y here. If you enter N, the user, at schedule time, sees the submit time but is not allowed to change it.

Entering Y here also allows the user to select a timetable for this batch task, when the task is submitted, to make it a recurring job.

#### Show a display at schedule time for Batch environment

Enter Y or N. If, at schedule time, the user is allowed to select a batch environment, enter Y here. If you enter N, the user sees the Batch environment name that you have entered in the top part of this display but is not allowed to change it.

Show a display at schedule time for Parameter entry

Enter Y or N. On the previous display, you specified a parameter value that is now part of the task. If, at schedule time, the user is allowed to enter or change that parameter value, enter Y. If you enter N, the user does not see the display that allows modification of the parameter value.

When you press Enter, a task representing a batch job is stored in APD/400, and Administer Menus is redisplayed.

### **Adding a Command Task**

The first steps taken to create this task type are the same as those for program tasks, except that the task type input on the first page of the Add Task display is C (Command).

The second through fourth pages of the Add Task display are the same as those for program tasks except for the following:

1. The third page shows only the Restart and the Audit fields for input.
2. On the fourth page, you enter the command and its parameters. You can use F4 (Prompt) to select the command and parameters using the OS/400 prompt function. If you do not want the command to run immediately, you can also specify that the user completes the command specification using prompts.

If you are defining an interactive command task, press Enter to create the task.

If you are defining a batch command task, press F8 (Page Down) to display the next page of the Add Task display. When you press the Enter key on this display, a task to call a batch system command is stored in APD/400 and the Administer Menus display reappears.

The following are two examples of commands you can use:

- STRPCCMD (Start PC command)
- STRS36PRC (Start System/36 procedure).

For more information on creating tasks, see “Adding a Program Task” on page 35.

**Special Tasks:** Three tasks are supplied with APD/400. These tasks can only be added to pull-downs.

- \*F04 Calls the Select Expert Code function in the same way as pressing F4 (Prompt) on a menu display.
- \*F11 Switches between a menu option display area with and without expert codes, in the same way as pressing F11 (Expert code) on a menu display.
- \*F23 Selects the current menu as the initial menu, in the same way as pressing F23 (Set initial menu) on a menu display.

These tasks are special tasks. If they are deleted they cannot be re-created because Administer Menus does not accept names beginning with an asterisk (\*).

## Adding a Process List Task

The first steps taken to create this task type are the same as those for program tasks, except that the task type input on the first page of the Add Task display is L (Process list).

The second page of the Add Task display is the same as for program tasks. In addition, you can press F10 to specify the tasks required for the process list (see “Adding Options to a Menu or Process List” on page 45).

If you are defining an interactive process list task, you see the word Bottom in the lower right corner of the display. Press Enter to create the new task.

**Note:** Interactive process lists can contain both interactive and batch tasks.

If you are defining a batch process list, you see More in the lower right corner of the display. Press the Page Down key to display the Batch page of Add Task. On this display, you can also press F10 to specify tasks for the process list.

**Note:** Batch process lists can contain only batch tasks.

When you press Enter, a task representing a batch process list is stored in APD/400 and the Administer Menus display reappears.

For more information on creating tasks, see “Adding a Program Task” on page 35.

## Adding a Menu Task

The first steps taken to create this task type (a menu option that calls another menu) are the same as those for program tasks, except that the task type input on the first page of the Add Task display is M (Menu), and the type of processing must be I (Interactive).

The second page of the Add Task display is the same as that for program tasks.

If you press Page Down, the third page of the Add Task display appears:

Menu bar The menu bar to be used on the menu you are creating. This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

Menu usable as window

Whether or not the menu you are creating can be used as a window.

When you press Enter, a task representing a menu is stored in APD/400. Administer Menus is redisplayed.

On Add Task, you can also press F10 to specify the menu options (see "Adding Options to a Menu or Process List").

From this display, you can add, delete, and display the tasks that make up a menu or process list, and also change their sequence. For menus and process lists, these tasks are called options. You can also insert subheadings into menus using F14 (Subheadings), or simulate a menu display using F10 (Simulate).

You can use separate functions to add tasks, delete tasks, and change the sequence of tasks, or you can use power input (see “Using Power Input” on page 47), which is a combination of these functions.

**Application**

The name of the application for which the task to be added has been created. This allows you to add a task from a different application than the one for which this menu, pull-down, or process list has been created. This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

**Task**

The name of the task to be added. This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).

**Option number**

The option number to be assigned to the task. For a process list, this number determines the sequence in which the tasks are processed. The lowest number available is displayed.

Press Enter to add the task to the menu, pull-down, or process list. Administer Options is redisplayed.

**Changing Task Sequence:** Specify option 2 (Change) in the option column on Administer Options to change the sequence of the menu or pull-down options, or the sequence in which the tasks of a process list are processed. You can change the sequence for only one task at a time. The Revise Option display appears.

On this display, you can change the option number (within a menu or pull-down) or the sequence number for processing (within a process list). Press Enter to save the change. The Administer Options display reappears.



**Deleting a Task:** To delete tasks from a menu, pull-down, or process list, specify option 4 (Delete) on the Administer Options display. The Delete Option display appears. Press Enter to confirm the deletion.

**Note:** By using this function, you only remove the task from the menu, pull-down, or process list; the task itself is not deleted.

**Displaying a Task:** Specify option 5 (Display) on Administer Options to display a task.

**Using Power Input:** Power input is a combination of the functions described in “Adding Tasks”, “Changing Task Sequence”, and “Deleting a Task”. Using power input, you can access all these functions on one display.

To use power input, press F16 on the Administer Options display. The Administer Menu display appears.

This display shows all the tasks that you can use in menus, pull-downs, or process lists. The current option numbers of the tasks in the menu, pull-down, or process list, if any, are displayed. These tasks are displayed at the top of the list. All tasks are displayed even if they do not match a subset you define by pressing F18 (Subset).

You can enter the option numbers or processing sequence numbers that you want to assign to the individual tasks of the menu, pull-down, or process list, change the position of a task by typing over the option number, or remove a task by typing over the option number with blanks.

Details on how to work with the Power input function are described in “Creating Your Own Personal Menu” in *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: User's Guide*.

Press Enter to finish revision of the task list. Administer Options reappears.

**Simulating Menu Display:** You can display a menu with its tasks by pressing F10 (Simulate) on Administer Options or Display Task.

Press F3 or F12 to end the simulation. The Administer Options display reappears.

### **Menu Subheadings**

You can group together related options of a menu by inserting subheadings. If it is not the first line of a menu page or column, every subheading is preceded by a blank line. A subheading is displayed even if there are no options to be displayed for it because a user is not authorized to use them.

**Adding a Menu Subheading:** If you want to add a subheading to a menu, press F14 (Subheadings) on the Administer Options display. The Add Menu Subheading display appears.

When you press Enter, Administer Options is redisplayed. Press F5 (Refresh) to see the new subheading at the position you specified.

**Changing a Menu Subheading:** Specify option 2 (Change) in the option column of the Administer Options display to mark the subheading to be changed. The Revise Menu Subheading display appears. 2. After the tasks for the pull-down are created (or already exist), create the pull-down itself.
3. Create the menu bar.
4. Define the pull-downs for the menu bar.
5. Finally, assign the menu bar to a menu.

These steps are now described in more detail:

**Step One: Creating Tasks for the Pull-Down**

Use Add Task to create tasks for the new pull-down. “Adding a Program Task” on page 35 describes how to create a task. For the tasks for a pull-down, all task types can be used except types B=Menu bar and D=Pull-down.

Revise Task and Display Task work in the same way as Add Task. They have the same body, function keys, and messages.

**Step Two: Creating the Pull-Down**

Creating a pull-down is done in the same way as creating a menu except that the task type is D=Pull down. “Adding a Program Task” on page 35 describes how to create a task.

**Note:** The maximum number of choices you can have on a pull-down is nine.

**Step Three: Creating the Menu Bar**

After the pull-downs for the menu bar are created, the menu bar is created to which these pull-downs are assigned. A menu bar is a task with the type B=Menu bar.

The assignments of menu bar choices are entered in the table. Press Enter and the rows are ordered so that there are no empty rows between choices.

When the menu bar is changed, the new order is presented.

**Note:** You can enter &msg symbols in this field to retrieve text for a specific language. For more information on multilingual support, see Appendix B, “Multilingual Support” on page 119. Because of the limited space, you must use the short form of the &msg symbol.

**Application** The application to which the task belongs. This field is supported by F4 (Prompt).



### **Step Five: Assigning the Menu Bar to a Menu**

Administer Menus has been enhanced to include the field Menu bar if the maintained task type is a menu.

Menu bars are defined as follows:

1. If no menu bar is defined at menu level, the menu bar at application level is used (see “Administering Applications” on page 85).
2. If no menu bar is defined at application level, the menu bar at APD/400 level is used.
3. If no menu bar is defined at APD/400 level, a message is displayed that no menu bar is available.

You can add a menu bar to a menu on the third page of Add Task (or the second page of Revise Task). On this display, enter the name of the menu bar in the Menu bar field. The menu bar you specify is displayed when the menu is activated.

### **Changing a Task**

Specify option 2 (Change) in the corresponding option column of Administer Menus to display Revise Task. Its layout and display sequence is the same as Add Task. Use F8 (Page Down) to proceed through the page displays. When you have made all necessary changes, press Enter to save the changed task.

### **Copying a Task**

Specify option 3 (Copy) in the corresponding option column on Administer Menus to display Copy Task.

Copying a task copies the data of an existing task as the basis for a new one, and may be used to create new tasks that are similar to existing ones.

Enter the name of the target application, a new task name (or both), and specify how the task is to be processed (Batch or Interactive).

Press Enter to see all the Revise Task displays that would appear if you specified 2 (Change) to change a task for this combination of task type and processing type. On these displays, you can change the copied values.

**Note:** When you copy a task, and the From Application differs from the To Application, the values for Menu heading format name and Menu bar are not copied (because they may not exist in the To Application). Both are set to blank. The Help fields are copied only if the Help type of the two applications is the same. When you have entered all your changes, press Enter to save the task.

### **Deleting a Task**

Specify option 4 (Delete) in the corresponding option column of Administer Menus to display Delete Task. To confirm deletion of the task, press Enter.



## Displaying a Task

Specify option 5 (Display) in the corresponding option column of Administer Menus for Display Task.

## Administering Menu Heading Formats

Administer Menu Heading Formats enables you to design your own menu headings instead of using APD/400's standard heading layout. The formatted headings you create are not usable in windows. Here, heading is defined as the first three lines of a menu.

For special considerations for multilingual support headings, see Appendix B, "Multilingual Support" on page 119.

You can specify the heading format to be used:

- For all menus of an application, on the second page of Change Application Entry (see "Administering Applications" on page 85).
- For a single menu, on the third page of Add Task or on the second page of Revise Task (see "Adding a Menu Task" on page 44).

A heading format specified for a single menu overrides the heading format specified for the application.

Once you have defined a heading format, you can select it on the displays for as many menus as required.

To work with Administer Menu Headings, specify 6 on the Administer Master Data menu or enter the expert code ADMHDG. APD/400 displays the following:

**Note:** You cannot select variables on this display; it is only for information.

On the actual menu, any variable is displayed at the position of the ampersand (&) you enter on the Revise Menu Heading Format display. If you press Enter after typing a variable, the system extends it to its maximum length, for example, **&A** is extended to **&AAAAAA**.

You can shorten a variable's standard display length by entering as many characters of the variable name as you want to be displayed (minimum three). For example, type **&AAA** to display only the first four characters of the application ID. For many variables, however, shortening display length results in a loss of information.

Consider the maximum length when entering variables. If variables are overlapping each other, the first variable overwrites the following variables and constants. For example:

appears as:

**Specifying Message Constants:** See Appendix B, "Multilingual Support" on page 119 for a description of how to use message constants in menu headings.

**Changing Display Attributes:** If you do not specify a display attribute for a new variable or constant, it appears as normal (on monochrome displays) or in green (on color screens). If you want to accept this as a new constant or variable, or you do not want to change the attribute for an existing constant or variable, press Enter

to complete the definition process. In this case, Revise Menu Heading Format displays with the variables and constants appearing with their maximum lengths. The heading format has been stored and can be specified for menus on application level or menu level.

If you want to specify other display attributes, press F18 on the Revise Menu Heading Format display to call the Select Display Attributes display for the first constant or variable.

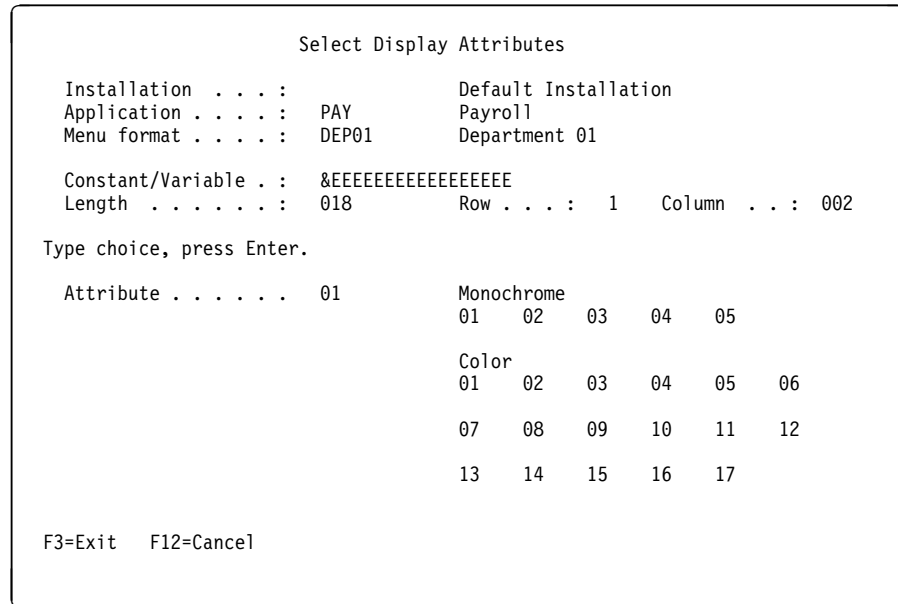


Figure 43. Select Display Attributes

To delete a menu heading format, specify option 4 (Delete) on Administer Menu Headings for the format to be deleted. Delete Menu Heading Format displays, showing information for the selected heading format. To delete the heading format, press Enter.

**Note:** You can delete a menu heading format even if it is still used for a menu or an application. In this case, a warning message is issued.

## Working with Exclusions

You define exclusions to determine which application functions cannot be processed simultaneously. Using exclusions, you can define mutually exclusive tasks. There are a number of reasons for different tasks not to be active simultaneously in an application. For example:

- A save operation should not be started while programs of an application are active or the files are being reorganized.
- In accounting, a daily balance cannot be made while transactions are still being entered.

If you want to specify that tasks A and B cannot run simultaneously, you can exclude task B so that it is not processed while task A is processing. APD/400 automatically generates the reverse exclusion; task A cannot run while task B is running.

These principles apply not only to tasks (functions) but also to OS/400 objects. For example, you can use the APD/400 exclusion function to define that if task B has locked certain OS/400 objects, task A cannot be processed because it needs to access the same objects. Because APD/400 locks the OS/400 objects contained in the object list, applications not running under control of APD/400 are able to determine whether they can process functions that need to access the same objects.

Because it is usually the case that more than two tasks or objects are excluding each other, APD/400's exclusion concept is based on exclusion lists. Exclusion lists combine tasks (in function lists) or objects (in object lists) with the same exclusion characteristics into groups. Only program and command tasks can be

included in exclusion lists. You make these task or object groups mutually exclusive by specifying the corresponding lists when defining exclusions.

The active exclusion list is the one that currently has at least one of its tasks processing or one of its objects being used; the entries of the excluded exclusion list cannot be processed or used.

The following table shows six different cases of exclusions:

- Case 1** If a task that belongs to function list 2 (FL2) is being started, APD/400 checks to see if there is any active task in function list 1 (FL1). If there is, and if this task works with the same data set (exclusion type 1; exclusion types are explained in “Adding Exclusions” on page 67), the request is refused.
- Case 2** If a task that belongs to function list 2 (FL2) is being started, APD/400 checks to see if there is any active task in function list 1 (FL1). If there is, and if this task works with any of the data sets of the application (exclusion type 2), the request is refused.
- Case 3** If a task in function list 1 (FL1) in application 1 is being started, APD/400 calls the user-exit program UEX.PGM. This user exit determines whether or not the task can be processed.
- Case 4** If a task that belongs to function list 1 (FL1) in application 1 is being started, APD/400 tries to allocate all objects as defined in object list 1 (OL1). If symbolic library names (described in *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: Developer's Guide*) are used in the object list, only objects in the data set libraries of the currently active data set that the user uses for application 1 are allocated.
- Case 5** If a task that belongs to function list 1 (FL1) in application 1 is being started, APD/400 tries to allocate all objects as defined in object list 1 (OL1). If symbolic library names are used in the object list, objects in data set libraries of all data sets that the user uses for application 1 are allocated.
- Case 6** If a task that belongs to function list 1 (FL1) is being started, APD/400 checks to see if there is already an active task in function list 1 (FL1). If there is, and if this task works with the same data set of the application, the request is refused. The task can run only once on the system.

For a description of the administration functions for exclusion lists, see “Administering Exclusion Lists” on page 68.

**Note:** If the setting Use Exclusion Checking is switched off for one application it may influence other applications depending on the exclusion definition.

**Case 1:** Tasks of the exclusion list EXCLST1 of application APPL1 exclude tasks of exclusion list EXCLST2 of APPL2.

The setting Use Exclusion Checking for application APPL2 is switched off.

**Result:** No exclusion checking will be performed.

**Case 2:** Tasks in exclusion list EXCLST1 of application APPL1 exclude all other tasks of any application.

The setting Use Exclusion Checking for application APPL1 is switched off.

**Result:** No exclusion checking will be performed.

Now the setting Use Exclusion Checking for other applications (APPLX) is switched off, and for application APPL1 it is switched on.

**Result:** Exclusion checking works, with the exception of tasks from an exclusion list of application APPLX.

To work with the Administer Exclusions function, specify 7 on the Administer Master Data menu, or enter the expert code ADMEXC. APD/400 displays the following:

For exclusion type 3, specify the name of a user-exit program. Refer to *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: Developer's Guide* for a detailed description on how to use user-exit programs for exclusions.

## Batch Processing

A batch environment defines the parameters required for running application tasks under system batch control. Several batch environments may exist for an application; each is identified with a batch environment name. You can prevent users from using a specific batch environment by specifying an authorization list for the environment.

Tasks are submitted using one of the defined batch environments in APD/400. When creating a task, you define whether it is processed interactively or as a batch task. You can also determine the date and time when a batch task is processed; alternatively, you can leave it to the user to determine the start date and time of the submitted batch task.

You can define that batch tasks are processed recurrently, according to a time pattern you define with a timetable. Refer to *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: User's Guide* for information on submitting and scheduling batch tasks. See Appendix A, "APD/400 Batch System" on page 115 for a technical description of the APD/400 batch system.

The following explains in detail how you can administer batch environments and timetables.

## Administering Batch Environments

The Administer Batch Environments function enables you to add, change, delete, and display batch environments. If necessary, select the installation for which you want to define batch environments (*IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: User's Guide* describes how to select an installation).

To work with Administer Batch Environments, specify 8 on Administer Master Data or enter the expert code ADMENV. APD/400 displays the following:

If you enter \*JOBID, the user profile named in the specified job description is used for the job being submitted.

**Note:** Job description \*USRPRF and User \*JOBID are mutually exclusive.

If the profile defined for this batch environment is different from that of a user submitting a batch job into this environment, the following must be noted:

- The job is submitted on behalf of the user whose profile is derived from the batch environment description (the name defined in the User field).
- The profile of the user submitting the job is used by APD/400 to determine, for example, the user's authorization.

“How the APD/400 Batch Scheduler Submits a Job” on page 118 describes how the values of the defined batch environment are used.

After selecting the months, use one or both of the following ways to select the days on which to repeat the recurring batch job:

- Specify the occurrence of specific days of the week on which to process the batch job during the months selected. For example, the second and last occurrence of Wednesday in May, June, and July, or all occurrences of Wednesday and Saturday from January through December.
- Specify the days on which to process the batch job during the months selected. For example, the last day of every month of the year, or the tenth, twentieth, and last day of every month from May through August.

If you use both methods for specifying the repetitive days of the recurring batch job, the job is processed as determined by each of the schedules. However, if both schedules result in processing on the same day, the job is processed only once.

If you do not want to set up specific rules for Saturdays and Sundays, press Enter to complete the definition of the new timetable. Otherwise, press the Page Down key to display the second page of the Revise Timetable display. This page displays for both time interval and calendar timetables.

Specify option 4 (Delete) on Administer Timetables to delete a timetable. Delete Timetable is displayed. Press Enter to confirm the deletion.

**Note:** You can only delete a timetable if there are no related recurring jobs awaiting batch processing.

## Controlling the System Environment

APD/400 enables you to work with different data sets within an application. For example, if you do accounting for several clients, you could enter each client's data in a separate data set. You can also use different data sets to distinguish different projects or departments.

You can influence assignment of authorizations at the data set level by specifying an authorization list name for the data set. Under APD/400 you can also use applications that work with or without data sets.

Check with the developer of your application to find out if it would be useful for you to define data sets for the application.

## Administering Data Sets

To work with Administer Data Sets, specify 10 on Administer Master Data or enter the expert code ADMDS.

**Note:** If your application uses the ADMNSTE (Administer Data Set Entries) user exit (described in *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: Developer's Guide*), there may be additional Administer Data Sets displays (provided by your application) to those described here.

### Data set

The ID of the new data set.

Check with the developer of your application to see whether you can define data sets, and if so, how they should be named.

### Text

The descriptive name of the new data set.

**Note:** You can enter &msg symbols in this field to retrieve text for a specific language. For more information on multilingual support, see Appendix B, “Multilingual Support” on page 119.

### Authorization

The name of the authorization list controlling access to the new data set.

Press Enter to create the new data set.

## Changing Data Sets

Specify option 2 (Change) in the corresponding option column of Administer Data Sets to display Change Data Set Entry.

## Deleting Data Sets

## Administering Applications

During installation of an application, a record is created in the Application file for the application. Using the Administer Applications function you can change the application values in the record. You can change:

- The text for the application
- The application administrator
- Audit details
- How the menu displays of the application are presented.
- Settings to switch off performance intensive functions can be selected.

### Notes:

1. You must be enrolled as the APD/400 administrator in the APD\_ADMIN authorization list to use Administer Applications and Administer Applications (Developer). If necessary, the APD/400 administrator can enroll other users in the APD\_ADMIN authorization list.
2. If a user is allowed to use Administer Applications or Administer Applications (Developer), another check is performed on the application level. Only a user assigned as administrator for the application is allowed to change entries. All users are allowed to create new entries. The APD/400 administrator is always allowed to change entries.
3. If the administrator of an application is changed, APD/400 updates the authorization list for the application (APL\_ADMIN). Entries are deleted from APL\_ADMIN for users who are not administrators of applications.

To work with Administer Applications, specify 11 on Administer Master Data, or enter the expert code ADMAPL. APD/400 displays the following:

A descriptive text for the application. This is a required input field of up to 40 characters.

**Note:** You can enter &msg symbols in this field to retrieve text for a specific language. For more information on multilingual support, see Appendix B, “Multilingual Support” on page 119.

Application administrator

This must be an existing OS/400 user ID. This is a required input field of up to ten characters; it is supported by F4 (Prompt).

**Note:** The way that APD/400 reorganizes the authorization files when the administrator of an application changes is as follows:

- If an entry for the new administrator exists, this remains unchanged.
- If no entry for the new administrator exists, APD/400 creates an entry with the authorization 1.
- If an entry exists for the previous administrator, and the previous administrator is not the administrator of another application, APD/400 deletes the entry. Display menus in windows

The definition on application level of whether menus should be displayed in window or full-screen format. This is the default that APD/400 uses if nothing is specified for the tasks of the application.

In this panel you have the option to perform the function Select Display Attributes by pressing F18=Change attributes.

Press F8(Page Down) to display the last page of Change Application Entry

These settings are to reduce the performance overhead of interactive tasks. Only the interactive part of APD/400 is touched by these settings, until the call to the AIP is performed. To improve the performance for the AIP and calls initiated from the AIP. Refer to *APD/400 Developer's Guide, Chapter 2, Set and Reset an Application Environment*.

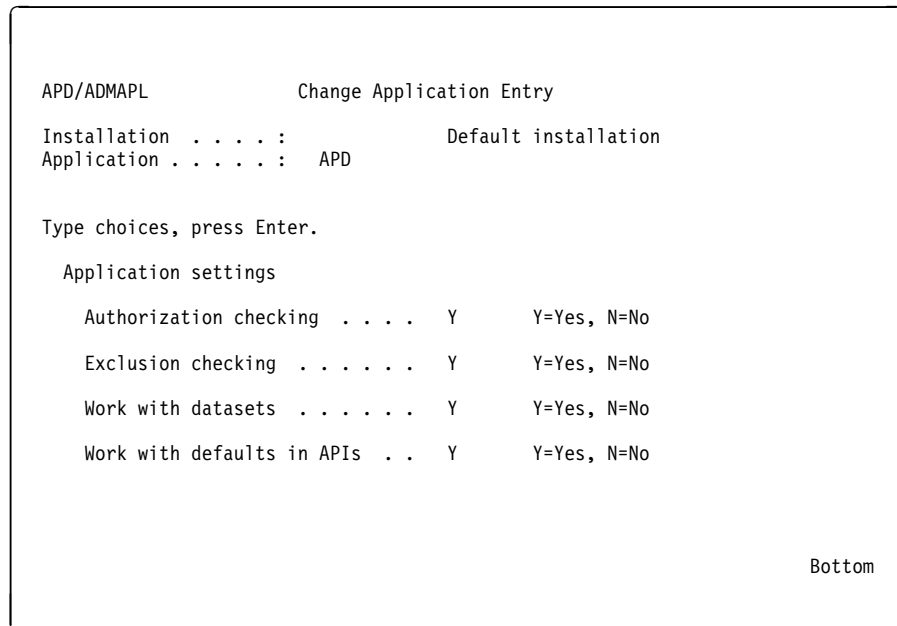


Figure 73. Change Application Entry (Page 3)

You can change the following settings:

Authorization checking

Enter Y to specify that the described authorization environment should be used, this means that authorization checking should be performed. This is the recommended setting.

Enter N to specify that no authorization checking should be performed to improve performance. Each user is then authorized to perform each task of the application.

**Note:** If Authorization checking is switched off for an application while performing an interactive task, the function Check authorization will not be performed for this application, although an authorization list is defined for this task.

#### Exclusion checking

Enter Y to specify that exclusion checks for exclusions should be performed. This is the recommended setting.

Enter N to specify that tasks of an exclusion list of this application should not be checked whether they can be performed or whether they are excluded. This will improve the performance of a task call.

#### Work with data sets

Enter Y to specify that tasks of a multi-data-set-enabled application can be called. This is the recommended setting.

Enter N to specify not to work with multi-data-set-enabled applications. This will improve the performance of a task call.

**Note:** If you have installed multi-data-set-enabled applications and you have entered N, you are not able to perform any tasks of this application until all data sets have been deleted.

#### Work with defaults in APIs

Enter Y to store information of the current APD/400 session so that it can be used by APIs. This is the recommended setting.

Enter N if this information is not required. This improves the performance of a task call. The APIs can only be called without using defaults (\*).(See the relating API description in the *APD/400 Developer's Guide*).

Press Enter after making the necessary changes. Administer Applications is redisplayed.

**Note:** It is recommended that changes are made while no user working with this application. To ensure that the changes take effect the users should restart APD after the changes have been made.

### Selecting Display Attributes

Select Display Attributes allows the administrator or developer to change the presentation of full-screen menus and windows. To display Select Display Attributes, press F18 (Change attributes) on the Change Application Entry display.

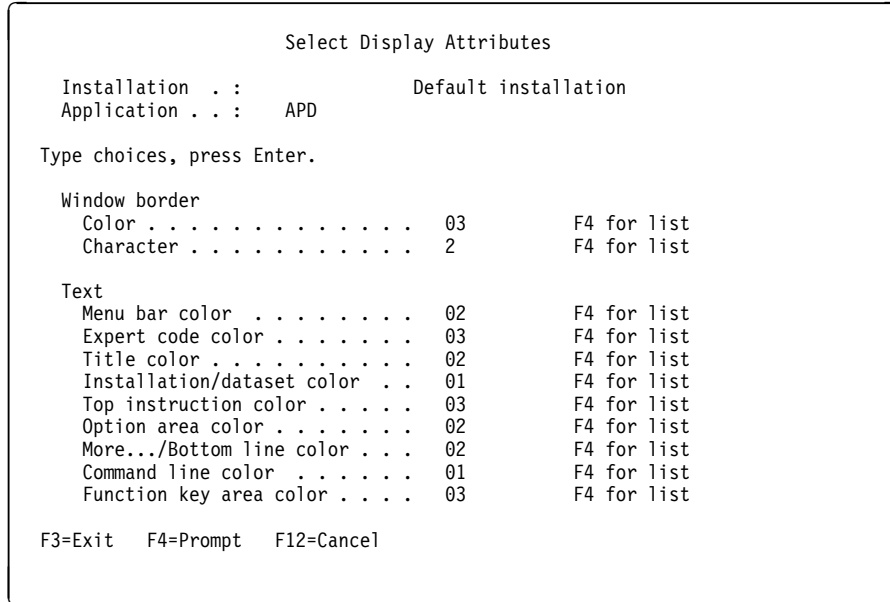


Figure 74. Select Display Attributes

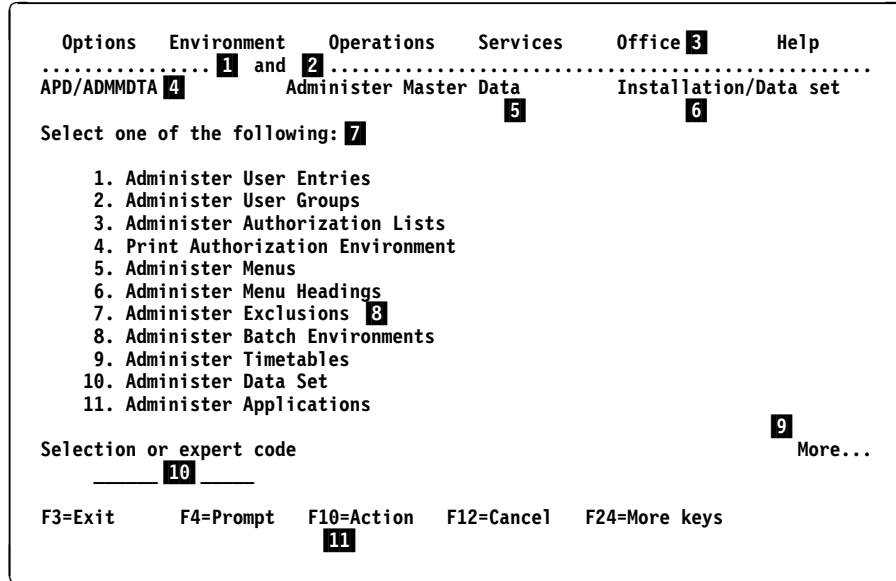


Figure 75. Display Areas

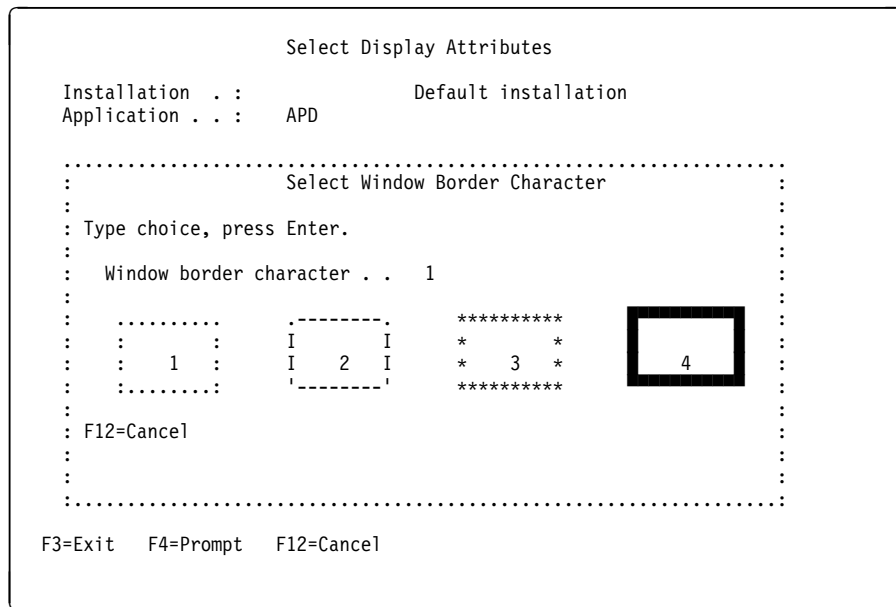


Figure 76. Select Window Border Character

## Batch Parameters

### APD\_BATCH\_FUTURE\_DAYS

This entry defines a period of time in the future. When a job is submitted with a planned processing time beyond this period of time, APD/400 issues a message for the user to confirm the specified processing time.

The value supplied with the APD/400 parameter file is 5.

The value must be between 0 and 99; otherwise the default value of 99 is used.

See the description of parameter APD\_BATCH\_PAST\_MINUTES.

### APD\_BATCH\_PAST\_MINUTES

This entry defines a period of time in the past. When a job is submitted with a planned processing time prior to this period of time, APD/400 issues a message for the user to confirm the specified processing time.

The value must be between 0 and 9999. If you do not enter a value, 9999 is used.

The value supplied with the APD/400 parameter file is 60.

### APD\_RESCHEDULE\_DELAY

This APD/400 system value is the delay in minutes between two reschedules. If the Batch Gate Program detects a clash situation, the task is rescheduled for:



<current time plus APD\_RESCCHEDULE\_DELAY>

The value for APD\_RESCCHEDULE\_DELAY can be any number between 1 and 99. The default is 10 minutes.

### **APD\_RESCHEduLES**

The number of reschedules used by APD/400 batch processing. If the APD/400 batch processing function detects a clash situation, the task is rescheduled with a new date and time.

APD\_RESCHEduLES defines how often rescheduling is carried out until the task is considered to have failed. The value for APD\_RESCHEduLES can be any number between 0 and 99. The default is 5.

### **APD\_MON\_AUTOSTART**

When APD/400 is started, its start program checks whether or not the BMP has been started. (For more information on the BMP, see Appendix A, "APD/400 Batch System" on page 115.) Usually, the BMP should have been started with IPL. If the BMP has not yet been started, APD/400's start program checks this parameter.

The value must be \*YES or \*NO. If you specify \*YES, the BMP is started. The default value is \*YES.

### **APD\_MON\_JOBd**

When you invoke a task that runs as a batch job, you can specify the batch environment to be used by the job. Batch environments are defined by the application administrator.

The environment contains:

- Job description (APD\_MON\_JOBd) and job description library (APD\_MON\_JOBdLIB)
- Output queue (APD\_MON\_OUTQ) and output queue library (APD\_MON\_OUTQLIB)
- Job queue (APD\_MON\_JOBQ) and job queue library (APD\_MON\_JOBQLIB).

If no environment is specified on the task level, these values are used for job description, job queue, and output queue.

Data from the environment definition is used by the monitor program to specify the OS/400 environment for batch jobs. If no value for a job description can be found, the value specified for APD\_MON\_JOBd is used.

Specify a value valid in your OS/400 environment. If OS/400 rejects a job because the value for the job description is invalid, the job is unable to be processed. Use Work with Canceled Jobs to start the job again. This is only possible if the task was defined as restartable. Refer to *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: User's Guide* for an explanation of how to restart a failed task.

## Reorganization Parameters

### APD\_REORG\_ADAUDTO

This entry contains the number of days that records are kept in the Audit file. The value must be between 1 and 999. The default value is 30.

### APD\_REORG\_ADSCDLO

This entry contains the number of days that records with status END or CNL are kept in the schedule table.

The value must be between 1 and 999 or \*NOJOB; the default value is \*NOJOB. \*NOJOB checks to see if the corresponding job exists on the system. If \*NOJOB is specified, no reorganization of the schedule is performed. This may affect the performance of your operating system.

### APD\_REORG\_LEVEL

This entry contains a number between 0 and 9 that defines the default reorganization level for APD/400's database reorganization. This reorganization is carried out by the BMP after it is called. Refer to "Requesting Periodical Reorganization" on page 113 for a detailed description of this value.

### APD\_DLT\_JRNRCV

When APD/400 database files are reorganized, the reorganization program checks this parameter. The value can be \*YES or \*NO. The default value is \*YES.

**Note:** APD/400 uses database journaling for some files to guarantee data consistency. The journal receiver used is QAFJRN0nnnn (nnnn is a number between 0000 and 9999), which is stored in library QUSRSYS. However, the number of journal receivers increases every time APD/400 is started, and you may want to save disk space.

All journal receivers named QAFJR0nnnn in the QUSRSYS library are saved to the save file QUSRSYS/QSAFRZSVJR. You can save this file to tape using the SAVSAVFDTA command after reorganization.

If the value is \*YES, APD/400 deletes all journal receivers in the APD/400 library except for the one currently attached to the journal.

## IPL/Power Down Parameters

### APD\_IPL\_DAY\_OF\_WEEK

This parameter contains a template that specifies on which days of the week the system is powered on by APD/400. The template is a 7-character string with each character position representing one day of the week, with the first position representing Monday. The character can either be a number (1 = Monday through 7 = Sunday) or a hyphen. A number indicates that an IPL is to be scheduled for the day of the week represented by the number. A hyphen indicates that no IPL is to be scheduled for this day of the week. For example, if the template is 12-45-- an IPL is scheduled for the next Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday; no IPL is scheduled for Wednesday, Saturday, and Sunday.

### APD\_IPL\_TIME

This parameter contains the time for performing an IPL on the days defined in APD\_IPL\_DAY\_OF\_WEEK. A valid time entry, in the format hh:mm:ss, is required. You must type leading zeros (08:30:00 is the correct format; 8:30:00

is not accepted). This value is used to schedule the next IPL, using the OS/400 system value QIPLDATTIM. This system value is changed to the value APD/400 computes from the parameters APD\_IPL\_DAY\_OF\_WEEK and APD\_IPL\_TIME, when APD/400's batch monitor starts running (usually at IPL time). The QIPLDATTIM value is recalculated when APD/400 powers down the AS/400 system, or when the APD\_IPL\_TIME or APD\_IPL\_DAY\_OF\_WEEK value is changed. The IPL is always scheduled for the **next** specified day, and not for the current day.

#### **APD\_PWRDWN\_DELAY**

This parameter contains the time delay to be used when the system is powered down according to the APD\_PWRDWN\_TIME parameter. Valid time delay values are 0 through 99999 (seconds). If you do not specify any value, the default value (3600 seconds) is used. If you specify 0 (zero), the system is powered down at the time specified for the APD\_PWRDWN\_TIME value.

#### **APD\_PWRDWN\_TIME**

This parameter contains the time for powering down the system. A valid time entry must have the format hh:mm:ss. You must type leading zeros as described for APD\_IPL\_TIME. If you enter \*N0 or no value, no power down is invoked by APD/400.

Using APD/400's BMP, the power down feature allows you to schedule running of the AS/400 system command PWRDWN SYS for a specified time in the future.

For example, you specify 22:00:00 as the APD\_PWRDWN\_TIME and 1800 (seconds) as the APD\_PWRDWN\_DELAY. At 22:00:00, APD/400 issues a message to all users who are working on the system at that time, informing them that the system will be powered down at 22:30:00. At 22:30:00, the BMP powers down the system immediately without issuing any warning.

#### **Notes:**

1. APD/400's power down feature is invoked only if the BMP is active.
2. If you specify an APD\_PWRDWN\_TIME value, the system is powered down every day at the same time.
3. If you see the message informing you that the system will be powered down, you can prevent the system power down. Use any of the following (providing you have been assigned the required APD/400 authorizations):
  - Call the Administer Master Data menu and select Administer Parameters to specify \*N0 as the APD\_PWRDWN\_TIME value. Other users, however, are not informed about this change.
  - Select Work with the APD/400 Batch System on the Service Functions menu to switch batch monitor scheduling off (batch monitor status is "Not activating").

### **Miscellaneous Parameters**

#### **APD\_DATE\_REPRESENTATION**

This entry defines the type of date representation to be used for displays. The value must be one of the following:

ISO YYYY-MM-DD  
USA MM/DD/YYYY  
EUR DD.MM.YYYY

The default value is ISO.

**APD\_GROUPJOBS\_MAXIMUM**

This entry contains the maximum number of group jobs that can be processed simultaneously. The value must be between 1 and 16. The default value is 16.

---

## Chapter 4. System Operator Tasks

This chapter describes the APD/400 system operator tasks:

- Saving and restoring data
- Service functions
- Auditing in APD/400
- File reorganization.

### Multilingual support

APD/400 provides multilingual support for applications. All text fields that are enabled for multilingual support are noted in the displays described in this chapter. For more information on APD/400's multilingual support features, see Appendix B, "Multilingual Support" on page 119.

## Saving and Restoring Data

As the system operator, you are responsible for saving and restoring data. Using APD/400, you save and restore libraries and folders individually or in groups.

Control records are used to develop a schedule for data saving. This schedule determines how often libraries and folders are saved (the cycle), and how long they are kept (generations).

APD/400 libraries and folders, and libraries and folders of applications installed under APD/400, are automatically included in the list of control records. However, you must create the control records of libraries and folders of other applications. For each save operation, the control records are automatically recorded as history data on tape or diskette.

**Note:** The term "tape" in this chapter refers to tapes and tape cartridges.

Options are available to support you in saving and restoring data. You can, for example, determine the tapes to be used for saving data by printing a list of the tapes you have reserved but that have not yet been used.

Specify the tapes and the save parameters, and develop your schedule before you save data for the first time.

### Saving data

Saving of data is not processed automatically, even if you have defined a complete save schedule for your libraries and folders. You must initiate the save processing manually. When you start the saving of libraries and folders you can still decide whether only the scheduled libraries and folders should be saved, or if you want to include libraries and folders that would not normally be saved according to the defined schedule.

To work with Save and Restore Data, select option 3 on the Application Program Driver initial menu or enter the expert code SAVRST.

**Note:** You must be enrolled in the QSYSOPR authorization list to use this option.

A window displays the first options on the Save and Restore Data menu. Use the Page Down key to see all the available options. The options are:

**Save Functions**

- 1 Save Libraries and Folders.
- 2 Select and Save Libraries and Folders.

**Administration Functions**

- 3 Administer Save Parameters.
- 4 Administer Tapes.
- 5 Administer Control Records.

**Print Functions**

- 6 Print Save Information.

**Restore Functions**

- 7 Restore Libraries and Folders.
- 8 Select and Restore Libraries and Folders.

## Administering Save Parameters

You can define the basic settings with Administer Save Parameters. The entries on this display affect all tapes and control records.

To work with Administer Save Parameters, specify 3 on the Save and Restore Data menu or enter the expert code ADMSAVPRM.

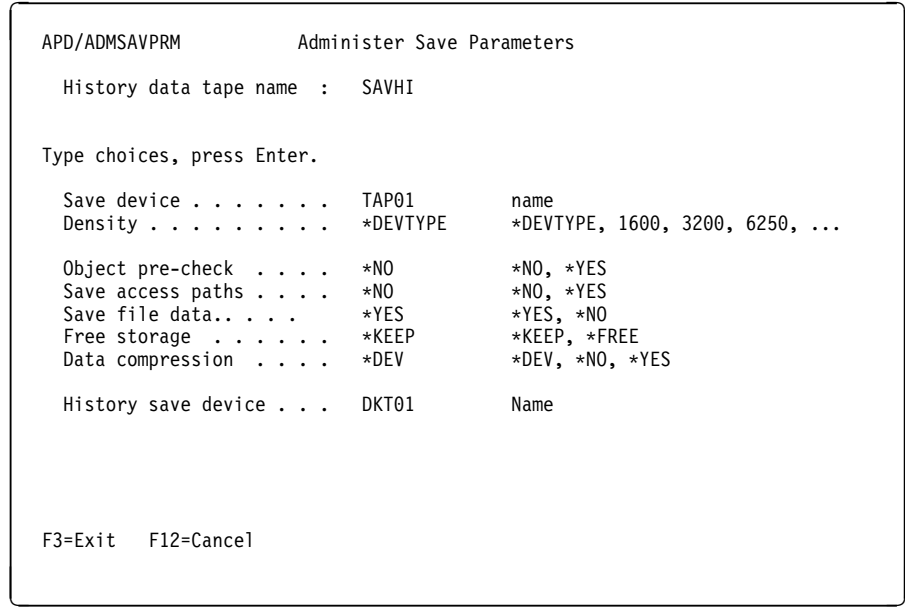


Figure 81. Administer Save Parameters

The fields on this display are as follows:

- Save device            The name of the tape unit to be used.
- Density                The density of the tape unit to be used.

If the compression feature is not present, or if save data is written to a diskette or a save file, hardware compression is not done.</p>
History save device	<p>The name of the tape or diskette unit for saving history data.</p>

For a more detailed description of these fields, see *AS/400 Programming: Control Language Reference Manual* (the INZTAP command for the *Density* field, and the SAVLIB command for the other fields).

## Administering Control Records

You use control records to determine which libraries and folders are saved by the APD/400 save function, the save cycle, the number of save generations for each library or folder, and so on.

Administer Control Records enables you to add, change, hold, delete, display, or release control records.

To work with Administer Control Records, specify 5 on the Save and Restore Data menu or enter the expert code ADMCTLREC. APD/400 displays the following:

Enter the following information:

Library/Folder

The name of the library or folder to be saved or restored.

Type

1=library or 2=folder.

Generations

The number of backup generations to be stored.

Priority

The sequence for saving. A library or folder with priority 00 is saved first. A library or folder with priority 99 is saved last.

Medium

The storage medium. The only valid value is 1 (Tape/tape cartridge).

Cycle

The cycle defines the frequency of data saving: daily, weekly (every seven days), or monthly. If you select manual, the library or folder is not included in an automatic save cycle but has to be specifically selected by using Select and Save Libraries and Folders.

Starting date

The date of the first save activity.

Press Enter to create the new control record.

### Changing Control Records

Specify option 2 (Change) in the corresponding option column on the Administer Control Records menu to display Change Control Record.

You can change the number of generations, the priority, the storage medium, the cycle, and the starting date.

Press Enter to save the changed control record.

### Holding and Releasing Control Records

To hold a control record that you do not want to be used for the save operation, specify option 3 (Hold) in the corresponding option column of Administer Control Records. The status of the control record changes to \*HLD on the display.

Libraries and folders associated with control records on hold (status \*HLD) are not saved until the control records are released.

To release a record on hold to reactivate it for the save operation, specify option 6 (Release) in the corresponding option column of Administer Control Records. The status of the control record changes to \*RLS on the display.

**Note:** You can only release control records that have the status \*HLD.

### Deleting Control Records

Specify option 4 (Delete) in the corresponding option column of Administer Control Records to display Delete Control Record. Press Enter to confirm deletion.

### Displaying Control Records

Specify option 5 (Display) in the corresponding option column of Administer Control Records to display a control record.

## Administering Tapes

All tapes to be used for saving data must be entered in the tape list. Administer Tapes enables you to add, change, hold, delete, display, release, and initialize tapes for use by the Save and Restore options.

To work with Administer Tapes, specify 4 on the Save and Restore Data menu or enter the expert code ADMTAP. APD/400 displays the following:

All tapes defined for the Save and Restore options are listed on the display. You can change, hold, delete, display, release, and add tapes to the list.

### **Adding Tapes**

To add a tape, press F6 (Add) on Administer Tapes. On the Add Tape display you enter:

Tape name

The name of the new tape.

Tape description

Descriptive text for the new tape.

**Note:** You can enter &msg symbols in this field to retrieve text for a specific language. For more information on multilingual support, see Appendix B, “Multilingual Support” on page 119.

To initialize the tape with the values specified using Administer Save Parameters, press F11 (Initialize Tape). Otherwise, press Enter to add the new tape.

### **Changing Tapes**

To change the description of a tape, specify option 2 (Change) in the corresponding option column on Administer Tapes to display Change Tape. Change the tape description and press Enter.

### **Holding and Releasing Tapes**

To temporarily hold a tape from save operations, specify option 3 (Hold) in the corresponding option column of Administer Tapes. The status of the tape changes to \*HLD on the display.

To release a held tape (to reactivate it for use in save operations), specify option 6 (Release) in the corresponding option column of Administer Tapes. The status of the tape changes to \*RLS on the display.

**Note:** You can release only tapes that have the status \*HLD.

### **Deleting Tapes**

To delete a tape from the tape list, specify option 4 (Delete) in the corresponding option column on Administer Tapes. Display Tape for Deletion is displayed. Press Enter to confirm the deletion.

### **Displaying Tapes**

To display a tape from the list of tapes, specify option 5 (Display) in the corresponding option column on Administer Tapes. Display Tape shows the name and description of the selected tape, and the libraries and folders that are stored on the tape.

## **Print Save Information**

Print Save Information offers you various print options. To work with Print Save Information, specify 6 on the Save and Restore Data menu or enter the expert code PRTLST. APD/400 displays a window offering the following options:

- 1 Available Tapes
- 2 Saved Libraries/Folders
- 3 All Tapes and Libraries/Folders
- 4 Libraries/Folders waiting to be saved
- 5 Work with Printer Output.

Select a print function by specifying its corresponding option number.

Available Tapes

Prints a list of the tapes that are reserved for saving data. When you use Work with Printer Output, the file name used for this option is QPAFSPPR23.

Saved Libraries/Folders

Prints a list of all libraries and folders that have been saved. When you use Work with Printer Output, the file name used for this option is QPAFSPPR95.

All Tapes and Libraries/Folders

Prints a list of all tapes, and libraries and folders. When you use Work with Printer Output, the file name used for this option is QPAFSPPR22.

Libraries/Folders waiting to be saved

Prints a list of all libraries and folders waiting to be saved. When you use Work with Printer Output, the file name used for this option is QPAFSPPR17.

Work with Printer Output

Transfers you to the OS/400 administrative function WRKSPLF to enable you to display, print, or manipulate the created lists.

All selected lists are added to the output queue QSYSPRT (in hold mode).

## Selecting and Saving Libraries and Folders

This option starts the save process if you want to include libraries or folders in the save that are not scheduled for this cycle, or if you want to add libraries and folders that you have decided to add to the save cycle manually.

By specifying cycle 0 (manual) in its control record, you must select a library or folder for manual saving (see “Administering Control Records” on page 102). You can also manually select libraries and folders for exceptional saving, in addition to their usual cycles (daily, weekly, or monthly).

To work with Select and Save Libraries and Folders, specify 2 on the Save and Restore Data menu, or enter the expert code SLTSAV.

Select and Save Libraries and Folders is displayed, listing all control records, independent of the cycle specified.

Select the libraries and folders to be saved by specifying option 1 (Select). Press Enter to confirm. The display reappears with the status \*SLT (selected) for all the entries you selected.

Specify option 3 (Remove selection) to prevent a previously selected entry from being saved. If you press Enter, the display reappears with \*RLS (released) against any entries you selected to release.

Specify 5 (Display) for Display Saved Generations, which displays a complete list of all previous save operations for a library or folder.

Press F22 (Save) to start the save process (see “Saving Libraries and Folders”).

## Saving Libraries and Folders

Save Libraries and Folders starts the save process for libraries and folders according to a daily, weekly, or monthly cycle. It appears when:

- You select libraries or folders manually on Select and Save Libraries and Folders and press F22 (Save) to start the save process
- You specify 1 on the Save and Restore Data menu or enter the expert code SAVLIB.

Press Enter to save the displayed cycle.

## Selecting and Restoring Libraries and Folders

To select and restore individual libraries and folders, specify 8 on the Save and Restore Data menu or enter the expert code SLTRST.

Select and Restore Libraries and Folders is displayed, listing the control records of all saved libraries and folders. Select the libraries and folders you want to restore by specifying 1 (Select), and press Enter. The display reappears with status \*SLT (selected) against all the entries you selected.

Specify option 3 (Remove selection) to prevent an entry you selected from being restored. Press Enter and the display reappears with status \*RLS (released) against the selected entries.

Press F22 (Restore) to start the restore process.

## Restoring Libraries and Folders

The Restore Libraries and Folders display appears when:

Select Service Functions by specifying 4 on the Application Program Driver initial menu, or enter the expert code EXTSRV.

## **Changing the User Profile**

Specify 5 on the Service Functions menu to change the default user profile. This option runs the CHGUSRPRF command with USRPRF(QAFDFTUSR), which enables you to change the default definition of the user profile used by Administer User Entries when you add a new user profile.



## Working with the APD/400 Batch System

APD/400's batch system administers all batch jobs that are scheduled using APD/400. At the specified start date and time, the batch system forwards the job to the OS/400 work management to be run.

You can start, stop, or change the status of APD/400's batch system using `Work with APD/400 Batch System`. For example, if you need to save the library QUSRSYS (APD/400 data), the batch system must first be changed to state 4 (Hold, no locks). This is because the APD/400 batch system locks some resources that would prevent the save function being run. To use `Work with APD/400 Batch System`, specify 9 on the `Service Functions` menu, or enter the expert code `WRKMONSTS`. The following is displayed:

In the upper part of the display, you see information on the APD/400 batch situation:

### Jobs that are currently active

The number of batch jobs running under APD/400 control that are currently active.

### Jobs that are waiting on the job queue

These jobs have already been activated by the APD/400 batch system, but they are waiting to be activated by OS/400 work management.

### Current state of the APD/400 Batch System

The current state of the batch system can have the following values:

#### 1 = Active

The normal state of the APD/400 batch system. The APD/400 BMP activates eligible jobs, and jobs already passed to OS/400 work management are processed.

2 = Not activating

The BMP is not activating eligible jobs, but jobs that have already been passed to OS/400 work management before the BMP was switched to this state are processed.

3 = Hold

The BMP is not activating eligible jobs, and jobs passed to OS/400 work management before the BMP was switched to this state are not processed. These jobs are resubmitted when the BMP returns to state

1 = Active.

4 = Hold, no locks

For the processing of batch jobs under APD/400 control, this state is identical to state 3 = Hold.

In addition, the BMP closes all files and frees all resources that could lead to conflict situations with certain APD/400 functions, for example, saving the APD/400 data library QUSRSYS, or reorganization.

If the APD/400 batch system is in this state, and if the number of active jobs and the number of jobs on the job queue are both 0, you can save the APD/400 data library QUSRSYS.

90 = Down

The batch system is not active; the BMP is not running. All jobs submitted under APD/400 control are canceled.

**Note:** In this state, it does not necessarily mean that no APD/400-controlled batch job is running. If the BMP is, for example, canceled with the ENDJOB command from an OS/400 command entry screen, there may be some jobs that have been activated by the BMP that are still active or waiting on the job queue. Therefore, you should always check the output fields Jobs that are currently active and Jobs that are waiting on the job queue. Both must be 0 and the BMP state must be 4 = Hold, no locks, or 90 = Down, before you begin work that requires exclusive access to APD/400.

In the lower part of the display, you can change the status of the APD/400 batch system.

Requested state of the APD/400 Batch System

Specify the required status for APD/400's batch system.

Because changing the state may have an impact on the processing of jobs of other users (for example, changing to state 90 = Down cancels all active jobs running under APD/400 control), it is secured as follows:

- A user who attempts to change the state from 1 = Active to 4 = Hold, no locks must have at least level 5 authority in the APD/QSYSOPR authorization list.
- A user who attempts to change the state to 90 = Down must have level 9 authority in the APD/QSYSOPR authorization list.

For more information on APD/400's batch system, see Appendix A, "APD/400 Batch System" on page 115.

---

## Auditing in APD/400

For each application, you can specify that any APD/400 event is logged. For example, the starting or ending of a task, or an unsuccessful access attempt, are events, and APD/400 writes these to the file QAAFAUDT0 in the library QUSRSYS with relevant information such as user ID, job number, and date and time. This file is written sequentially with one record per event, and is not used by APD/400 for retrieving information. For more information on the APD/400 Audit file, see *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: Developer's Guide*.

## Auditing an Application

Use *Administer Applications* (see “Administering Applications” on page 85) to set the appropriate flag if you want to audit all access attempts to the application.

## Auditing Parts of an Application

If you want to audit only access attempts against specific tasks, use *Administer Menus* (see “Structuring Menus” on page 31) to specify those tasks.

## Administering Audit File Entries

Use the system parameter `APD_REORG_ADAUDT0` to specify the number of days that data is kept in the Audit file. The default value is 30 days. The Audit file data may, however, decrease system performance.

A detailed description of how to change `APD_REORG_ADAUDT0` is provided in “Administering Parameters” on page 93.

---

## Requesting Periodical Reorganization

The BMP calls a program that reorganizes all APD/400 files. This reorganization is processed only if APD/400 is available exclusively. To make APD/400 available exclusively, you must bring down the batch system:

- Select *Work with APD/400 Batch System* by specifying option 9 on the *Service Functions* menu or entering the expert code `WRKMONSTS`.
- Make sure that there are no jobs active (the *Jobs* that are currently active field is 0).
- Bring down the batch system by specifying `90 = Down`.

The type of reorganization depends on the current value of the parameter `APD_REORG_LEVEL`. The following reorganization levels are allowed for this parameter. Each higher level includes all lower levels.

- 0 No reorganization is performed.
- 1 Physical reorganization (RGZPFM for all APD/400 files) is performed. See the description of the RGZPFM command in the OS/400 documentation.
- 2 Logical reorganization: Re-creation of the APD/400 database integrity concerning references. For example, all references to nonexisting applications or installations are deleted.
- 4 APD/400 keeps information about the contents of displayed menus for each user in an internal file to speed up the displaying of menus. The content of this file is cleared. APD/400 rebuilds all user menus from the database entries

automatically the next time a user selects a menu. The purpose of this reorganization is to delete unused entries in APD/400's internal control files to free auxiliary storage.

- 8 All temporary internal control files of APD/400 are cleared; all information for restarts is deleted. Select this reorganization when you have a lock situation (which may be caused by an abend) that cannot be solved using the WRKCNLJOB function.

**Note:** All restart information is cleared.

- 9 All permanent internal control files of APD/400 are cleared (scratch installation): all information about initial menus, start programs, active data sets, and scheduled jobs is deleted. The Audit file is cleared.

During reorganization, the current journal receiver is changed.

The reorganization program is called when the BMP is started. To make sure that no APD/400 activity is on the system when the reorganization is started, it is recommended to start the BMP at IPL time. "Installing the APD/400 Batch Monitor Program" on page 5 describes how to do this.

If the BMP is not automatically started at IPL time that means it is not installed in the controlling subsystem. Perform the following procedure to start the reorganization program:

- ensure that the subsystem QAFSPS is not active
- ensure that no APD/400 activity is on the system
- start the BMP with the command STRSPS SPSD(QAPD/QAFSPS)
- the reorganisation is finished when the BMP has the status \*MSGW.

**Note:** The reorganisation level must have been set with an APD/400 function ADMAPPPRM. (see Chapter 3, "Defining the Application Environment" on page 15, Administer Parameters).

## Appendix A. APD/400 Batch System

This appendix includes:

- Starting the APD/400 batch system
- A technical overview of the batch system
- How the APD/400 batch scheduler submits a job.

### Notes:

## Starting the Batch System

The APD/400 batch system can be started using any of the following methods:

- Enter STRSBS QAPD/QAFSBS on the command line.
- Use the function described in “Working with the APD/400 Batch System” on page 111.
- Use the APD\_MON\_AUTOSTART parameter, as described in “Administering Parameters” on page 93.

---

## Technical Overview

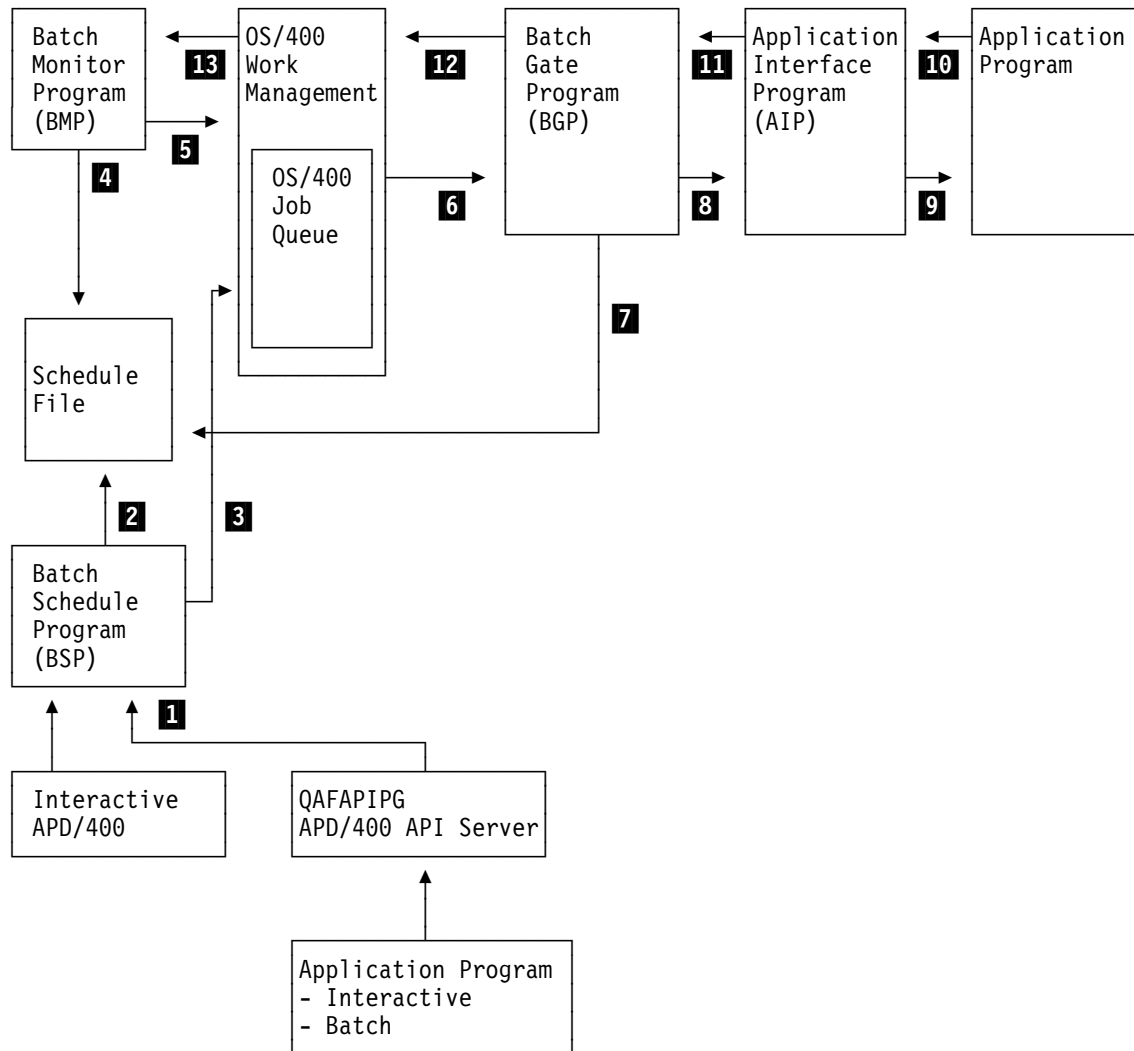


Figure 89. Components of the Batch System

Figure 89 on page 116 gives you an overview of the components of the APD/400 batch system.

To understand the APD/400 batch system, you need to understand the terms schedule, submit, activate, and run.

## Schedule

- 1** Scheduling is done by the Batch Schedule Program (BSP). The BSP is called from either interactive APD/400 or the APD/400 server (the SCHBATCH API, which is described in *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: Developer's Guide*).
- 2** The BSP inserts an entry into the APD/400 batch schedule file. This is to inform the Batch Monitor Program (BMP) that a job must be activated at a certain time.

## Submit

- 3** The BSP submits the job to the OS/400 job queue specified in the corresponding batch environment. The job is submitted with an initial state of \*HLD (Hold).

## Activate

- 4** A scheduled job becomes eligible when the BMP detects that the job's entry in the APD/400 schedule file has a date and time less than or equal to the current date and time.
- 5** The BMP then releases the corresponding job in the OS/400 job queue.

## Run

- 6** OS/400 work management passes control of the job to the Batch Gate Program (BGP) when:
  - The job queue is released.
  - The job queue is attached to a started subsystem.
  - OS/400 work management allows the job to become active (active job's number, priority, and so on).
- 7** The BGP now checks whether the job is allowed to run by reading and updating the schedule file to check if:
  - The current state of the batch system allows the job to run
  - There is any exclusion for the job
  - The user is authorized to run the job.
- 8** If the job is allowed to run, the BGP calls the AIP. The AIP builds the environment (for example, library list and job attributes) needed by the application program.
- 9** The AIP calls the application program defined in the parameter that the AIP has received from the BGP.
- 10** When the application program ends, it returns control and parameters to the AIP.
- 11** The AIP interprets the parameters received by the application program and returns control back to the BGP.
- 7** The BGP updates the schedule file again (marks the job as completed).
- 12** The BGP passes control back to the OS/400 work management that ends the job.
- 13** If the job in which the BGP and the AIP are running ends abnormally (control is not passed back to the BGP), OS/400 work management sends a job abend message to the BMP.
- 4** In such a case, the BMP marks the job as abended in the schedule file.

---

## How the APD/400 Batch Scheduler Submits a Job

At the end of the scheduling process, the APD/400 batch scheduler forms a SBMJOB (submit job) command from the information stored in the task, the defined batch environment, and the APD/400 parameter definition. The following is a list of the SBMJOB command parameters with a description of how APD/400 uses the stored information to form the command:

<b>Parameter</b>	<b>Description</b>
<b>CMD</b>	Specified by APD/400; contains the CALL command to the BGP.
<b>JOB</b>	The task name of the batch task; retrieved from the task definition.
<b>JOBID</b>	If a batch environment has been specified for the batch task, APD/400 uses the job description specified in the batch environment, otherwise the values from the APD/400 parameters APD_MON_JOBID and APD_MON_JOBIDLIB are used.
<b>JOBQ</b>	If a batch environment has been specified for the batch task, APD/400 uses the job queue specified in the batch environment, otherwise the values from the APD/400 parameters APD_MON_JOBQ and APD_MON_JOBQLIB are used.
<b>OUTQ</b>	If a batch environment has been specified for the batch task, APD/400 uses the output queue specified in the batch environment, otherwise the values from the APD/400 parameters APD_MON_OUTQ and APD_MON_OUTQLIB are used.
<b>USER</b>	If a batch environment has been specified for the batch task, APD/400 uses the user profile specified in the batch environment, otherwise APD/400 does not explicitly specify the parameter and the command default is used.
<b>RQSDTA</b>	The request data cannot be specified because it is mutually exclusive with the CMD parameter specified by APD/400.
<b>HOLD</b>	The job is set to HOLD (*YES) by APD/400; the job is released when it becomes eligible.
<b>MSGQ</b>	Specified by APD/400; contains the name of the APD/400 monitor message queue QSYS/QAFBCRMQ01.

For all other parameters, there is no explicit specification for APD/400. See *AS/400 Programming: Work Management Guide* for a description of how the SBMJOB command works.



---

## Appendix B. Multilingual Support

This appendix contains a description of the multilingual support feature for APD/400. The terms National Language Support (NLS) and multilingual support are used in this appendix. An explanation of these terms is given here:

**NLS** An application is NLS enabled when it is structured so that versions of the application can easily be created in other languages.

All texts that are part of the user interface (displays, messages, documentation, and so on) must be translatable. However, this does not necessarily mean that the application can be installed in different languages on the same system. All releases of APD and APD/400 have been NLS enabled.

### Multilingual Support

In addition to being NLS enabled, an application may also be enabled for multilingual support. Multilingual support is characterized by the following features:

- Different users may work with one application at the same time. The textual information that is part of that application can be presented to the users in different languages.
- A user may switch from one language to another at any time.

---

## How APD/400 Implements Multilingual Support

APD/400 provides support for applications using message files. Functions provided by APD/400 for an application often appear to a user as functions of that application. For example, task texts defined in APD/400 for an application appear as selection texts in menus of that application. A user could easily assume that these texts were part of the application being used.

Applications running under APD previously may have been enabled for multilingual support, but when a user selected a language it had no effect on other applications or on the texts used for navigation in the menus displayed by APD. Therefore, selecting languages had no effect on the menu system of the application.

APD/400 now provides features that allow the APD/400 part of an application enabled for multilingual support to be multilingual support enabled. These features are:

### Select Language Facility

An APD/400 task is provided that allows a user to specify preferred languages. Such a task can be activated by a user through a menu or expert code. It can also be activated by selecting a pull-down choice in an APD/400 menu bar.

### Installation of Language Versions of an Application

A set of rules has been defined to assist in installing the textual data part of application objects of multilingual support enabled applications.

## Common Language Selection

The language that a user selects for an application (using the APD/400 language selection feature) is provided in the interface between APD/400 and an application. The application can make use of this selection; there is no need to program a “Select Language” function in each application.

---

## Supported Languages

The IBM\* language feature codes for primary languages (for example, 2929 for German) are used to identify language versions of textual data (see *AS/400 National Language Support Planning Guide* for a complete list of IBM language feature codes). APD/400 contains a table that lists all the feature codes and texts that specify the language for each feature code.

Therefore, the languages APD/400 supports are limited to those supported by OS/400. If a developer wants to install a language that has no IBM language feature code, the developer could “use” one of the IBM supplied language feature codes providing it does not cause conflicts. For example, consider a Spanish software developer creating a Catalan national language version of an application running under APD/400. No IBM language code for Catalan exists. The software developer could use language code 2986 (Korean DBCS) providing no customer has already installed a Korean DBCS version of another application.

An APD/400 user does not use these feature codes, but selects from a list of language descriptions. *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: User's Guide* describes how users specify a list of preferred languages and how they select languages for an application. Only a developer or an administrator works with language feature codes.

---

## Developer's View

A developer makes an application multilingual support enabled by storing code and text information separately.

The developer does not need to provide a function to allow an end user to select a language. This function is provided by APD/400. However, the developer must use the language information provided by APD/400 in the application interface to display text in the user's selected language.

The developer must specify the language-dependent texts separately and put these texts into specific message files during the installation of the application. To do this, the developer can use the Post-Installation user exit, described in *IBM Application Program Driver/400 Version 3: Developer's Guide*. The developer must create a specific library if there are no texts in the specified language.

Refer to “Enabling Multilingual Support” on page 121 for more information.

---

## Administrator's View

An application administrator can change or add texts to an application. To do this for an application not enabled for multilingual support, the administrator can change the texts directly in the administration function.

To change the text entries for an application enabled for multilingual support, the administrator must change the texts in the corresponding message file, which contains all application texts for one language. The corresponding message identification is stored in the text field of the object to be changed.

To add a new text to an application enabled for multilingual support, the administrator must create new messages containing the language-dependent text (one message for each language), and insert the message identification into the text field of the object for which a new text is needed.

---

## Enabling Multilingual Support

For an application enabled for multilingual support, the textual data must be separated from the code and moved to other objects. Such objects contain only textual data for one language. The following objects are used in APD/400 to store textual data for applications:

- Libraries contain textual data objects (display files, panel groups, and message files).
- Folders contain Help documents.
- Documents contain online Help for APD/400 menus.
- Display files contain online Help for APD/400 menus.
- Panel groups contain online Help for APD/400 menus.
- Message files contain texts that replace APD/400 texts at program run time (for example, menu texts).

To avoid naming conflicts, the following rules must be followed:

- A library containing textual data must be named QAPD1111, where 1111 is replaced by the language feature code to which the textual data belongs (for example, QAPD2929 for German).
- A folder containing online Help documents must be named QAF1111, where 1111 is replaced by the language feature code to which the textual data belongs (for example, QAF2929 for German).

If such a library or folder does not exist at application installation time, it must be created by the application installation procedure (use the Post-Installation user exit when installing with the APD/400 Install Applications function). The application refers to the textual data library or folder (as specified in the Help library or folder information of the Administer Applications (Developer) function) using the special value \*MRI instead of the real library or folder name:

- Textual data message files, panel groups, and display files must be named iiiaaaaaa, where iii is replaced by the installation ID and aaaaaaa is replaced by the application ID of the application to be installed. If the installation ID or the application ID contains blanks (b = Hex 40), they must be replaced by dollar signs (\$ = Hex 5B).

The application installation program must create the objects at installation time following the rules stated previously.

All Helps for tasks (normally specified on the Help fields of the Administer Menus function) must be contained in one panel group (which must contain all Help modules) or display file (which must contain all help records). The panel group or display file information is not used at program run time; it is resolved from the installation and application ID based on the rules described previously. Only the Help module or Help record information is used.

**Note:** Multilingual support enabled applications must not be installed into APD/400 installations with an installation ID that starts with a numeric character 0 . . 9. This is because OS/400 does not allow object names to begin with these characters.

- Textual data documents must be named aaaaaaa.iii, where iii is replaced by the installation ID and aaaaaaa is replaced by the application ID of the application to be installed. If the installation ID or the application ID contains blanks (b = Hex 40), they must be replaced by dollar signs (\$ = Hex 5B).

The application installation program must create the document at installation time following the rules stated previously.

## Examples

The following examples show how textual data objects are named:

1. An application with the internal application ID 9999AAA is to be installed into the APD/400 installation with installation code bbb. Two languages, 2924 (English) and 2931 (Spanish) are supported by application 9999AAA. Application 9999AAA uses panel groups for online Help. At installation time the Post-Installation user exit is used to create the following objects:
  - a. APD/400 textual data libraries QAPD2924 and QAPD2931, if they do not already exist.
  - b. The textual data message file of the application must be copied into the corresponding textual data libraries. The new name of the message file must be \$\$\$9999AAA.<sup>1</sup>
  - c. The online Help panel groups of the application must be copied into the corresponding textual data libraries. The new name of the panel groups must be \$\$\$9999AAA.<sup>1</sup>
2. An application with the internal application ID 7777ABb is to be installed into the APD/400 installation with installation code ABC. Three languages, 2939 (German MNCS), 2940 (French MNCS), and 2942 (Italian MNCS) are supported by application 7777ABb. Application 7777ABb uses OfficeVision/400 documents for online Help. At installation time the Post-Installation user exit is used to create the following objects:
  - a. APD/400 textual data libraries QAPD2939, QAPD2940, and QAPD2942, if they do not already exist.
  - b. APD/400 textual data folders QAF2939, QAF2940, and QAF2942, if they do not already exist.

---

<sup>1</sup> The dollar sign is used to replace the blanks (including trailing blanks) from the installation ID.

- c. The textual data message file of the application must be copied into the corresponding textual data libraries. The new name of the message file must be ABC7777AB\$.<sup>1</sup>
- d. The online Help documents of the application must be copied into the corresponding textual data folders. The new name of the documents must be 7777AB\$.ABC.<sup>1</sup>

## Storing Textual Data in APD/400 Tables

As already stated, some parts of the application (for example, menus and authorizations) are stored in APD/400 tables. The following information stored in APD/400 is language-sensitive and is supported by the multilingual support feature:

## Using the &msg Symbol to Specify Multilingual Support Texts

Texts for multilingual support enabled applications are separated from the control objects stored in the APD/400 database. These texts are stored in OS/400 message files. This is how OS/400 normally supports separation of control information and textual data. For example:

- MSGCON and MSGID keywords in DDS
- &MSG keyword in UIM
- Message ID instead of hardcoded texts in command sources.

Similarly, APD/400 supports the definition of a symbol that points to a message description stored in a message file as an alternative to hardcoded text. This symbol is resolved to the text stored in the message file whenever the text is retrieved and shown on an APD/400 display.

The symbol used is the &msg symbol (this symbol is also used in UIM for the same purpose). The syntax is:

Long form: &msg(<message-id> [<length>])  
For example: &msg(MSG0001 20) or &msg(MSG001)  
Short form: &msg<message-id>  
For example: &msgMSG0001

With the following parameters:

<message-id> The message ID of the message description stored in the textual data message file.

**Note:** Uppercase characters must be used for the message ID. For example, ADF1000 is accepted, and adf1000 is not.

<length> A number between 1 and 132. The total number of bytes that are inserted instead of the symbol. If the length is not specified, it defaults to the number of significant (not blank) bytes in the message description.

**Note:** The &msg symbol must be all lowercase (&msg) or all uppercase (&MSG), and must not be mixed case (for example, &Msg).

A message file containing the message ID must exist in one of the language libraries of the user's current list of preferred languages. The name of the library and the message file must follow the rules described in "Enabling Multilingual Support" on page 121.

If the symbol cannot be resolved, either because it is not syntactically correct, or if the library, the message file, or the message description cannot be found, the symbol remains unresolved and one of the following error messages is sent to the user:

<b>MsgID</b>	<b>Message</b>

ADF0353	&msg symbol cannot be resolved.

Sent if a syntax error is detected.

ADF0354	Message &1/&2(&3) not found.

Sent if either the message file library, the message file, or the message description cannot be found. Low-level system messages may be sent in addition to this message:

&1 = Message file library

&2 = Message file

&3 = Message ID.

## Examples

The following examples show how mixed symbols and variables can be used in menu format headings. Assume that MSG0001 contains the string Application:

1. In this example, the short form is used and the length is 14 (implicitly determined from the length of the message string). The application abbreviation is PAYROLL.

```
&msgMSG0001 &AAAAAA
is resolved to:
Application : PAYROLL
```

2. In this example, length is 5, so the message string is truncated at position 5.

```
&msg(MSG0001 5) &AAAAAA
is resolved to:
Appli PAYROLL
```

3. In this example, length is 20, so the message string overlays the application ID.

```
&msg(MSG0001 20)&AAAAAA
is resolved to:
Application : OLL
```

## Multilingual Support for Online Help

APD/400 supports four methods for displaying the Help information of an application: UIM panel groups, display files, OfficeVision/400 documents, and a user-exit program.

For multilingual support enabled applications, it must be possible to send Help in different languages. Therefore, the Help information must be stored in special libraries or folders, as specified in “Enabling Multilingual Support” on page 121.

The application refers to the textual data library or folder (as specified in the Help folder or library information of the Administer Applications (Developer) function) using the special value \*MRI instead of the real library or folder name. The panel group or display file information is not used at program run time; it is resolved from the installation and application ID based on the rules previously described. Only the Help module or Help record information is used.

If an application is enabled for multilingual support and it uses the DSPHLP (Display Help) user exit to display Help information, the language feature code of the currently used language for the application is passed to the user exit program.

---

## AIP

The language feature code is passed as a 4-byte character (\*CHAR(4)) field to the AIP, which APD/400 uses to call application programs.

The language information can be passed to the AIP only if APD/400 has already resolved any textual data information for that application. This is done if either the application description or the description of the task to be processed has the &msg symbol. APD/400 must then resolve the symbol before task processing, and Select Languages is called to determine the preferred language for that user and application. If this is not the case, APD/400 may pass blanks instead of a language feature code to the AIP.



---

## Appendix C. IBM Supplied Objects

This appendix lists the objects supplied by IBM with APD/400, and describes values used in migration between different releases of APD.

### IBM Supplied Definitions

All APD/400, OfficeVision/400, and Operational Assistant\* tasks belong to APD/400, and should not be changed.

## Modification of Supplied Definitions

For each update of APD/400, all definitions are redistributed, with the exception of authorization lists and user groups.

The APD/400 database is shipped with initial settings. During migration, it may be that there are records that have been changed in the old release and are different to those supplied with the new release. The following list shows for which files the old values are migrated, and for which files the new definitions are applied. A value of O indicates that if two values with the same key exist for the file, the value from the old release is used. A value of N indicates that the definition shipped with the new release of APD/400 is used when there are two values for the same key. For the files QAAFANWG0 and QAAFBRX0, the differentiation is made on a field level. All fields are listed for these files for which the old value is used.

## User-Created Objects

Because APD/400 data definitions will change in future releases, do not use the application APD for user-defined objects. APD/400 automatically creates an application called APD+ in every installation. Store any user-defined objects in the application APD+.

Messages **ADF5515** through **ADF5527** are status messages.

### **ADF5500 INSTALLATION ROUTINE IS CURRENTLY LOCKED.**

**Explanation:** YOU CANNOT INSTALL APD/400 &1 BECAUSE THE INSTALLATION CONFLICTS WITH ANOTHER JOB. THE INSTALLATION ROUTINE TRIED TO LOCK DATA AREA &2/&3 EXCLUSIVELY, BUT THIS WAS NOT POSSIBLE.

**Operator Response:** USE COMMAND WRKOBJLCK &2/&3 \*DTAARA TO FIND OUT WHICH JOB IS LOCKING THIS OBJECT. WAIT UNTIL THAT JOB HAS ENDED BEFORE YOU START TO INSTALL APD/400 &1 AGAIN. IF NO JOB IS USING DATA AREA &2/&3, DELETE THIS OBJECT WITH THE DLTDTAARA COMMAND BECAUSE IT MUST NOT EXIST WHEN THE INSTALLATION OF APD/400 BEGINS.

---

### **ADF5501 APD/400 &1 WILL BE REINSTALLED ON YOUR SYSTEM.**

**Operator Response:** DO ONE OF THE FOLLOWING:

**Operator Response:** TRY TO INSTALL APD/400 &2 AGAIN. IF THE INSTALLATION FAILS, ASK YOUR SYSTEM ADMINISTRATOR FOR ASSISTANCE.

# Glossary of Terms and Abbreviations

This glossary defines terms used in the APD/400 library.

## A

**AIP.** Application interface program.

**API.** Application program interface.

**application.** A program used to perform a particular data processing task, such as inventory control or payroll.

**application interface program (AIP).** A functional interface used by APD/400 to invoke the corresponding application.

**application program interface (API).** A functional interface that allows an application program written in a high- or low-level language to use specific data or functions of APD/400.

**authorization.** The process of giving a user either complete or restricted access to an object, resource, or function.

**authorization list.** Authorization lists are used to protect menus, menu options, installations, and data sets from unauthorized access. An authorization list consists of a 10-digit authorization list name and a list of authorization list entries, each of which is comprised of a user name and an authority level.

## B

**back up.** To save some or all of the objects on a system to tape or diskette, for safe keeping.

**backup.** (1) Pertaining to an alternative copy used as a substitute if the original is lost or destroyed, such as a backup log. (2) The act of saving some or all of the objects on a system to a tape, diskette, or save file. (3) The tapes, diskettes, or save files with the saved objects.

**Batch Monitor Program (BMP).** The program used by APD/400 to control batch jobs.

**batch processing.** A method of running a program or a series of programs in which one or more records (a batch) are processed with little or no action from the user or operator. Contrast with *interactive processing*.

**BMP.** Batch Monitor Program.

## C

**CL.** Control language.

**command.** A statement used to request a function of the system. A command consists of the command name abbreviation, which identifies the requested function, and its parameters.

**Common User Access (CUA).** Pertaining to a Systems Application Architecture (SAA) specification that gives a series of guidelines describing the way information should be displayed on a screen, and the interaction techniques between users and computers.

**control language.** The set of all commands with which a user requests system functions.

**control record.** The description of a save operation for libraries and folders. Record details include the save cycle, the number of generations to be stored, the medium, and the starting date.

**CUA.** Common User Access.

## D

**data description specifications (DDS).** A description of the user's database or device files that is entered into the system in a fixed form. The description is then used to create files.

**data set.** A data environment contained within an application. For applications that are multi-data set enabled, data sets could be used for different departments or clients.

**DBCS.** Double-byte character set.

**DDS.** Data description specifications.

**default.** A value that is automatically supplied or assumed by the system or program when no value is specified by the user.

**DLO.** Document library object.

**document library object (DLO).** Any system object that resides in the document library, such as RFT and FFT documents, folders, and PC files.

**double-byte character set (DBCS).** A set of characters in which each character is represented by 2 bytes. Languages such as Japanese, Chinese, and Korean, which contain more symbols than can be represented by 256 code points, require double-byte

character sets. Because each character requires 2 bytes, the typing, displaying, and printing of DBCS characters requires hardware and programs that support DBCS.

## E

**exclusion.** An exclusion defines which programs cannot be active simultaneously in an application.

**exclusion list.** An exclusion list combines tasks into groups. Defining exclusion lists saves the work of specifying each program for exclusions. Programs with identical exclusion characteristics can be combined in exclusion lists. An exclusion list can be either a function list or an object list.

**expert code.** A command or abbreviation used to invoke a menu or program. Entering an expert code allows the user to directly access a menu, task, or program (without calling intermediate menus), as well as to switch between applications without signing off and on. Pressing F4 on a menu screen displays a list of all expert codes for which the user is authorized.

## F

**folder.** A directory for documents. A folder is used to group related documents and to find documents by name. The system-recognized identifier for the object type is \*FLR. Compare with *library*.

**function key.** A keyboard key that allows the user to select keyboard functions or programmer functions. The keys available are displayed on line 23 of the screen display.

## H

**help function.** Pressing either the Help key or F1 on a display provides information on a specific part of that display or the whole display, depending on the position of the cursor. If the cursor is located on a message, second-level text for that message is displayed.

**high-level language (HLL).** A programming language, such as RPG, BASIC, PL/1, Pascal, COBOL, and C used to write computer programs.

**HLL.** High-level language.

## I

**IBM SAA OfficeVision/400 Version 3.** The IBM licensed program that allows users to prepare, send, and receive mail; schedule items on calendars; maintain directories of names and addresses; file and retrieve documents; and create and maintain distribution lists. SAA OfficeVision/400 also provides word processing functions and the capability to work on behalf of other users.

**initial menu.** The first menu displayed after sign-on. Each user can set a personal initial menu. Pressing F23 on a menu labels it as the initial menu for the user.

**installation.** A specific processing environment containing applications and data sets. For example, different installations could be used for test and production environments.

**interactive processing.** A processing method in which each operator action causes a response from the program or the system. Contrast with *batch processing*.

## J

**job.** (1) A unit of work to be done by a computer. (2) In the SAA OfficeVision/400 calendar function, an item that schedules a control language (CL) command to run at any date or time.

**journal.** A system object that identifies the objects being journaled, the current journal receiver, and all the journal receivers on the system for the journal. The system-recognized identifier for the object is \*JRN.

**journal receiver.** A system object that contains journal entries added when changes are made to an object, for example, when an update is made to a file being journaled. The object type is \*JRNRV.

**journaling.** The process of recording, in a journal, the changes made to a physical file member.

## L

**language priority list.** In APD/400, a list of available languages ranked in order of a user's preference, to enable the use of an application in one of the preferred languages. Number 1 on the priority list is the user's most preferred language.

**library.** A system object that serves as a directory to other objects. A library groups related objects, and allows the user to find objects by name. The system-recognized identifier for the object type is \*LIB. Compare with *folder*.



**library list.** A list that indicates which libraries are to be searched and the order in which they are to be searched. The system-recognized identifier is \*LIBL.

**library name template.** Naming conventions used in combination with the installation and data set IDs to resolve a library name during installation of an application that supports multiple installations or multiple data sets.

**local data area.** A 1024-byte data area that can be used to pass information between programs in a job. A separate local data area is automatically created for each job.

## M

**menu.** A displayed list of items from which a user can make a selection. The system-recognized identifier for the object type is \*MENU.

**menu bar.** The area containing keywords at the top of a display that gives a user access to actions available for that display. After a user requests a choice in the menu bar, a pull-down menu is shown below the menu bar.

**message.** A communication sent by the AS/400 system or APD/400, and displayed either on line 24 of the screen or in window format.

**MNCS.** Multinational character set.

**More.** When displays and menus comprise several pages, More... is displayed at the bottom of all screens except the last one.

Position your cursor on the display, or message line, and press F8. You can continue to do this until the word Bottom is displayed.

**multilingual support.** Support that includes more than one national language on a system. See also *National Language Support*.

**multinational character set (MNCS).** A set of graphic characters that support the languages within a specific language group.

## N

**National Language Support (NLS).** The ability for a user to communicate with hardware and software products in a language of choice to obtain results that are culturally acceptable. See also *multilingual support*.

**NLS.** National Language Support.

## O

**object.** A named storage space that consists of a set of characteristics that describe itself and, in some cases, data. An object is anything that exists in and occupies space in storage and on which operations can be performed. Some examples of objects are programs, files, libraries, and folders.

**OfficeVision.** See *IBM SAA OfficeVision/400 Version 3*.

**Operational Assistant.** Pertaining to a part of the operating system that provides a set of menus and displays for end users to do commonly performed tasks, such as working with printer output, messages, and batch jobs.

**output queue.** An object that contains a list of spooled files to be written to an output device, such as a printer or a diskette. The system-recognized identifier for the object type is \*OUTQ.

## P

**parameter.** A value supplied to a command or program that is used either as input or to control the actions of the command or program.

**process list.** A list of program or command tasks that are automatically processed in sequence. The last entry can be a menu. A process list is a special type of menu in which all tasks are called. Only when the last task has been processed is control returned to the previous menu or the menu at the end of the process list.

**program.** A sequence of instructions that a computer can interpret and run.

**pull-down menu.** An extension of the menu bar that displays a list of available choices for a choice selected by a user in the menu bar. After a user selects a choice in the menu bar, the pull-down menu is shown.

## Q

**queue.** A list of messages, jobs, files, or requests waiting to be read.

## R

**restart.** The action necessary when a batch job has failed to run as scheduled.

**restore.** To copy data from tape, diskette, or a save file to auxiliary storage. Contrast with *save*.

## S

**SAA.** Systems Application Architecture.

**save.** To copy specific objects, libraries, or data by transferring them from main storage or auxiliary storage to a media such as tape, diskette, or a save file. Contrast with *restore*.

**scheduled job.** A batch job that becomes eligible to run at a specified date and time.

**scroll.** To move a display image vertically or horizontally to view data that cannot be seen within the boundaries of the displayed screen.

**SEU.** Source entry utility.

**source entry utility (SEU).** A function of the AS/400 Application Development Tools licensed program that is used to create and change source members.

**spooled file.** A file that holds output data waiting to be processed, such as information waiting to be printed.

**start program.** A program defined by a user to run at sign-on time.

**symbolic library name.** A name given to represent a library in an application that supports multiple installations or multiple data sets. A symbolic library name is used in conjunction with a library name template.

**Systems Application Architecture (SAA).** Pertaining to an architecture defining a set of rules for designing a common user interface, programming interface, application programs, and communications support for strategic operating systems such as the OS/2, OS/400, VM/370, and MVS/370 operating systems.

## T

**tape cartridge.** A case containing a reel of magnetic tape that can be put into a tape unit without stringing the tape between reels.

**tape drive.** A device used to move the tape and read and write information on magnetic tapes.

**task.** A basic unit of work to be defined. In APD/400 there are six task types:

- Command
- Menu
- Menu bar
- Process list
- Program

- Pull-down.

**textual data.** The collective term for menus, displays, lists, prompts, options, online Help information, and messages.

**timetable.** A schedule showing a planned order or sequence, used in APD/400 to determine when to run a recurring batch job.

**toggle.** Pertaining to a switching device, such as a toggle key on a keyboard that allows a user to switch between two types of operations. For example, in APD/400 you can press F11 to display expert codes, and press the key again to return to the original screen display.

## U

**UIM.** User Interface Manager.

**user exit.** A program routine given control by APD/400 to enhance services provided by APD/400 functions.

**user identification (user ID).** The name used to associate the user profile with a user when the user signs on the system.

**User Interface Manager (UIM).** A function of the operating system that provides a consistent user interface by providing comprehensive support for defining and running panels (displays), dialogs, and online Help information.

**user password.** A unique string of characters that a system user enters to identify that user to the system, if the system resources are secured.

**user profile.** An object with a unique name that contains the user's password, the list of special authorities assigned to the user, and the objects the user owns. The system-recognized identifier for the object type is \*USRPRF.

## V

**value.** Data (numbers or character strings) entered in an entry field, and data supplied in parameters of CL commands.

## W

**window.** A part of the display screen with visible boundaries in which information is displayed. For example, in APD/400 when F17 (Position to) is pressed (where applicable), the Position the List window is displayed over the current display.
