

DR. J. M. DIXON, EDUCATOR, IS MOURNED

His associates on the faculty of the University of California were designated today to conduct the funeral of Dr. James Main Dixon, 77, professor emeritus of the institution, who died yesterday at his home, 5156 Victoria avenue, after a long illness.

The funeral will be held tomorrow at 4 p. m. at the Godeau & Martinoni undertaking parlors at 828 West Washington street.

Dr. Bruce Baxter, dean of the school of religion, will be in charge. The prayer will be given by Rev. Theodore Smith, pastor of Angeles Mesa Presbyterian church. Dean Rockwell D. Hunt, of the graduate school, will read the obituary, and Dr. R. B. Von KleinSmid, president of the university, will deliver the eulogy. Dean Emeritus Walter F. Skeele, of the school of music, will be at the organ.

Death closed a brilliant career which had taken Dr. Dixon to centers of learning all over the world. He became a member of the faculty at S. C. in 1905 and was retired in 1931.

BORN IN SCOTLAND

Dr. Dixon was born in Scotland in 1856. He was graduated with honor from St. Andrews university in 1879 and immediately became a faculty member of that university, teaching the first co-educational class in the British Isles.

In 1880 he was appointed an instructor of English in the Imperial College of Engineering at Tokio, Japan, which position he held for six years. In 1886 he helped found the Ladies Institute at Tokio and was decorated by the emperor of Japan.

COMES TO AMERICA

Professor Dixon came to the United States in 1892 and was a professor of English at Washington university until 1901. In 1905 he entered the Trojan school.

The noted educator was the author of many books and belonged to various well known organizations, including the Royal Society of Edinburgh, the Asiatic Society of Japan, Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Kappa Phi and numerous other organizations. He has been listed in "Who's Who In America" since its first edition in 1896.
