A "dry" zone five miles wide, unless there is a city or town within that limit, is to be thrown around

If a municipality is within even one-half mile of the camp, the dry zone is to be limited to the width in that direction. But if the camp 52 is located on the edge of a town the prohibition will extend to a width of one-half mile into the lown
