#### MISS SCHLEY DID IT. She Modestly Admits That by Her Visit to Madrid She Ended

the Spanish War.

Miss Jessie Schley, who has attained International fame by her visit to Madrid to sue the queen for peace, in the interests of the Peace society, and who is a cousin of Admiral Schley, has issued an address to the American press, dated at Milwaukee, in which she describes her visit to Spain and what she achieved there. In it she says: "Until now I have not given proof to substantiate my claim that we women, especially the American women, made the peace between Spain and our country. I promised to do so after the treaty of peace was signed, but have concluded to give it now.

"The facts are these: I reached Madrid as delegate of the Woman's International League for Peace, and bearing the list of names and resolutions for her majesty, the queen of Spain, on July 22. I at once began visiting and conferring with prominent officials. On the 23d his excellency, the minister of state, the Duc de Almodovar del Rio. requested me to put in writing the matter I desired to convey to him. I did so, and sent it to him on the 25th. On that day or the following, I judged from the newspaper report, the queen's cabinet, of which the duc is a member, discussed the communication in their meeting, and that day, the 26th, Spain sued for peace. The next day, the 27th, I was hurried out of Madrid, fearing riot against me when it should become known Spain had made overtures of peace. It was feared the Carlists and Spanish jingoes might make trouble then, and they had already begun to look for me."

### WOMEN WEAR PAPER HATS.

Milliners' Prices Are High, But If Made at Home the New Fad Costs Little.

A woman recently created a sensation at an afternoon luncheon in London by announcing that she had fifteen hats during the summer, but that not one of them contained an inch of silk, satin, velvet, or straw.

They were entirely of paper, and to prove her assertion she displayed the black turban trimmed apparently with bands of black silk, which she had worn to the luncheon. The turban was covered with black silk paper and trimmed with bands of the same material. The woman who is determined to do her own millinery can get a few yards of silk tissue paper and experiment

She can face her hat with Japanese paper, and can otherwise decorate as she pleases. Such a hat home made costs little, but at a milliner's the prices are high. They are placing so much work upon the paper flowers and the trimmings that it becomes necessary to charge well for them.

## GOOD RAILROAD YEAR.

#### Unprecedented Prosperity Experienced-Small Number in Receivers' liands.

Gen. James Longstreet, the commissioner of railroads, in his annual report, calls attention to the general prosperity in railroad affairs, and recommends the government construction and operation of a first-class double track railway from Kansas City, Mo., to San Diego. Cal., by air line route. He says the financial condition of our railroads cenerally is better than ever before. He points to the spectacle of roads, which only two or three years ago were in receivers' hands, now paying dividends on their preferred stocks and piling up surpluses, which in the course of a very short time, his report says, will be distributed among the common shareholders. Many roads, which in 1893 were forced to cut salaries 20 per cent., he says, have voluntarily restored the old basis of wages. In April, 1894, receivers controlled in this country 210 roads, embracing about 20 per cent. of the total mileage of the United States. On June 30 of this year there were only. 118 railroads in the hands of the receivers, and Gen. Longstreet predicts that under the present condition of prosperity within another year the list of insolvent railroads will be as small as in the years immediately preceding

# STOMACH WAS FULL OF PINS.

#### Post-Mortem Examination at Toledo, 0., Reveals a Peculiar State of Affairs.

A woman, who died in one of the charitable institutions of Toledo, O., was turned over unclaimed to the Toledo Medical college. The woman was partially insanc. An examination showed that the stomach contained almost a quart of hairpins, needles, brass pins, safety pins, pumpkin and melon seeds, small nails, and other indigestible matter. ## THE SOIL OF ALASKA

Experiments to Prove What Food Products It Can Raise.

During the Short Season Cats, Barley, Flax, Potatoes, Etc., Were Grown and Matured by Prof. C. Georgeson.

Experiments with a view to determin-

ng the adaptability of a variety of food products of the United States to the soil of Alaska have been conducted during the past season by the department of agriculture. Congress, stimulated by the large immigration to that country because of the Klondike gold discoveries, appropriated \$10,000 for the purpose of making the experiments referred to, which have been conducted by Prof. C. Georgeson, the special agent of the bureau of experiment stations. The professor has just returned to Washington from Sitka where he made his headquarters during his stay in Alaska and he brings back some interesting reports of the possibilities of the soil in the vicinity of the capital of the country. Prof. Georgeson succeeded in growing and maturing oats. barley, flax, potatoes and a number of vegetables. He also planted grasses and clovers which made considerable growth in the comparatively short season they were in the ground. It has been contended that oats, barley, flax, etc., could not be matured during the season, and that good potatoes could not be produced, but the experiments show to the contrary. The potatoes were of a very desirable quality, and some of them were brought to this city and tested and found to be superior in many respects to those grown in this vicinity. Reservations of lands for future experiments were made in the vicinity of Sitka, on Caodiac island, in the Cook Inlet region. Some experiments were also begun in the storage of forage plants in silos for feeding the animals during the winter season. Next year the experiment will take a wider range and will include those for the feeding of United States animals on the native forage plants. At this time Secretary Wilson has agents engaged in the northern countries of Europe in collecting varieties of the hardy seed plants of that cilmate for testing in the Alaskan possessions.

#### NEED OF FAST CRUISERS.

#### More Vessels of the Type of the Brooklyn and New York Required to Make Our Navy Efficient.

There is a strong feeling not only among naval officers, but in congress as well, that the most pressing need of the navy is in the direction of armored cruisers of the type of the Brooklyn and New York. When Cervera's fleet arrived at Martinique and sailed for Curacoa the navy was unable to hunt down the Spaniards because the United States had only two armored cruisers of the approximate type of Cervera's four ships. Battleships are of course the best fighters, but they sacrifice speed to batteries, and the United States evidently needs armored ships with one or two big guns and a heavy battery of quick-firing guns, and with a speed of over 20 knots an hour. There are now in the navy 13 battleships built and building, but still only the two armored cruisers carrying eight-inch rifles and a dozen rapid-fire guns each. The Brooklyn and New York are rated at 21 knots, and are armored sufficiently to stand an attack from anything except battleships. Secretary Long, while a firm believer in battleships, thinks the United States should have at least five more fast armored cruisers.

## FRESH BEEF FOR TROOPS.

#### War Department Arranging for a Supply for Interior Garrisons in Cubs.

The war department has made a contract with J. W. Overton, of Texas, for furnishing beef to interior garrisons of United States troops in Cuba at 9% cents per pound. This beef is to be driven to the garrison points and delivered dressed to the commissary department. These interior points will not include places which can be reached by rail from seaports, and only such towns in the interior where small garrisons are stationed. The subsistence department will supply the seaport and railway points with dressed beef from the United States which can be transported in refrigerator ships.

A Comprehension of Providence. A country parson went to see a humle parishioner, says a writer in Longman's Magazine, and if possible to comfort him some little under heavy trouble which had befallen.
