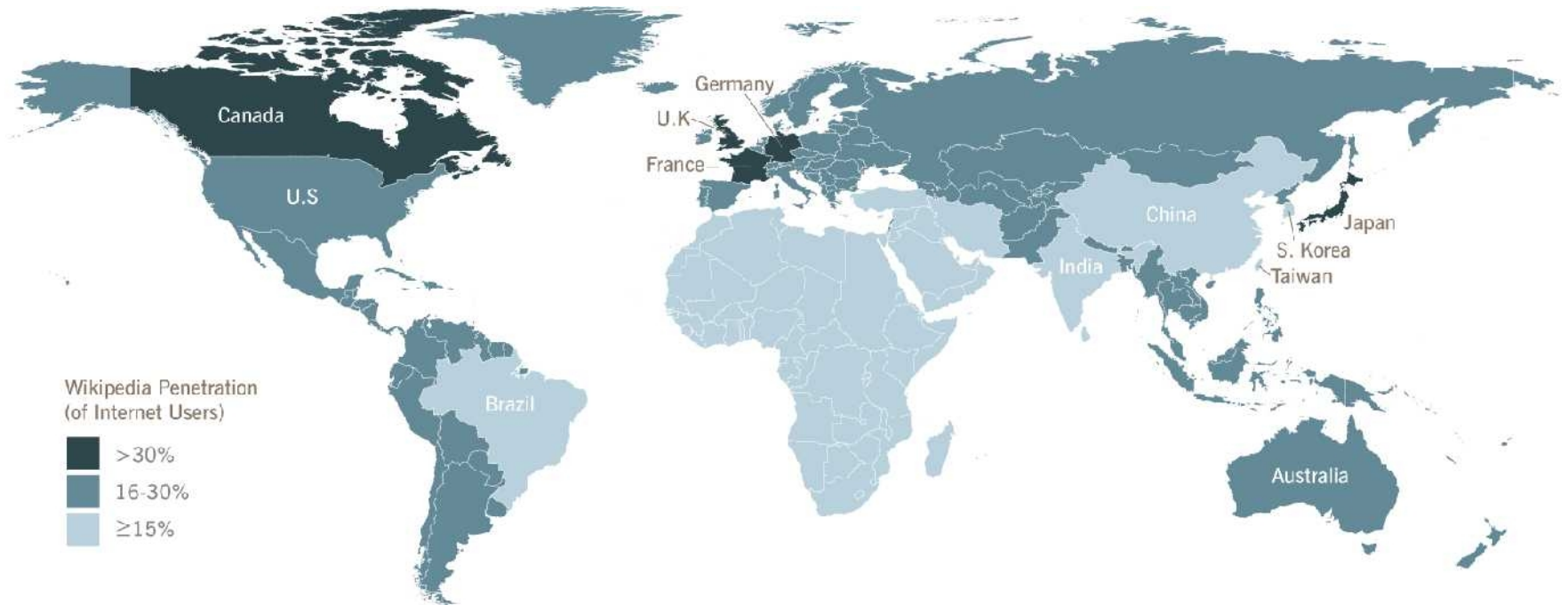

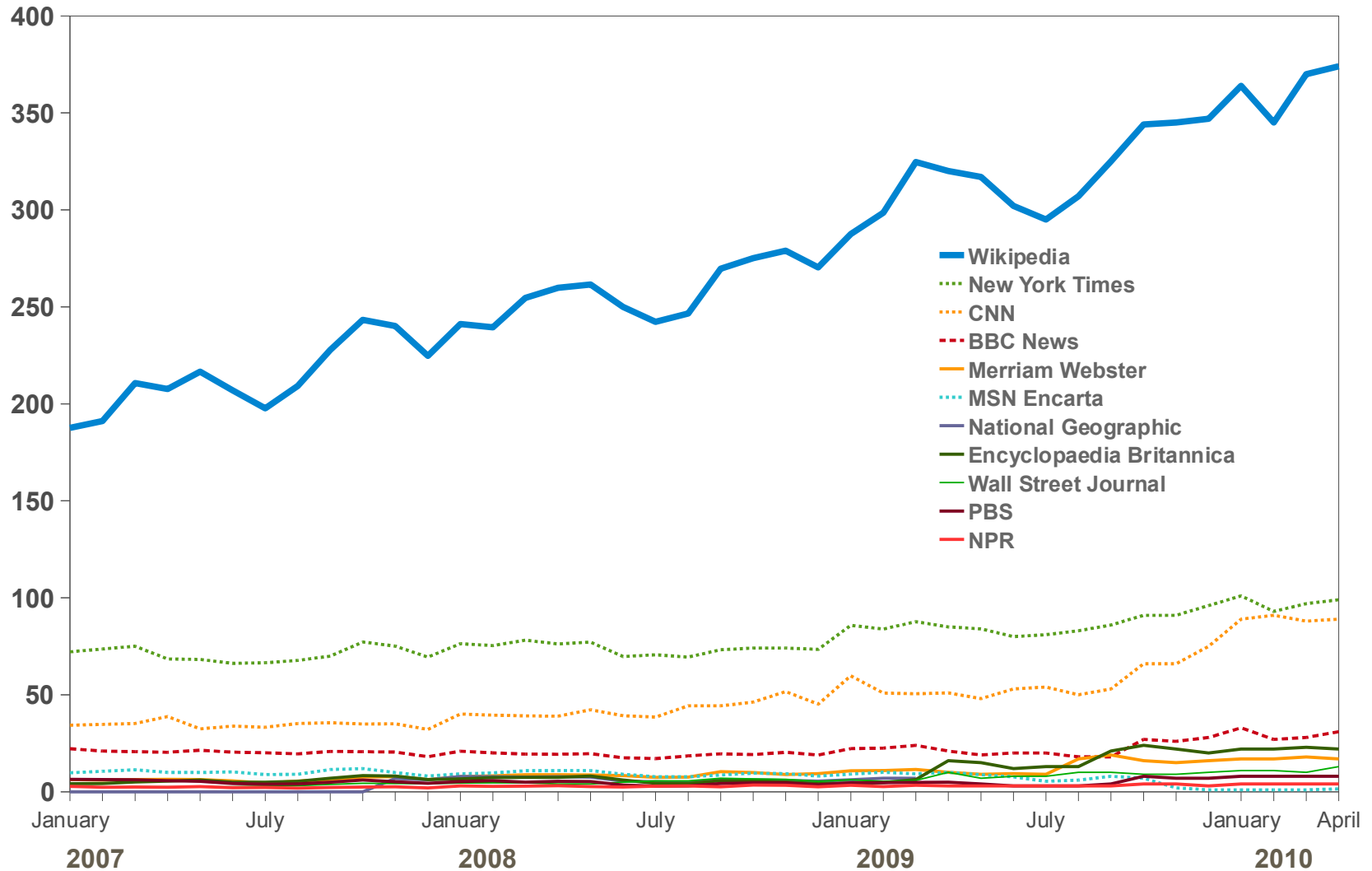
NUMBER OF WIKIPEDIA LANGUAGE VERSIONS
